Hmong and Lao people started relocating to Minnesota after the Vietnam War in 1975.



Based on 2020 data, the Hmong American population in Minnesota was about 90,000, and it was the largest ethnic Asian group in the state. The Hmong community has significantly influenced Minnesota's culture, contributing to its diverse landscape. Approximately 94.6 % live in the Twin Cities and approximately 40 % (32,000) live in the Greater East Side Saint Paul. The Hmong community in Minnesota

has a significant economic impact, with an estimated \$2 billion economy encompassing a billion dollars in buying power, 35,000 workers, 9,000 businesses, and Hmong Minnesotans paying an estimated \$138 million in state and local taxes.

Hmong people have all started to make Minnesota their homes. They are living and working in our communities, supporting businesses, creating investment opportunities. Hmong people are helping to grow Minnesota.



INCOME GROWTH: The Minnesota Tax Incidence Study Over the years estimates that a typical Minnesotan household pays around 11-12 percent of their income on state and local taxes. Based on the tax incidence studies we can estimate that the growth in tax payments by the Hmong community in Minnesota grew from an annual \$34 million in 2000 to around \$286 million in 2021.



The SE Asian Music Festival (SEAMF) is the 50-year celebration of Hmong and Lao music. The plan is to organize and host a music festival on the East side of Saint Paul by bringing Hmong, Lao and other SE Asian music artists to showcase traditional and modern music. This event will contribute to positive

economic impact to the region and promote Minnesota's cultural significance.
