PROCLAMATION

Whereas there is reason to prevent destruction
of forest fires in northern Minnesota this fall. The precipi-
tation for the past three years is much below normal.

Recent rains, while welcome, should not lull us into
a sense of security. When the autumn leaves have fallen
and the grass is dried, the danger will be greatest. Peat
fires will burn through weeks of rain and be ready to flare up
after a day or two of sunshine and wind.

The Moose Lake and Cloquet fires of 1918 were most
serious on October 12th, and the fire at Baudette
and Spooner burned, occurred October 7th.

For these reasons, I, J. A. O. Proulx, Governor of
Minnesota, do hereby call upon all public officials and private
citizens to take all possible steps to prevent forest fires.

It is one of the most important duties of road overseers,
town officers and county commissioners to extinguish fires
in roads and peat grades, since such fires may, in case of
wind, become dangerous running fires and cause great damage.

Strict compliance with forest laws must be observed.
Permits are required for starting fires in the open, except for
domestic purposes. These permits may be obtained from any
forest ranger, or from town officers deputized by them. It is
the duty of all residents and of travelers in the wooded portions
of this state, to take the utmost precaution against setting fires,
to see that incipient fires are extinguished, and to report to
the forest rangers or the state forester, all fires which cannot
be controlled.
