

Senate Transportation Committee – Potential other areas of interest

- **§4.076** – Advisory Council on Traffic Safety
- **§§13.69; 13.6905; 13.72; 13.721** – Public Safety Department Data, Oil and hazardous substances transportation data, Transportation Department and Transit Data, Other Transportation Data
- **§§16B.357- 16B.359** – Minnesota Advisory Council on Infrastructure
- **§§16B.531 – 16B.581** – State travel, state vehicles, tax exempt license plates
- **§41.30** – Sustainable aviation fuel tax credits
 - **Note:** Likely under the primary jurisdiction of the Agriculture, Rural Development, Broadband, and Veterans Committee
 - Enacted in 2023's Transportation Finance and Policy Omnibus (Ch. 68)
- **§65B.28** – Accident prevention course premium reduction
 - See Laws 2024, Chapter 104, Article 1, Section 3
- **§65B.472** – Transportation network financial responsibility – insurance requirements
 - **Note:** This issue is under the primary jurisdiction of the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee
- **Chapter 80E** – Motor vehicle sales and distribution
 - **Note:** These issues are under the primary jurisdiction of the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee
- **Chapters 84 and 86** govern recreational vehicles; off-highway vehicles; off-highway motorcycles; water safety; and watercraft under the Department of Natural Resources
 - **Note:** These issues are under the primary jurisdiction of the Environment, Climate, and Legacy Committee
- **§115E.042** – Preparedness and response activities for certain railroads carrying oil and hazardous substances
- **§§123B.84 – 123B.93** – Student transportation; school buses; school bus safety training
 - **Note:** These issues are under the primary jurisdiction of the Education Policy committee
- **§123B.935** – Active Transportation safety training for K-8 students
- **Chapter 144E** governs the Office of Emergency Medical Services and ambulance services
 - **Note:** These issues are under the primary jurisdiction of the Health and Human Services committee
- **Chapter 181C** governs employment and labor provisions relating to transportation network companies
 - **Note:** Enacted in 2024 (Laws 2024, Chapter 127, Article 17), likely under the jurisdiction of the Labor Committee

- **§216I.05** – Designating sites and routes – route permits issued by the Public Utilities Commission
 - **Note:** Enacted in 2024, becomes effective July 1, 2025. Under the primary jurisdiction of the Energy, Utilities, Environment, and Climate Committee
 - See Laws 2024, Chapter 127, Article 3, Sections 17 to 23 for Transportation interaction
- **§239.7511** – Gas tax sign on retail petroleum dispensers
 - **Note:** Under the primary jurisdiction of the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee
- **§256B.0625, subdivision 17** – state-administered nonemergency medical transportation service
- **§289A.51** – Electric-assisted bicycle refund
 - **Enacted in 2023’s Transportation Finance and Policy Omnibus (Ch. 68)**
 - **Note:** SF 219 was referred to Taxes on Thursday, January 16
- **Chapter 325** – Consumer Protection; Products and Sales
 - **Note:** These issues are under the primary jurisdiction of the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee
 - Includes: electric vehicle infrastructure, the sale of used motor vehicles, the purchase of new motor vehicles and the manufacturer’s duty to repair, sale of electric-assisted bicycles and other electric cycles (see Laws 2024, Ch. 127, Art. 3, Sec. 95)
- **§§342.35 – 342.36** – Cannabis transport licensing and operations
 - **Note:** Under the primary jurisdiction of the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee
 - See Senate Transportation Committee, February 13, 2023
- **Chapter 430** – Pedestrian malls and parking lots
 - See Laws 2024, Chapter 127, Article 3, Secs. 97-104
- **Chapter 609 and Chapter 624 – Criminal Code**
 - Certain offenses pertain to transportation – motor vehicles, rail, or transit (609.855)– traffic laws have primary jurisdiction in Transportation (Ch. 169)
 - Issues arising under Chapter 169A have primary jurisdiction in Judiciary and Public Safety
