

Proclamation

- REAS: The historic Brown v. Board of Education decision by the United States Supreme Court in 1954 held that segregation in public education is unconstitutional; and
- REAS: This decision served as the catalyst for the shifting of judicial sanctions from that of segregation to desegregation and the elimination of legal barriers to equal opportunities; and
- REAS: Brown formed the basis for enactment of the Civil Rights Acts of 1964, 1965 and 1968, thereby providing greater assurance of equal opportunity in employment, equal access to public accommodations, housing and desegregated education; and
- REAS: There continues to be opposition to desegregation at many levels of life and the momentum of the equality of opportunity in all aspects of public life is decelerated; and
- REAS: Despite the removal of the more overt legal barriers, blacks and other minorities are still faced with resistance to meaningful implementation of these civil rights laws by many who publicly profess belief in the spirit and the letter of the law as it is pronounced in *Brown*; and

REAS: May 17, 1979, is the 25th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education;
