Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 171.0605, subdivision 2, is amended to read: 1.6 Subd. 2. Evidence; identity; date of birth. (a) Only the following is satisfactory evidence 1.7 of an applicant's identity and date of birth under section 171.06, subdivision 3, paragraph 1.8 (b): 1.9 (1) a driver's license or identification card that: 1.10 (i) complies with all requirements of the REAL ID Act; 1.11 (ii) is not designated as temporary or limited term; and 1.12 (iii) is current or has been expired for five years or less; 1.13 (2) a valid, unexpired United States passport, including a passport booklet or passport 1.14 card, issued by the United States Department of State; 1.15 (3) a certified copy of a birth certificate issued by a government bureau of vital statistics 1.16 or equivalent agency in the applicant's state of birth, which must bear the raised or authorized 1.17 seal of the issuing government entity; 1.18 (4) a consular report of birth abroad, certification of report of birth, or certification of 1.19 birth abroad, issued by the United States Department of State, Form FS-240, Form DS-1350, 1.20

 4.7 clause, or for a longer minimum period of time applicable under section 169A.53, 169A.54,

- (b) The department shall immediately revoke the school bus endorsement of a driver
 upon receiving a record of the driver's conviction of the misdemeanor offense described in
