## High Priority Bridges

#### \$40 million in Trunk Highway Cash for high-priority statemanaged bridge projects

- Bridge conditions are projected to decline significantly over the next ten years
- Would free up existing state bridge funds to address other projects
- Previous appropriations:
  - \$506 million in THB in 2023 (state highway construction, Corridors of Commerce Program, and named projects)
  - \$413 million THB in 2021 (state highway construction, Corridors of Commerce Program, and named projects)

#### Drainage Asset Management Program

\$4.8 million in Trunk Highway Cash to improve the resiliency of transportation hydraulic infrastructure

- Track, assess, and repair vulnerable hydraulic assets across the state
  - Risk management activity to address damaged infrastructure quickly
- Will enhance safety, reduce vulnerability to extreme precipitation events, and minimize expensive emergency maintenance
  - Climate change stresses the capacity of existing hydraulic infrastructure
  - Wetter winters with frequent freeze/thaw cycles have damaged some culverts and storm sewer systems

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Previous appropriations: none

#### Highway Rail Grade Crossings

#### \$2 million in GO Bonds for replacing rail grade crossing safety systems, installing new systems, and consolidating rail crossings

- Reliability of grade crossing warning devices is important to the safety of the traveling public
- Projects are selected based on roadway traffic volume, safety concerns, and train count/speed
- 750+ signal systems out of normal lifecycle (20 years)
- Previous appropriations:
  - \$1 million GO Bonds in 2017
  - \$3.6 million GO Bonds in 2023

#### Truck Parking Safety Improvements

\$7.5 million in Trunk Highway Cash to add trucking parking spaces at key locations to increase safety and provide rest for truck drivers

\$250,000 in Trunk Highway Cash to maintain, analyze data, repair and replace truck parking information management systems

Expand public truck parking at rest areas in Avon and Monticello

- 8-10 additional parking spaces at each site
- Information management systems provide real-time information to truck drivers about truck parking availability
- Previous appropriations: none

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#### Port Development Assistance Program

# \$3 million in GO Bonds to support infrastructure needs of public ports

- Expedites the movement of commodities and passengers on the commercial navigation system
- Enhances the commercial vessel construction and repair industry
- Promotes economic development in and around ports and harbors
- Previous appropriations:
  - \$14 million GO Bonds in 2020
  - \$18.1 million GO Bonds in 2023

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#### Facilities Capital Improvement Program

# \$20.1 million in Trunk Highway Cash for MnDOT building infrastructure needs

- Facilities Capital Improvement Program is a systematic approach to maintenance, renovation, and replacement
- MnDOT maintains 892 facilities at 279 sites
- Previous Appropriations:
  - \$58 million Trunk Highway Bonds in 2020
  - \$87.44 million Trunk Highway Bonds in 2023

## Appendix - 2023 Capital Funding

#### Capital investment bills allocated **\$402.714 million** to MnDOT for:

- Named road projects \$146.54M
- Named bridge projects \$37.2M
- Named air, active, rail, modal projects -\$29.123M
- Local Road Improvement \$84.954M
- Local Bridge Replacement \$67M
- Highway-railroad grade crossings \$3.6M
- Port Development Assistance \$18.097M
- Safe Routes to School \$2.4M
- Active Transportation \$1.2M
- Minnesota Rail Service Improvement \$9.6M
- Greater Minnesota Transit \$3M

Transportation omnibus budget bill authorized <u>\$599.2 million</u> in trunk highway bonding including:

- State road construction \$200M
- Corridors of Commerce \$153M
- MnDOT facilities \$87.44M\*
- Named road projects \$158.15M

\*Not eligible to be spent requires program amendment

#### Appendix - IIJA Discretionary Grant Awards

- \$216.4 million of state general funds available for nonfederal match requirements
  - \$10 million maximum award
  - Funds available until June 30, 2027
- Applications reviewed on a rolling monthly basis
  - First applications received September 2023
- Approved 38 matching grants totaling \$82.0M in state funds (through January 2024)
