RESOLUTIVE PROCLAIMED

A Proclamation for "Memorial Day for Baltic Deportees to Soviet Slave Labor Camps"

WHEREAS, on the single night of June 14, 1941, over 50,000 Latvians, Estonians and Lithuanians were ferociously taken from their homes and deported into slave labor camps by the Soviet Union; and

WHEREAS, every year since that time, Baltic people throughout the free world have commemorated this shocking act by participating in special church services and meetings in memory of their homeland friends and neighbors; and

WHEREAS, following their independence from Russia in 1918, the Baltic peoples have shown a real love for freedom, and by cooperative and hard work have achieved a good measure of economic well-being, a high standard of social justice, and have won world wide respect as exemplary members of the family of nations; and

WHEREAS, these Baltic peoples, in the face of every oppression, retain their will to be free and maintain their steadfast opposition to Soviet despotism;

BEFORE, WHEREAS, I, Orville L. Freeman, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim June 14, 1956, as


"MEMORIAL DAY FOR BALTIC DEPORTEES


TO SOVIET SLAVE LABOR CAMPS"


