


SUD treatment landscape

SUD treatment landscape


- 45 net closures in two years (116 licenses closed, 71 opened)
- Legacy Programs Closed
 - 2 programs opened in the 1970's; 5 programs opened in the 1980's
- Adolescent Programs
 - At least 6 have closed in the last two years
- Impact on Greater MN
 - 2022
 - 42% of full closures were outside of the 7 county metro area
 - 2023
 - 41% of full closures were outside of the 7 county metro area
 - 63% (5 of 8) of full Residential closures were outside of the 7 county metro area





- 77% of respondents were direct care staff (counselors, nurses, techs, etc)

How long have your worked in the SUD field 625 responses




Burnout: In the past 12 months, have you considered leaving the SUD field? 625 responses



SUD workforce Survey: Burnout

- How likely are you to leave in the next 12 months?
 - 75% will not, probably won't leave
 - 25% will, probably will leave



- low amount of stress
- moderate but manageable
- high, slight impact on personal and/or professional functioning
- unbearable, significant impact on personal and/or professional functioning

When asked what the one thing is that causes the most stress, the top 4 answers were:

SUD workforce Survey: Stress

- Caseload/Program needs
- Paperwork
- Not enough staff/inexperienced
- Client Acuity




SUD workforce Survey: Hope

- Nearly 80% of responses were moderately to very hopeful for the future of SUD in the coming years
 - Our workers are a resilient group!
 - Immediate and long-term structural changes are needed from both a policy and funding standpoint



SUD Treatment Admissions CY1995-CY2021



Primary Substance at Admission to SUD Treatment Services for Adults CY1995 - CY2021



Opioid Overdose Deaths


Opioid-involved overdose deaths among Minnesotans increased 43% from 2020 to 2021, and the number of deaths has more than doubled since 2019.





In 2021, American Indians were 10X as likely to die from an overdose, Black Minnesotans 3x....


In 2021, American Indian Minnesotans were ten times as likely to die from a drug overdose than white Minnesotans. Black Minnesotans were more than three times as likely to die from drug overdose than white Minnesotans.





SUD reimbursement rates


Residential SUD: cost vs. current rate

Defined for x.5, x.7, and Level 4



SUD reimbursement rates

- Rates—you get what you pay for
 - To develop a continuum based on ASAM, investments are needed.
 - Since 2011, SUD base rates have increased 3%
 - The 20% and 25% increase for 1115 enrollment has not covered the cost to deliver the service
 - SUD rate study recommendations identify an average increase of more than 65%
- We need both immediate and long-term structural improvements made
- These policy and budget proposals were identified and developed by more than 240 SUD professionals across the state. They know what is needed, now we need action!



Policy Proposals SF3984 / HF4149

- Expand alternative paths to licensure [Section 1]
- ASAM certification/Alternative Licensing Inspections [Section 2]
- Eliminate ratios to align with ASAM [Sections 3 and 5]
 - i. Medical and mental health staffing
 - ii. Residential engagement documentation
 - iii.Federal holidays off for counselors



Policy Proposals SF3984 / HF4149

- County Affidavit for BHF [Section 4]
- Hard deadline for paperwork reduction of December 2024 [Section 6]



Budget Proposals SF4276 / HF4190

- Waiving Fees for IDs (Sections 1, 2, and 3)
 - Birth certificate and driver's license/ID card
- SUD rates
 - Develop group peer rate (section 4 and 5)
 - "Unstrike" SUD and be included in 3% increase effective Jan. 1, 2024 (section 7)
 - Auto inflation adjustment (section 7)
 - Implement rate methodology recommendations ASAP (section 11)
 - Hold harmless WM 3.2; maintain clients with children enhancement until a cost based rate is established.



Budget Proposals SF4276 / HF4190

- SUD Treatment Effectiveness (Section 6)
 - Create an SUD data dashboard
- Extend rate study to include adolescent SUD (residential/non-residential, Withdrawal Management) and Room and Board payments (section 8)



Budget Proposals SF4276 / HF4190

- 1115 Waiver for Incarceration (section 9)
- Transition Support Workgroup (Section 10)
 - Develop recommendations related to housing, food support, childcare, and transportation services for people transitioning out of SUD services
