WHAT DOES THIS BILL OFFER?

- 1. ACCESS AND CONTINUITY OF CARE as a growing number of Minnesotans live, work, or go to school in other states, they want high-quality health care from their Minnesota providers wherever they may be at the time. Using technology to provide telehealth facilitates following patients who are on vacation, away at school or simply live in another state. Health care dollars could remain in MN in many of these cases.
- 2. QUICK RESPONSE TO THE NEED FOR CARE
 during times of unexpected demand such
 as disasters and epidemics, the PT
 workforce can mobilize quickly and still
 have accountability. PTs and PTAs who

 contractors can get the appropriate

- 3. CONSISTENCY IN THE REQUIREMENTS the Compact creates no changes to the practice of PT when it occurs in the state of MN under licensure nor under practice privilege. The practice of PT occurs in the state in which the patient/client is located when the services are rendered.

4. PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC SAFETY - the PT Compact maintains Minnesota's high practice standards for physical therapy services provided in the state of Minnesota. It also requires anyone with practice privilege to take the annual jurisprudence examination
