

Proclamation

WHEREAS: A KNOWLEDGE OF OTHER LANGUAGES AND CULTURES IS A RECOGNIZED HUMANISTIC PURSUIT OF INSTRINSIC VALUE THAT ALSO ENHANCES CAREER PREPARATIONS; AND

WHEREAS: Such knowledge is necessary for the success of both American foreign policy and American business in an increasingly interdependent world and is therefore in the national and state interest; and

WHEREAS: Familiarity with other languages and cultures expands communication among people and increases understanding among the various ethnic and cultural groups in the world and within American and Minnesota society; and

WHEREAS: Our citizens continue to represent a wealth of cultural and linguistic groups that contribute to the quality and variety of life in Minnesota; and

WHEREAS: This state is an internationally recognized center of trade, tourism, industry, technology and education; and

WHEREAS: The study of languages and cultures has been strongly encouraged in the Helsinki Accords of 1975, by the President's Commission of Foreign Language and International Studies, and in a joint resolution of the 96th Congress of the United States; and

WHEREAS: THE FIRST WEEK OF MARCH HAS BEEN DESIGNATED AS NATIONAL FOREIGN LANGUAGE WEEK;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ALBERT H. QUIE, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM THE WEEK OF MARCH 1 THROUGH 7, 1981 TO BE

LANGUAGES AND CULTURES WEEK

IN MINNESOTA, AND HAVE ASKED LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR LOU WANGBERG TO PREPARE THIS PROCLAMATION FOR MY SIGNATURE AND DISSEMINATE THE SAME.
