PROCLAMATION.

As the years go by and we obtain a better perspective on history, there comes a keener realization of the dignity and importance of labor. To those who toil, to those who keep the wheels of industry moving, to those who perform the tasks that a complex social organization and human existence demand, an exalted tribute is due.

Monday, September 7th, is the day that has been fixed upon as the occasion for this tribute. Accordingly, I, Adolph O. Eberhart, Governor of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim

as

LABOR DAY,


and recommend that on that day all places of business in this state be closed, and that the day be observed by all citizens in a manner that will properly honor the men in the factory, the workshop, the mines, and all engaged in any form of industry.


