

1.1 **Senator Fateh from the Committee on Higher Education, to which was referred**

1.2 **S.F. No. 5326:** A bill for an act relating to higher education; providing for funding and
1.3 related policy changes to certain licensure and grant provisions; establishing fees;
1.4 appropriating money; amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 136A.69, subdivision
1.5 1; 136A.824, subdivisions 1, 2; Laws 2022, chapter 42, section 2.

1.6 Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

1.7 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.8 **"ARTICLE 1**

1.9 **HIGHER EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS**

1.10 Section 1. Laws 2022, chapter 42, section 2, is amended to read:

1.11 **Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION; ALS RESEARCH.**

1.12 (a) ~~\$20,000,000~~ \$396,000 in fiscal year 2023 is appropriated from the general fund to
1.13 the commissioner of the Office of Higher Education to award competitive grants to applicants
1.14 for research into amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS). The commissioner may work with
1.15 the Minnesota Department of Health to administer the grant program, including identifying
1.16 clinical and translational research and innovations, developing outcomes and objectives
1.17 with the goal of bettering the lives of individuals with ALS and finding a cure for the disease,
1.18 and application review and grant recipient selection. Not more than \$400,000 may be used
1.19 by the commissioner to administer the grant program. This is a onetime appropriation.
1.20 Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.28, unencumbered balances under this
1.21 section do not cancel until June 30, 2026.

1.22 (b) \$19,604,000 in fiscal year 2024 is appropriated from the general fund to the
1.23 commissioner of the Office of Higher Education to award competitive grants to applicants
1.24 for research into amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS). The commissioner may work with
1.25 the Minnesota Department of Health to administer the grant program, including identifying
1.26 clinical and translational research and innovations, developing outcomes and objectives
1.27 with the goal of bettering the lives of individuals with ALS and finding a cure for the disease,
1.28 and application review and grant recipient selection. Up to \$15,000,000 may be used by the
1.29 commissioner for grants to the Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Association, Never Surrender,
1.30 or other similar organizations to award and administer competitive grants to applicants for
1.31 research into ALS under this section. This is a onetime appropriation. Notwithstanding
1.32 Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.28, unencumbered balances under this section do not cancel
1.33 until June 30, 2029.

2.1 ~~(b)~~ (c) Grants shall be awarded to support clinical and translational research related to
 2.2 ALS. Research topics may include but are not limited to environmental factors, disease
 2.3 mechanisms, disease models, biomarkers, drug development, clinical studies, precision
 2.4 medicine, medical devices, assistive technology, and cognitive studies.

2.5 (e) (d) Eligible applicants for the grants are research facilities, universities, and health
 2.6 systems located in Minnesota. Applicants must submit proposals to the commissioner in
 2.7 the time, form, and manner established by the commissioner. Applicants may coordinate
 2.8 research endeavors and submit a joint application. When reviewing the proposals, the
 2.9 commissioner shall make an effort to avoid approving a grant for an applicant whose research
 2.10 is duplicative of an existing grantee's research.

2.11 ~~(d)~~ (e) Beginning January 15, 2023, and annually thereafter until January 15, ~~2027~~ 2030,
 2.12 the commissioner shall submit a report to the legislature specifying the applicants receiving
 2.13 grants under this section, the amount of each grant, the purposes for which the grant funds
 2.14 were used, and the amount of the appropriation that is unexpended. The report must also
 2.15 include relevant findings, results, and outcomes of the grant program, and any other
 2.16 information which the commissioner deems significant or useful.

 2.18 ~~unencumbered balances under this section do not cancel until June 30, 2026.~~

5.19 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

5.20 Sec. 5. **APPROPRIATION; KIDS ON CAMPUS INITIATIVE.**

5.21 \$500,000 in fiscal year 2025 is appropriated from the general fund to the Board of
 5.22 Trustees of the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities to participate in the Kids on
 5.23 Campus initiative with the National Head Start Association and the Association of
 5.24 Community College Trustees. This appropriation may be used for a temporary statewide
 5.25 project coordinator, stipends to campuses and Head Start centers where letters of intent to
 5.26 officially form a partnership have been signed, engaging with local Head Start programs,
 5.27 and other costs associated with creating campus Head Start partnerships. Stipends shall be
 5.28 used to support the formation of parenting student advisory panels to gather perspective
 5.29 and feedback on proposed partnerships. The duties of the temporary statewide project
 5.30 coordinator include assessing the feasibility of partnerships between Minnesota State Colleges
 5.31 and Universities campuses and Head Start programs across the state, consulting with the
 5.32 Minnesota Head Start Association and existing Head Start partnership programs to develop
 5.33 best practices, working with campus-based navigators for parenting students to provide
 5.34 resources for financial aid and basic needs support to Head Start programs, and developing

6.1 strategies to grow the early childhood care and education workforce through partnerships
6.2 between Head Start programs and early childhood degree and certificate programs. This is
6.3 a onetime appropriation and is available until June 30, 2026.

