We of America have builded and are building the greatest country the world has ever known. It is great not only in territory and in resources but above all, it is great in its ideals of living, its tolerations, its opportunities, its purposes and its aspirations. It is the melting pot of the world, a country conceived in the idea of political and personal liberty and destined to carry that ideal so long as progress shall see in it a fitting instrumentality for its purpose. The stars and stripes is the emblem of all that we as Americans feel that our country is and should be.

It is fitting and proper, therefore, that the people of the State pause for a moment in contemplation of our national colors and renew allegiance to the flag we love so much. I therefore, proclaim
