Chair Latz and members of the Senate Judiciary and Public Safety committee,

The Minnesota Council on Disability strongly supports SF 5097, a bill that aims to fortify the rights of parents with disabilities in Minnesota. It demands that challenges to parental rights must be based on concrete evidence of behavior that could endanger a child, not on the presence of a disability. This bill emphasizes the importance of supportive parenting services as a first step in addressing concerns, thereby upholding the right of people with disabilities to be parents and ensuring their children have the opportunity to grow up in loving, supportive homes.

By supporting SF 5097, you are not just advocating for a change in law but for the protection of fundamental rights. This legislation will ensure that parents with disabilities are afforded the same rights and judged by the same standards as non-disabled parents. It is a critical move towards fairness, equality, and the best interests of children.
