EAS: The first organized Mother's Day in America was developed during the Civil War by Anna Reeves Jarvis of West Virginia; and

EAS: The American Mother's Committee was organized in 1933 for the purpose of developing and strengthening the moral and spiritual foundation of the American home, to give to the observance of Mother's Day a spiritual quality which highlights the standards of ideal Motherhood, and to recognize the important role of mothers in the home, the community, the nation, and the world; and

EAS: The American Mother's Committee, through the years, has honored many women of all faiths, nationally and in their respective states; and

EAS: Gladys M. Anderson, of Cokato has been selected 1980 Mother of the year by the Minnesota American Mother's Committee;

THEREFORE, I, Albert H. Quie, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do by proclaim Sunday, May 11, 1980 to be

Minnesota, and have asked Lieutenant Governor Lou Wangberg to prepare proclamation for my signature and disseminate the same. I further urge upon all Minnesotans to join me in expressing our grateful appreciation to all mothers for the priceless gifts they have given to us all.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, we have hereunto set our hands and caused the Great Seal of the State of Minnesota to be affixed at the State Capitol this twentieth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred eighty, and of the State the one hundred and twenty-second.

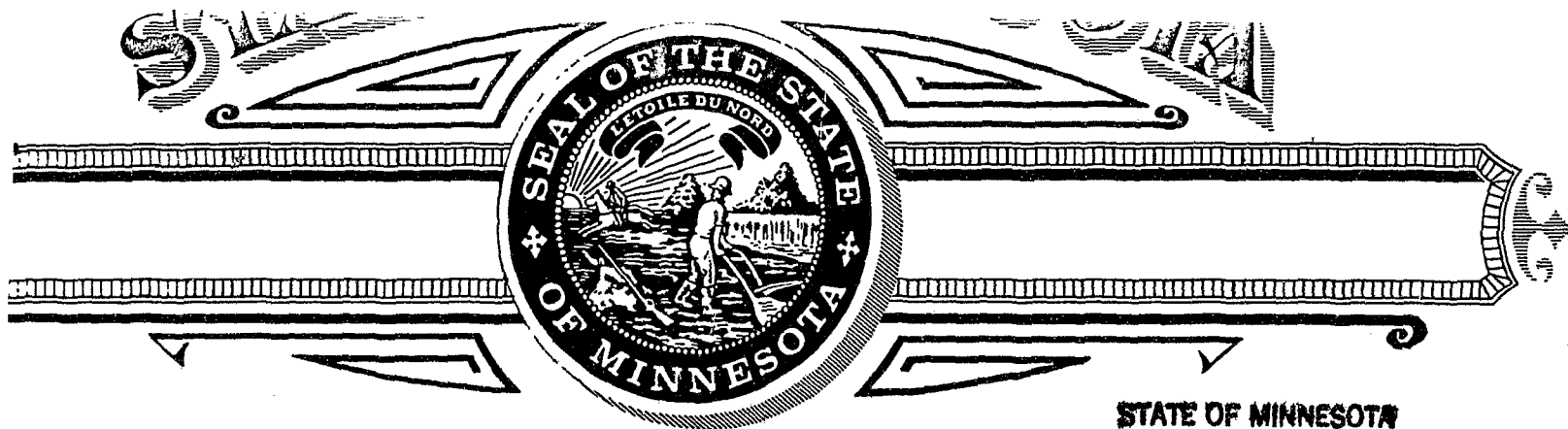

WHEREAS: MOTHERS ARE THE PIVOTAL POINT OF THE FAMILY AND HOME, WHILE MORE THAN EVER SERVING THEIR COUNTRY OUT OF THE HOME, IN LABOR, COMMERCE, AND INDUSTRY, AND IN EVERY FIELD OF ENDEAVOR WHICH IS NECESSARY FOR THE PUBLIC WELFARE, AND THE PROSPERITY OF THE NATION; AND

WHEREAS: WE LOOK TO THE MOTHER IN THE HOME AS THE BOND OF FAMILY STABILITY INSPIRING IN CHILDREN THE IMPORTANCE OF MORALS AND ETHICS; AND THE FUNDAMENTAL LAWS WHICH GOVERN TRUE INTEGRATION AND EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY; AND TO IMPRESS UPON THEM THE TIMELESS VALUES OF ALL THE CIVIC RESPONSIBILITIES WHICH ARE THE REQUISITES OF GOOD AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP; AND

WHEREAS: IT IS APPROPRIATE THAT WE DESIGNATE ONE DAY IN THE YEAR TO PAY TRIBUTE, THROUGH PUBLIC EXPRESSION, TO THE REVERENCE IN WHICH WE HOLD THE MOTHER AS THE EQUAL PARTNER IN THE FAMILY IN AMERICAN SOCIETY;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ALBERT H. QUIE, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM SUNDAY, MAY 11, 1980 TO BE

M O T H E R ' S D A Y

IN MINNESOTA, AND HAVE ASKED LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR LOU WANGBERG TO PREPARE THIS PROCLAMATION FOR MY SIGNATURE AND DISSEMINATE THE SAME. FURTHER, I CALL UPON ALL CITIZENS TO OBSERVE THIS DAY IN COMMEMORATION OF THE MOTHER IN THE HOME IN ORDER THAT EVERY DAY IN THE YEAR WE MAY HAVE THE BLESSINGS THAT EMANATE FROM GOOD MOTHERHOOD, EXEMPLARY CITIZENSHIP AND A STRONG FAMILY LIFE.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, WE HAVE HEREUNTO SET OUR HANDS AND CAUSED THE GREAT SEAL OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA TO BE AFFIXED THIS TWENTY-THIRD DAY OF APRIL IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY, AND OF THE STATE THE ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SECOND.
