In the Matter of a Proposed New Rule Part Relating to Fees For Examination, Licensure, License Renewal, Late Renewal STATEMENT OF NEED
AND REASONABLENESS

The above captioned rule part is an amendment to the existing rules of the Minnesota Board of Psychology (hereinafter 'Board').

- 1. The legal authority for promulgating this amendment to existing rules is contained in Minn. Stat. S 148.90, subd. 2(4) (1984), which grants the Board the authority to make rules necessary to effectuate the provisions of the licensing law.
- 2. The rule part captioned above is being adopted according to the procedures set forth in Minn. Stat. S 16A.128. A copy of the approval of the commissioner of finance is attached.
- 3. The Board has proposed this rule part to establish fees to ensure that the Board generates sufficient revenue to cover a deficit incurred in fiscal year 1985 and anticipated additional costs in fiscal year 1986 due to involuntary relocation to other quarters.
- 4. It has been determined that Minn. Stat. SS 14.11, subd.2, 17.80 to 16.84 (sic), 115.43, subd. 1, 116.07, subd. 6, and 144A.29 do not apply to this proposed rule part; therefore the Statement of Need and Reasonableness does not address the topics referenced in those statutes. In the event that Minn. Stat. S 14.115 (1984)should be interpreted as applying, notice of the intent to adopt rules without a public hearing has been published in the Minnesota Psychologist, newsletter of the Minnesota Psychological Association.

Further need is set forth in the Statement of Reasonableness which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

STATEMENT OF REASONABLENESS
For Proposed Rule Part 7200.6100

Except for an increase in the Application for Admission to Examination fee in April, 1984, which was necessitated by an increase in the cost of the examination, there has been no need for fee increases since the summer of 1981. Steady growth in the number of persons paying fees has allowed the Board to operate on existing fees in the face of rising costs.

However, a sharp increase in the amount of service required of and received from the Attorney General's office in fiscal year 1985, couple with increased Board activity (per diem and in-state expenses) resulted in a year-end shortfall of approximately \$25,000. That amount must be generated through revenues in fiscal year 1986, since by law regulatory boards are not supported by taxes but must generate in fees sufficient revenue to cover direct budget items plus indirect costs for state services. The existing fee structure is insufficient to cover the shortfall in addition to the approved expenses for 1986.

In addition, the Department of Health is forcing the health-related licensing boards to relocate to another building, which will increase both the square-foot cost of rent and the total amount of space occupied. The Boards are scheduled to move by January 1, 1986. It is anticipated that rental and related costs will increase by approximately \$7,000, plus moving costs.

Further, if attorneys' services continue at the rate provided in 1985 - which is highly likely - it is possible that expenditures for legal fees were underestimated when the budget for fiscal year 1986 was formulated early last year.

It is anticipated that the increased revenue generated by raising fees

will be very close to the amount of additional expenditures to be incurred in fiscal year 1986, which were not known at the time the budget was approved, plus covering the shortfall from fiscal year 1985.

Table I below indicates the amount of additional revenue anticipated from the fee increases.

It should be noted that the numbers paying the various fees have been pro-rated from the full year totals since the fee increases will take effect approximately four months after the fiscal year began.

Should there be some question as to why the fee increase for licensure is \$50 and for examination is only \$15, analysis has shown that the existing fee for licensure is probably too low to cover all the expenses related to the activity plus the activity's share of overhead. Staff and Board time required for the average application for licensure is about four times the staff and Board time required for the average examination application. Since \$90 of the examination application fee is set aside for

purchase of the examination from the testing service, the remaining portion will now roughly correspond to the licensure fee with respect to cost of processing.

The bulk of new revenue will come from renewal fees, which is justified by the fact that the increase in legal costs is directly related to the number of complaints against licensees. The yearly count of complaints is now roughly three times the number of complaints filed in the year the fee was last increased (1981). Because the complaints are against the practice of licensees, it is logical that fees for continuing in private practice in Minnesota should bear the cost of processing those complaints.

It should be noted that the Board is proposing no increase in the fee for late renewal of license, partly because the number of licensees paying late is so small that even a large percentage increase would raise very little revenue, and partly because the fee is intended as a deterrent rather than as a revenue producer.

With respect to the possible applicabilty of Minn. Stat. S 14.115 to the increase in fees for maintaining licensure to practice in Minnesota, small businesses are affected by the increase only if the business pays the renewal fee for the individual who is licensed, rather than the individual licensee paying the fee from his/her personal funds.

Attached is a copy of the approval of the fee increase from the Department of Finance.

The fee increases are needed to cover a FY 1985 shortfall in receipts of \$26,300, which resulted from an LAC request in June for unanticipated attorneys' fees and per diem payments to Board members; the costs of relocating to new office space, necessitated by the Health Department requiring the office space presently occupied by the health-related licensing boards; and the cost of Revisor's services mandated by Laws Minnesota 1985, Chapter 1SP13.

It is anticipated that the fee increases will generate approximately \$37,600 in additional revenue and will cover the following costs:
