



Proclamation

WHEREAS: More than 100,000 Minnesotans are unemployed and thousands more are working in low-paying jobs; and

WHEREAS: Unemployment and underemployment result in personal hardships, lower productivity and large expenditures in public assistance; and

WHEREAS: Many unemployed and economically disadvantaged Minnesotans have trouble finding employment or qualifying for better paying jobs because they lack training and work experience; and

WHEREAS: In 1979, the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA), as administered by local prime sponsors, provided job training for 61,900 Minnesotans who were unemployed, living in poverty or receiving public assistance; and


WHEREAS: CETA's assistance resulted in people receiving vocational education, work experience, job training and counseling that led many of them into permanent jobs and increased their self-sufficiency;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Albert H. Quie, Governor of the State of Minnesota do hereby proclaim the week of April 6 through April 12, 1980, to be

CETA WEEK

in Minnesota, and have asked Lieutenant Governor Lou Wangberg to prepare this proclamation for my signature and disseminate the same. I further urge the citizens of the State of Minnesota to recognize the significance of this occasion.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, we have hereunto set our hands and caused the Great Seal of the State of Minnesota to be affixed at the State Capitol this eleventh day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred eighty, and of the State the one hundred twenty-second.


