PROCLAMATION.

Minnesota has assumed a position of leadership in the warfare against the plague of tuberculosis. Having attained this position of leadership in one of the noblest causes that can engage and interest human endeavor, our state must not fall behind.

Sunday, December 7th, has been set aside by the National Association for the study and prevention of tuberculosis as National Tuberculosis Day. The purpose in view is to attract nationwide and state-wide attention to the efforts that are being made to stamp out the ravages of this dread disease through observance in churches, lodges, organizations, and so forth. The cause is one that should appeal to every human heart. A vigorous fight waged year after year will overcome the incursions of this disease.

Minnesota is one of the healthiest states in the Union, but here as elsewhere we find evidences of the ravages of tuberculosis. There are few of us who have not had our attention called to the sufferings of one or more victims. I wish to supplement a recommendation which I made to the Legislature of 1911 "that the agencies now in operation must be materially augmented." Eternal vigilance in this warfare is the price of success.

THEREFORE, I, Adolph O. Eberhart, Governor of Minnesota, hereby designate

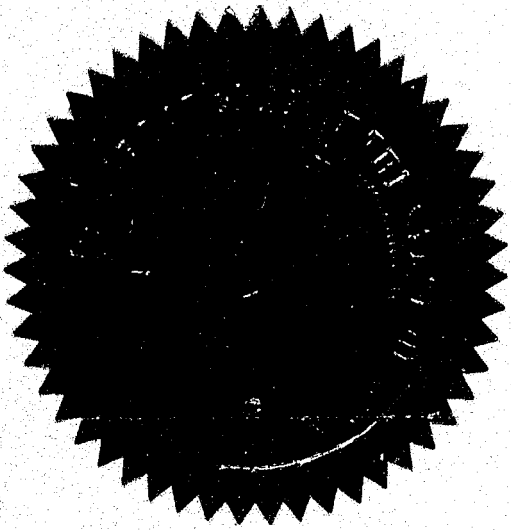
