In Minnesota in 2023, Kids In Need Foundation supported over **110,292 students** and **4,820 teachers** in approximately **351 under-resourced schools** across **20 counties**. 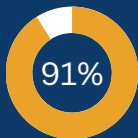

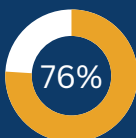

IMPACT ON STUDENTS

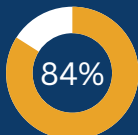

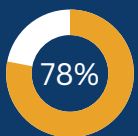

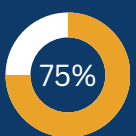

Project Summary

Kids In Need Foundation is seeking a local government partner or economic development authority to help develop a 60,000-square-foot distribution center for teachers and students. The project seeks to repurpose an existing property into a multifaceted facility encompassing the MN Teacher Resource Center & volunteer center (13,000 sq ft), school supply warehouse (35,000 sq ft), general office space (12,000 sq ft) .

The facility supports specialized programs like RISE: Rural and Indigenous School Equity, directly addressing the unique challenges faced by these communities. The expanded infrastructure will enable KINF to offer increased support to a greater number of students and an increased number of communities across the state.



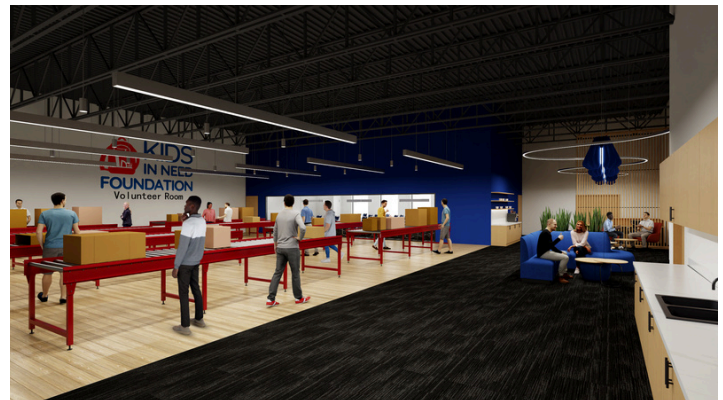
Infrastructure Expansion:

Investment from the state will contribute to acquiring and repurposing an existing building, providing a centralized facility to address the need to reach teachers and students throughout the entire state.



Teacher Resource Center:

Expanded facilities will increase access for more teachers to our Teacher Resource Center, a retail store setting where teachers from the most underserved schools “shop” for supplies at no cost. The center will also serve as a training site for teacher workshops, continuing education, and professional development.



Community Engagement:

The investment will expand our volunteer center, where community members can assist hands-on by packing school supply kits for underserved students and teachers.



RISE: Rural and Indigenous School Equity

The new facility will provide expanded space and resources, allowing Kids In Need Foundation to efficiently scale its' warehouse operations to support the RISE program, dedicated to closing the opportunity gap in Rural and Indigenous communities.
