

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That whereas the members of the International Typographical Union of North America, an unincorporated association or union of workingmen, having its headquarters and principal office in the City of Indianapolis, in Marion County, in the State of Indiana, have since the fourth day of August, 1896, to wit: on the 7th day of March, 1911, become and are now members of the International Allied Printing Trades Association, an unincorporated association or union of workingmen and workingwomen, composed of the members of said International Typographical Union of North America, and of the members of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union, the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders, the International Stereotypers and Electrotypers' Union and the International Photo-Engravers' Union, all of the members of said unions, the members of which are also members of International Allied Printing Trades Association, are jointly engaged in producing goods, wares, merchandise and other products of labor, and

Whereas one of the objects and purposes of said International Allied Printing Trades Association is to designate and distinguish by a label, trade-mark, term, design or device the products of the labor of members of said International Allied Printing Trades Association and to that end adopt, file and register such label, term, design or device or a copy, counterpart or fac simile of the same.

Therefore the said International Typographical Union of North America, for and in consideration of the sum of one (\$1.00) dollar and other good and valuable considerations, has this day bargained, sold, conveyed, assigned, released and relinquished and does by these presents, bargain, sell, convey, assign, release and relinquish to said International Allied Printing Trades Association all its right, title, in-

terest and claim in and to the label, trade-mark, term, design and device for the "Allied Printing Trades Council Label" adopted and used by said International Typographical Union of North America and its members for the purpose of designating and distinguishing any goods, wares, merchandise and other products of the labor of said International Typographical Union of North America and its members when produced or prepared in connection with members of said International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union, International Brotherhood of Bookbinders, International Stereotypers and Electrotypers' Union and International Photo-Engravers' Union, and copies, counterparts or fac similes of which were filed for record and recorded in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Minnesota on the 4th day of August, 1896, pursuant to the laws of the State of Minnesota, the said International Allied Printing Trades Association to have and hold said label, trade-mark, term, design and device for its own use and behoof forever for the purpose of designating and distinguishing any goods, wares, merchandise and other products of labor as having been made, manufactured, produced or prepared by members of said International Allied Printing Trades Association, which said counterparts, copies or fac similes of such label, trade-mark, term, design or device bargained sold, conveyed, transferred, assigned, released and relinquished to said International Allied Printing Trades Association is commonly known as the "Allied Printing Trades Council Label" and consists of an imprint of lines, words and characters and is described as follows:

An oblong bar, with segments of a circle arranged above and below said bar in an oval form and with a smaller figure substantially circular in form, in the center of said

bar. In that portion of the oval above the bar appear the words "Allied Printing;" on the bar appear the words "Trades Council;" in the circular shaped central figure appear the words "Union Label;" in that portion of the oval below the bar appears the name of the city or town in which may be located the local Allied Printing Trades Council of said International Allied Printing Trades Association issuing and using said label, trade-mark, design and device. The whole is arranged substantially as shown in the following fac simile.

A copy, counterpart, or fac simile of said label, trade-mark, term, design or device is as follows:



and which said label, trade-mark, term, design or device is also described as follows:

A small round field in white, bearing the words "Union Label" and a monogram or central device, while arching above the round field and its black background are two parallel curvilinear lines, and between these two lines are the words "Allied Printing." Extending to the left of central field is a horizontal bar, on which is the word "Trades," while a similar horizontal bar is extended to the right of said field, bearing the word "Council." Underneath the central field and making an ellipse with the upper arc are two parallel curvilinear lines forming the arc of a circle, which is designed to be occupied with or having the name of city, town or county in which an Allied Printing Trades Council may be located. While different styles and arrangements of type and lines may be made, yet the essential features are the words "Allied Printing Trades Council" and "Union Label" arranged as may be desired and deemed most satisfactory.

Both of said descriptions cover the same label, trade-mark, term, design or device.


But it is hereby expressly agreed and understood that said International Typographical Union of North America reserves to itself the ownership and all right, title and interest in and to any and all other labels, trade-marks, terms, designs and devices which have been filed as required by law for the purpose of designating and distinguishing any goods, wares, merchandise or other products of labor, as having been made, manufactured, produced and prepared by said International Typographical Union of North America, its subordinate unions, and members, when such goods, wares, merchandise or other products of labor are not produced conjointly with the members of any other union or association of workmen, more particularly the registry of the label, trade-mark, design and device of said International Typographical Union of North America commonly known as the "Typographical Union Label" filed and recorded in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Minnesota on the 28th day of May, 1896, by said International Typographical Union of North America, which registry and label, trade-mark, design and device shall be and remain in full force and effect, for the benefit of said International Typographical Union of North America and its members, it being adopted and used to designate and distinguish a class of work, goods, wares, and merchandise and other products of labor produced and prepared alone by a member or members of said International Typographical Union of North America, and not conjointly with any other members of said International Allied Printing Trades Association and the said label, trade-mark, design and device hereby assigned and transferred to said International Allied Printing Trades Associa-

tion was adopted and used to designate and distinguish work, goods, wares and merchandise and other products of labor produced and prepared by the labor of members belonging to two or more of said International Associations or Unions, the members of which are now members of said International Allied Printing Trades Association.

In witness whereof the said International Typographical Union of North America by James M. Lynch, its President, by the order of the Executive Council of said International Typographical Union of North America, has hereunto set its hand and caused its seal to be hereunto affixed this 19th day of June, 1912.


