Honorable William Louis Kelly, Judge of the Second
Judicial District of the State of Minnesota, on April 3, 1923,
presented an application in writing, for retirement for the
remainder of his life, under the provisions of Sections 254
and 255, General Statutes of Minnesota 1913, as amended by
Chapter 79, General Laws of 1923; and

WHEREAS, It is set forth in said application that said
William Louis Kelly was born at Springfield, Kentucky, August
27, 1837; and that he was appointed a Judge of the District
Court of the Second Judicial District, March 15, 1887; and that
he has served continuously as a Judge of said court; that he
is physically incapacitated as a result of a double hernia
together with general infirmities due to his age; and,

WHEREAS, after an investigation of said application, it
is found that said William Louis Kelly is past eighty five years
of age, that he has served as judge of the district court contin-
uously more than thirty four years, that he is physically incap-
acitated from performing the duties of his office, that public
service is suffering and will continue to suffer by reason of said
disability, and that he is eligible to retirement under the above
named law,

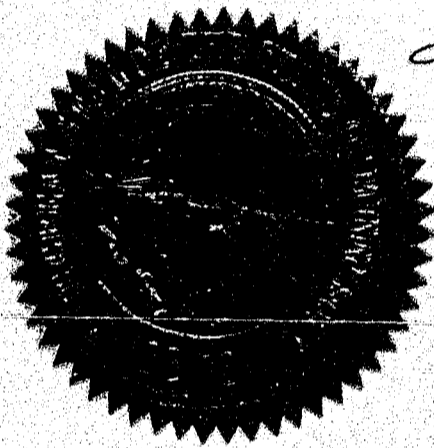
NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. A. O. Preus, Governor of Minnesota, do
hereby direct the retirement of the said William Louis Kelly, on the
thirteenth day of April, 1923, for the remainder of his life, under
the provisions of Sections 254 and 255, General Statutes 1913, as
amended by Chapter 79, General Laws of 1923.


