AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE
BOUNDARIES OF THE VILLAGE

Beginning at the southeast corner of said section 25, thence north along the east line of said section 25 to the 4's section corner between sections 25 and 28 in said township, thence west along the north line of Lot 5 aforesaid to the northwest corner of said Lot 8, thence south along the west lines of said tots 5 and 8 of said section 25 to the southwest corner of said Lot 8 thence east along the south line of said Lot 8 to the point of commencement, forming one contiguous tract and containing 74.22 acres, more or less.
