We submit this letter to express strong support for SF3616, a bill that seeks to expand opportunities for polling places on college campuses across Minnesota. Research consistently underscores the profound impact that early voting experiences have on an individual's future voting behavior. A study from the Center for Information and Research on Civic Learning and Engagement (CIRCLE) at Tufts University highlights that young people who are engaged in the voting process early in their lives are more likely to continue participating in elections throughout their adulthood. Establishing polling places on college campuses serves as an avenue to facilitate this initial engagement, thereby laying the foundation for more robust and active democratic participation in the future.

Moreover, students of color often face disproportionate challenges in accessing polling locations. Opening polling locations directly on college campuses not only acknowledges these challenges but actively tries to eliminate them. This effort aligns with the broader goal of creating an inclusive democracy that truly represents the diverse fabric of our society.

Furthermore, the presence of polling places on campuses sends a powerful message to students about the value of their voices in the democratic process. It demonstrates a commitment to making voting as accessible as possible, thereby encouraging greater participation among young people. This is particularly crucial in a time when the engagement of young voters can significantly influence the outcomes of elections and shape the future policy landscape.
