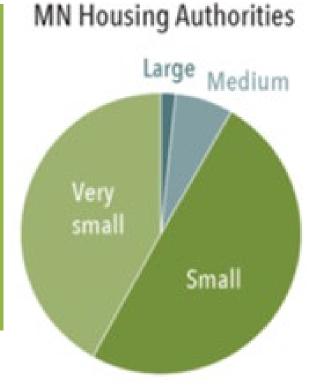

65% are seniors or persons with disabilities

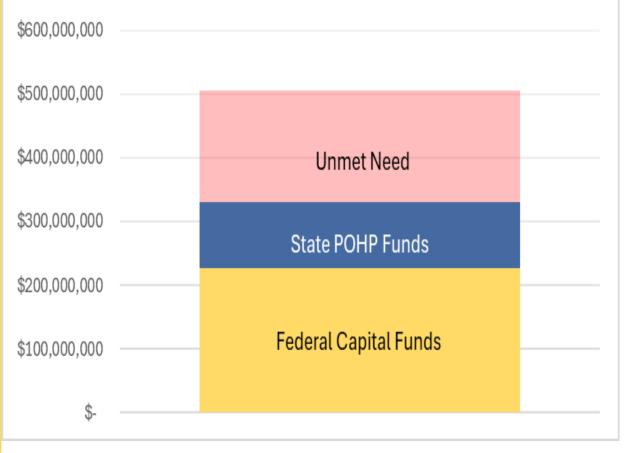
1/3 are children, many at high risk of homelessness

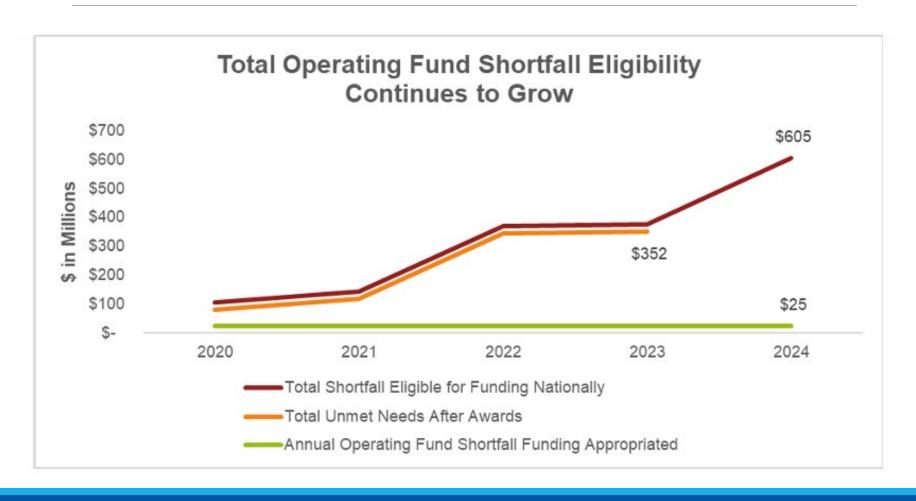

Jordan Tower





Window Improvement Project

- ADA-compliant windows requiring less than 5 pounds operating force to open and close.
- \$1.2 million dollar project.
- HRA received close to a million dollars in funding through general obligation bonds provided through Minnesota Housing Finance Agencies POHP program in 2014.

Boiler and Air Handler Project

- Replaced the two boilers and air handlers in Jordan Tower I.
- These systems were original to the building when it was built in 1974.
- POHP 2017 funding
- Total cost was \$729,000 with \$542,500 from POHP.

St. Paul Public Housing Agency

Large Public Housing Agency

4,254 PHA-owned units (418 Low-Income Public Housing and 3,836 Multifamily PBRA)

5,243 Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8)

Provide deeply affordable housing opportunities to over 22,000 residents (about 7% of the population of St. Paul)

70% of St. Paul PHA's multifamily residents are elderly, have a disability or both

Average income of multifamily households is under \$19,000 per year

St. Paul Public Housing Agency

Dunedin Terrace

- Seven-year project
- \$6 million from HUD's Capital Fund Program
- \$3 million from POHP

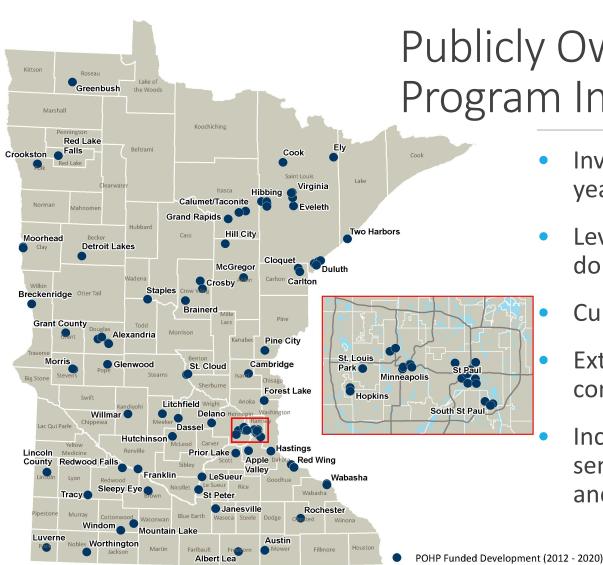
Current POHP

Midtowne Manor II – Windows, exterior wall panels, and insulation (in process) \$2,880,100

<u>Upcoming CASH POHP round</u> for repositioned properties (will be applying for these projects)

Tri-Towers – Fire pump replacement; Bathroom waste line stacks

King Manor – Air Handler Unit replacements, Bathroom and Kitchen waste line stacks



Publicly Owned Housing Program Impacts

- Invested \$100.5 million over 5 years of allocations.
- Leveraged federal and local dollars.
 - Cured health and safety concerns.
- Extended the life of 134 community assets.
 - Increased the pride 10,330 seniors, persons with disabilities, and families have in their home.

Public Housing Rehabilitation Funding in 2025

\$100 Million of General Obligation Bonds

Fund Public Housing Rehabilitation to preserve and improve publicly owned housing,

- a critical community asset
- provides stable homes for our most vulnerable residents
- Safety and stability for seniors, children, and those with disabilities

General Obligation Bonds leverages federal subsidies and preserves our housing infrastructure