6.5 **HIGHER EDUCATION POLICY**

6.6 Section 1. **[135A.062] CONSIDERATION OF CRIMINAL RECORDS LIMITED.**

6.7 Subdivision 1. **Applicability.** This section applies to postsecondary institutions under
6.8 section 136A.155, except that the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota is
6.9 requested to comply with this section.

6.10 Subd. 2. **Definition.** As used in this section, "a violent felony or sexual assault" includes
6.11 a felony-level violation or attempted violation of section 609.185; 609.19; 609.195; 609.20;
6.12 609.221; 609.2242, subdivision 4; 609.2247; 609.245, subdivision 1; 609.247, subdivision
6.13 2; 609.282; 609.322; 609.342; 609.343; 609.344; 609.345; 609.3451; 609.3458; 609.561,
6.14 subdivision 1 or 2; 609.582, subdivision 1; 609.66, subdivision 1e; or 609.749.

6.15 Subd. 3. **Consideration of criminal records limited.** A postsecondary institution may
6.16 not inquire into, consider, or require disclosure of the criminal record or criminal history
6.17 of an applicant for admission. After a postsecondary institution has made an offer of
6.18 admission, the postsecondary institution may inquire into, consider, or require disclosure
6.19 of a conviction that occurred within the previous five years for a violent felony or sexual
6.20 assault. The postsecondary institution must provide the applicant with an opportunity to
6.21 submit an explanatory statement, letters of recommendation, evidence of rehabilitation, and
6.22 any other supporting documents. The institution must provide clear and detailed instructions
6.23 and guidance to applicants related to what criminal history requires disclosure. The institution
6.24 must not require the applicant to provide official records of criminal history. A postsecondary
6.25 institution that rescinds an offer of admission must:

6.26 (1) provide an explanation of the basis for the decision to rescind the offer of admission;
6.27 and

6.28 (2) provide the applicant with an opportunity to appeal the decision to rescind.

6.29 Subd. 4. **Other information.** This section shall not prohibit or limit a postsecondary
6.30 institution from inquiring about student conduct records at the applicant's prior postsecondary
6.31 institution after making an offer of admission. This section shall not prohibit or limit a
6.32 postsecondary institution from inquiring about a student's ability to meet licensure
6.33 requirements in a professional program after making an offer of admission.

7.1 Subd. 5. **Limitation on admissibility.** (a) A postsecondary institution that complies
 7.2 with this section is immune from liability in a civil action arising out of the institution's
 7.3 decision to admit a student with a criminal history or the institution's failure to conduct a
 7.4 criminal background check.

7.5 (b) Nothing in this section creates or establishes a legal duty upon a postsecondary
 7.6 institution to inquire into or require disclosure of the criminal history or criminal convictions
 7.7 of a student or an applicant for admission.

7.8 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 136A.29, subdivision 9, is amended to read:

7.9 Subd. 9. **Revenue bonds; limit.** The authority is authorized and empowered to issue
 7.10 revenue bonds whose aggregate principal amount at any time shall not exceed ~~\$1,300,000,000~~
 7.11 \$2,000,000,000 and to issue notes, bond anticipation notes, and revenue refunding bonds
 7.12 of the authority under the provisions of sections 136A.25 to 136A.42, to provide funds for
 7.13 acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, enlarging, remodeling, renovating, improving,
 7.14 furnishing, or equipping one or more projects or parts thereof.

7.15 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 136A.69, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

7.16 Subdivision 1. **Registration fees.** (a) The office shall collect reasonable registration fees
 7.17 that are sufficient to recover, but do not exceed, its costs of administering the registration
 7.18 program. The office shall charge the fees listed in paragraphs (b) ~~and (c)~~ to (d) for new
 7.19 registrations.

7.20 (b) A new school offering no more than one degree at each level during its first year
 7.21 must pay registration fees for each applicable level in the following amounts:

7.22	associate degree	\$2,000
7.23	baccalaureate degree	\$2,500
7.24	master's degree	\$3,000
7.25	doctorate degree	\$3,500

7.26 (c) A new school that will offer more than one degree per level during its first year must
 7.27 pay registration fees in an amount equal to the fee for the first degree at each degree level
 7.28 under paragraph (b), plus fees for each additional nondegree program or degree as follows:

8.3 (d) In addition to the fees under paragraphs (b) and (c), a fee of \$600 must be paid for

8.5 application reminders for the same application or registration requirement; or (2) cumulatively
8.6 has had six revisions, corrections, amendment requests, or application reminders for the
8.7 same license application and the school seeks to continue with the application process with
8.8 additional application submissions. If this fee is paid, the school may submit two final
8.9 application submissions for review prior to application denial under section 136A.65,
8.10 subdivision 8. This provision excludes from its scope any initial process or interpretation
8.11 questions or inquiries, initiated by the school, that do not necessitate substantial staff effort

8.27 The commissioner of corrections shall collect information upon intake about incarcerated
8.28 persons who have self-identified as federal student aid borrowers. The commissioner of
8.29 corrections shall relay this information to the commissioner of higher education. The
8.30 commissioner of corrections, in consultation with the commissioner of higher education,
8.31 shall develop a plan by December 1, 2024, to assist incarcerated persons in enrolling in a
8.32 federal income-driven repayment plan in which there are no monthly payments or accrual
8.33 of interest for borrowers with earnings below the federal poverty guidelines.

