

On this 26th day of May, 1915, Governor Eberhart  
Guly issued and caused to be filed in the Executive Depart-  
ment of the State of Minnesota proclamation as follows:

PROCLAMATION.

It is with a spirit of consecration deeper than  
ever before that the American people will this year pay  
their tribute to the members of the Grand Army of the  
Republic. That tribute to the veterans will be the more  
genuine and the more sincere because, with the lapse of  
time, a more proper perspective of the deeds they accom-  
plished and the great national purposes brought about is  
obtained by those of us who are living. As the ranks of  
the living become thinner, as the hosts of those who have  
answered the last roll call become greater, but as with  
each succeeding year we pay greater honor to the grand army  
of the dead, so our regard for the grizzled veterans who  
survive becomes more infinitely tender and more genuinely  
considerate. This year the surviving members of the Grand  
Army will gather on the battlefield of Gettysburg to commemo-  
rate the greatest battle of the Civil War and to consecrate  
again the field where so many lives were sacrificed to secure  
the principle upon which the Republic was founded.

Accordingly all events conspire to make the Memorial  
Day of this year one of unusual beauty and interest. It is  
not only the memory of the soldiers and sailors of '61 we  
shall honor this year but tribute will be paid to the soldiers  
of a later war. The veterans of the Spanish-American conflict

will be honored with those who wore the gray blue in the war of the great rebellion. It is a beautiful custom which prompts us to scatter flowers upon the graves of those who have gone beyond, but we should not forget that the flowers are for the living even more than for the dead. Let us honor the thinning ranks of the Grand Army veterans with more than ordinary tribute. The combined emotions of patriotism, of reverence and of love should prompt us to consecrate to their memory the date of May 30th so that the great deeds of those who fought that our country might be what it is may not be forgotten by those who are the beneficiaries of their great service.

WHEREFORE, I, Adolph O. Eberhart, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do issue this proclamation and urge the observance of Friday, May 30th, 1915, as

EMERSON AND MEMORIAL DAY.
