

A PROCLAMATION FOR "HUMAN RIGHTS DAY"

WHEREAS, citizens of the United States are guaranteed certain basic human rights through the Constitution and the Bill of Rights; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding these guaranteed rights, there still exists in this country instances of the abrogation of man's human rights through inequality of opportunity, denial of the right of citizenship and its privileges and occasional oppression of free expression and conscience; and

WHEREAS, at the same time that we look upon the disinter - oppressed peoples of the world with sympathy, we must ever realize the necessity for constant alertness to preserve and guard human rights in the United States; and

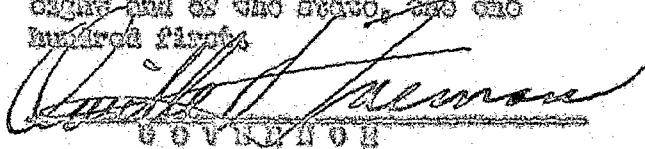
WHEREAS, on December 10, 1948 the United Nations adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and this year the United Nations and the President of the United States will proclaim December 10, 1958 as Human Rights Day;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Orville L. Freeman, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim December 10, 1958 as

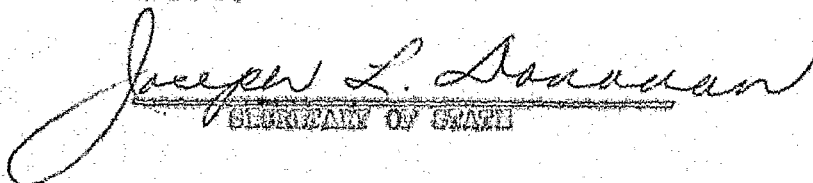
"HUMAN RIGHTS DAY"

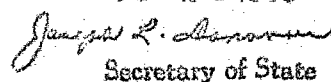
