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A Preclamation for Votorans Day

- THEREAS, it has long been a national sustem to commonorate November 11, the anniversary of the ending of World War I, by paying tribute to the heroes of that tragic struggle and by rededicating ourselves to the causes of peace; and
- THEREAS, in the intervening years the United States has been involved in two other great military conflicts, which have added militans of veterans, living and dead, to the honor relis of this nation; and
- THERMAS, the Congress passed a concurrent resolution on June 4, 1926 (44 Stat. 1982) calling for the observance of November 11 with appropriate ceremonies, and later provided in an Act approved May 13, 1938 (52 Stat. 351), that the cleventh of November should be a legal holiday and should be known as Armittice Day; and
- VIEREAS, in order to expand the significance of that commomoration and in order that a grateful nation might pay appropriate homage to the veterans of all its wars who have contributed so much to the preservation of this nation, the Congress, by an Act approved June 1, 1954 (68 Stat. 168), changed the name of the holiday to Veterans Eay:

NOW, THEMSFORM, I, Ofvillo L. Froman, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do horoby preclaim November 11, 1955 as

VETERANS DAY

and call upon all citizens to solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly, on the ceas, in the air, and on foreign shores, to preserve our heritage of freedom, and let us reconscorate ourselves to the takk of promoting an enduring peace so that their efforts chall not have been in vain.

IN VITNESS VIEREDF, I have hereunte set my hand and caused the Great feal of the State of Minnesota to be affixed at the State Capitol this nineteenth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fiftyfive and of the State, the ninety-eighth.
