



Proclamation

- EAS: intelligence and creativity maintain Minnesota's eminence for more than any other resource; and
- EAS: education should move students from intellectual traditionalism to freedom of inquiry with full development of creativity, intellectual ability, kinesthetics and psychosocial skills; and
- EAS: the maintaining, furthering, finding and developing of unusual human resources is a primary concern and obligation of the State of Minnesota and its educational systems; and
- EAS: Minnesota has thousands of talented and gifted children who have been at best minimally tapped because of inappropriate priorities, indifference, lack of knowledge, lack of training, or lack of funds; and
- EAS: this waste of Minnesota's resources can only result in intellectual deprivation, continued educational disenchantment, and a tragic loss of intellectual power which will one day be in critical need; and
- EAS: such loss should be prevented, and with reasonable effort from institutions, agencies, and individuals, it can be prevented;

THEREFORE, I, Wendell R. Anderson, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim the week of March 14-20, 1975 as

GIFTED AND TALENTED CHILD WEEK

Minnesota, and urge that all local and state educational agencies and the citizenry urge consider how our schools might better serve these pupils.
