

#### **BWSR Structure**










# Lawns to Legumes M.S. 103B.104

Reimburses residents \$400 for creating new pollinator habitat in their yards

10,000 projects installed since 2019

Projects in all 87
Minnesota counties








# Habitat Enhancement Landscape Program (HELP) M.S. 103B.106

Provides financial and technical assistance to establish and enhance habitat on existing conservation lands, such as easements

**\$3.4 million** awarded to 12 organizations and governments last year





# Habitat Friendly Utilities M.S. 103B.105

Provides financial and technical assistance to establish habitat within solar, wind, pipeline and electrical transmission corridors





## Pollinator Funding Update

2023/2024 One-time Appropriations	Status
Lawns to Legumes – \$4 million (2023); \$800K (2024)	\$361K remaining; 10,000 individual cost- share projects supported; 10 pathway grants awarded Applications for fall plantings currently open
Habitat Enhancement Landscape Program - \$4 million	\$315K remaining; 12 grants awarded to communities
Habitat Friendly Utilities - \$1 million	\$470K remaining; Technical Assistance and pilot projects

Pollinator Account	Status
Anticipate \$940K per year	Technical Assistance, Cost-sharing



# Soil Health Practices Program M.S. 103F.06



- Voluntary and locally-led
- Practices on sensitive lands to slow water and address surface and groundwater quality.
- Provides climate resiliency and carbon sequestration.
- Achieved through local staffing, outreach and education, and on-theground implementation.





### Policy - Drainage Work Group

The Drainage Work Group's purpose revolves around two overarching points:

- Foster science-based mutual understanding about drainage topics and issues; and
- 2) Develop consensus recommendations for drainage system management and related water management, including recommendations for updating Minnesota Statutes Chapter 103E Drainage and related provisions.

#### 2025 Consensus Recommendation:

• Repeal of duplicative buffer strips reporting requirement - 103E.067
