Dale Wakasugi Testimony

Senate File 1457

Good afternoon, Chair Kunesh and members of the Senate Education Finance Committee. I am Dale Wakasugi, a heart attack and cardiac arrest survivor, resident of Woodbury, Minnesota, a community advocate on behalf of the American Heart Association and owner of MY AED & CPR Solutions.

I am pleased to be here today to offer my support for Senate File 1457, legislation that would require school districts and charter schools to create Cardiac Emergency Response Plans. I suffered a heart attack in 1986 when I was 36 years old due to a blockage of my left anterior descending artery. I was a very active non-drinker, non-smoker who played college baseball.

In 2007, while refereeing a high school basketball game, I suffered cardiac arrest. One of my heroes that day was Lindsey Paradise, an 11th grader who knew how to perform CRP and use an AED from learning about it in health class just a few weeks before.

When cardiac arrest occurs outside of a hospital, survival more than doubles when people nearby act by dialing 911, starting CPR and using a publicly available AED compared to waiting for emergency responders to arrive. I support Senate File 1457, because we need to ensure that all schools have Cardiac Emergency Response Plans in place and practiced so anyone who suffers a cardiac arrest, whether it be a student, teacher, school administrator or members of the community can receive the life-saving treatment they need.

I want to thank Senator Westlin for authoring this important legislation. Thank you, Chair Kunesh and members of the committee, for your consideration of this bill.
