Dear Chair Wiklund,

We are writing to you to ask you to urgently prioritize stillbirth prevention and support SF 1303 to bring a Count the Kicks pilot program to Minnesota. We represent two stillbirth prevention organizations working on the front lines to end preventable stillbirth in the United States.

According to the CDC, **23,000** babies are stillborn every year in the US, and Black families are more than twice as likely to suffer a stillbirth. More children are stillborn than die from prematurity, SIDS, car accidents, drowning, guns, fire, flu, poison, and listeria COMBINED²— a silent epidemic. Research shows that more than **25%** of these stillbirths are preventable, and **47%** at term.³ Unlike other countries where the stillbirth rate has declined (including the UK, Japan and Australia), the stillbirth rate in the US has plateaued. Every single day 65 US families leave the hospital with an empty car seat instead of their baby.

Together, we can change this. **You can help.** Meaningful change can come from simple but important pieces of legislation like SF 1303. **55% of women who had a stillbirth noticed their baby's movements had changed.** Expectant parents need to be educated on the importance of knowing their baby's movement pattern and providers need clear guidelines on how to respond to concerns.