9.2 Subdivision 1. **Initial licensure fee.** (a) The office processing fee for an initial licensure
9.3 application is:

9.4 (1) \$2,500 for a private career school that will offer no more than one program during
9.5 its first year of operation;

9.6 (2) \$750 for a private career school licensed exclusively due to the use of the term
9.7 "college," "university," "academy," or "institute" in its name, or licensed exclusively in
9.8 order to participate in state grant or SELF loan financial aid programs; and

9.9 (3) \$2,500, plus \$500 for each additional program offered by the private career school,
9.10 for a private career school during its first year of operation.

9.11 (b) In addition to the fee under paragraph (a), a fee of \$600 must be paid for an initial
9.12 application that: (1) has had four revisions, corrections, amendment requests, or application
9.13 reminders for the same application or licensure requirement; or (2) cumulatively has had
9.14 six revisions, corrections, amendment requests, or application reminders for the same license
9.15 application and the private career school seeks to continue with the application process with
9.16 additional application submissions. If this fee is paid, the private career school may submit
9.17 two final application submissions for review prior to application denial under section
9.18 136A.829, subdivision 1, clause (2). This provision excludes from its scope any initial
9.19 process or interpretation questions or inquiries, initiated by the school, that do not necessitate
9.20 substantial staff effort to review amendments or corrections, or when the office requests
9.21 initial verification or validation of a completed application.

9.22 Sec. 6. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 136A.824, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

9.23 Subd. 2. **Renewal licensure fee; late fee.** (a) The office processing fee for a renewal
9.24 licensure application is:

9.25 (1) for a private career school that offers one program, the license renewal fee is \$1,150;

9.26 (2) for a private career school that offers more than one program, the license renewal
9.27 fee is \$1,150, plus \$200 for each additional program with a maximum renewal licensing
9.28 fee of \$2,000;

9.29 (3) for a private career school licensed exclusively due to the use of the term "college,"
9.30 "university," "academy," or "institute" in its name, the license renewal fee is \$750; and

10.1 (4) for a private career school licensed by another state agency and also licensed with
10.2 the office exclusively in order to participate in state student aid programs, the license renewal
10.3 fee is \$750.

10.4 (b) If a license renewal application is not received by the office by the close of business
10.5 at least 60 days before the expiration of the current license, a late fee of \$100 per business
10.6 day, not to exceed \$3,000, shall be assessed.

10.7 (c) In addition to the fee under paragraph (a), a fee of \$600 must be paid for a renewal
10.8 application that: (1) has had four revisions, corrections, amendment requests, or application
10.9 reminders for the same application or licensure requirement; or (2) cumulatively has had
10.10 six revisions, corrections, amendment requests, or application reminders for the same license
10.11 application and the private career school seeks to continue with the application process with
10.12 additional application submissions. If this fee is paid, the private career school may submit
10.13 two final application submissions for review prior to application denial under section
10.14 136A.829, subdivision 1, clause (2). This provision excludes from its scope any initial
10.15 process or interpretation questions or inquiries, initiated by the school, that do not necessitate
10.16 substantial staff effort to review amendments or corrections, or when the office requests
10.17 initial verification or validation of a completed application.

10.18 **Sec. 7. [241.267] PRISON EDUCATION PARTNERSHIPS.**

10.19 The commissioner may not enter into an agreement or establish a prison education
10.20 partnership with a higher education institution that:

10.21 (1) is organized as a private for-profit postsecondary institution as described in section
10.22 136A.62, subdivision 3, clause (2), item (ii); or

10.23 (2) charges incarcerated students a higher per-credit rate than the rate for nonincarcerated
10.24 students.

10.25 **Sec. 8. [244.60] SUPERVISED RELEASE EMPLOYMENT REQUIREMENT;**
10.26 **POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION.**

10.27 If the commissioner of corrections imposes a requirement on a person placed on
10.28 supervised release that the person work or be employed, the commissioner shall provide
10.29 that enrollment and participation in postsecondary education satisfies this requirement.

10.30 **Sec. 9. REPEALER.**

10.31 Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 241.265; and 609B.311, are repealed."

11.1 Amend the title as follows:

11.2 Page 1, line 3, after the first semicolon, insert "prohibiting postsecondary institutions
11.3 from considering certain criminal records during the application process; providing that
11.4 postsecondary education participation satisfies employment requirements for persons on
11.5 postprison supervised release; providing funds related to child care;"

11.6 Amend the title numbers accordingly

11.7 And when so amended the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Finance.
