# **Prohibiting Towing for Parking Ticket Debt Collection**

Minnesota statute explicitly prohibits towing a car at an expired meter, but makes an exception for vehicles with five or more unpaid parking tickets; this legislation would simply eliminate this exception.

## Why Is This Important?

- Towing is an ineffective tool for debt collection: A recent audit
  of nonessential and debt-related towing in San Diego, CA
  revealed that the city actually lost approximately \$1.5 million
  on the practice—with 27 percent of vehicles going unrecovered
  and sold for just a fraction of the owner's debts.
- The unnecessary loss of a vehicle has immediate, negative economic outcomes: 82 percent of Minnesotans use a car to commute to work, and 30 percent of households have only one vehicle.
- Parking tickets issued at expired meters are common:
   37 percent of parking tickets issued in Minneapolis are for vehicles at expired parking meters.
- Minnesota is leading on eliminating ineffective debt collection practices in transportation: This builds on recent legislation that has modernized the state by eliminating driver's license suspension for unpaid fines and fees and reforms made last session to towing statutes.

### **HOLDING DRIVERS ACCOUNTABLE**

Unpaid traffic tickets accrue late fees and are sent to collections, just like other non-traffic related debt. The Minnesota Department of Revenue carries out collections for the State of Minnesota, using the following measures to collect unpaid debt:

**Revenue recapture** (withholding payment for debt from your tax refund)

**Garnishment** of wages, bank accounts, or other income

Filing a lien against property

These are current practices and would not change under this legislation.

# The High Cost of Vehicle Recovery in Minneapolis

The Urban Institute published a study in 2023 that examined the practice of issuing parking tickets in the cities of Minneapolis, Portland, and Austin and the impact the practice has on institutionalizing poverty.

### Some conclusions:

- Minneapolis issues the 5th highest number of tickets in the country behind Philadelphia, New York City, San Francisco, and Los Angeles. Given the far-larger populations of those cities, Minneapolis is an outlier.
- For meter-related tickets, amounts ranged from \$20 to \$78 in Austin; \$44 to \$70 in Portland; and \$45 to \$180 in Minneapolis.
- The number of tickets issued per city resident in Austin was .26 per person; Portland .73/person; and Minneapolis 1.09/person.

A person making the median individual income in Minneapolis would lose about 22 percent of their monthly take-home pay in a situation where their vehicle needed to be recovered.

Costs are even higher if any tickets have been sent to collections, or if an individual cannot quickly recover their vehicle.
