Creating New Hands-On Learning Experiences

The museum's open-ended, self-directed learning experiences give kids the space and freedom to explore their interests, solve problems and build life skills.

- New exhibits that nurture social emotional and early STEM skills
- New activities that focus on creativity and imagination
- Facilitated programming throughout the museum to amplify learning and engagement


Deepening Community Engagement

- Create a community liaison network to ensure diverse input into experiences and programming

FY24 Legacy-Funded Highlights

Monsters on Summer Vacation: A "monster takeover" featured activities to strengthen courage and coordination, explore feelings and tackle challenges.



Wags & Wiggles Pet Clinic: Budding vets admit "patients," examine animals and groom pets in a new experience that focuses on cultivating empathy and adult-child interactions.

The Mud Zone: A mud kitchen and mud launchers provided opportunities for sensory play, experimentation and critical thinking in a quintessential childhood experience.

The Studio: A redesign made this maker space more flexible, improved visitor flow and increased the time families spend imagining and creating.

FY25 Accomplishments & Plans

Exhibit Updates: Updates are coming to the popular fire station in *Our World* and water activities in *Forces at Play.* Also in the works are new iterations of the *Imaginopolis* and *Creativity Jam* exhibits. *The Studio* will see new materials and activities change every three or four months.

Other Programs: Visitors will enjoy more staff-facilitated experiences, which enhance learning. Summer 2025 will feature experiences and programs that amplify cultural competency.

Deepen Community Engagement

FY24-25 Accomplishments & Plans

The museum used Legacy funds to relaunch family nights, which provide free after-hours events for partner organizations that serve families in need and under-represented communities.

Highlights from FY24:

- The museum hosted seven family nights, serving more than 1,600 children and adults
- The museum partnered with more then 30 BIPOC affinity groups to host three events, serving more an 800 visitors

In FY25, the museum is hosting additional free events for Head Start providers and other community organizations.
