Recommendation for the Day After Tomorrow Act

Article, for more than four decades the Day After Tomorrow Act has been a milestone to girls, women of eighteen years of age, of every race, religion and economic status, international activities which stress the value of the individual in relation to herself, her family, her community and the world in which she lives; and

Article, Minnesota and the nation recognize from long standing national programs and the national service rendered each year by the citizens through community efforts, such as, visiting in libraries and hospital visits, volunteering for civil defense and participating in conservation and other civic projects, and also comes into their lives through their own participation in the civic and responsibilities of citizenship through their own activities and

Article, this year the Day After Tomorrow Act will celebrate the forty-ninth birthday and as in Minnesota wish to take this opportunity to extend this youth organization for the excellent program including the, scholarship and high library

Article, Chapter 2, Article 1, Section 1, Clause 1 of the State of Minnesota, as hereby provided the week of March 17 - 19, 1957 as

DAY AFTER TOMORROW ACT

and urge all Minnesotans to unite with the Day After Tomorrow organizations in making another important addition in the legislative history of service to youth and to community.
