AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF GOOD THUNDER TO INCLUDE CERTAIN UNINCORPORATED PLATTED LAND ABUTTING UPON THE CITY

WHEREAS, a certain petition dated March 2, 1981, requesting annexation of the territory hereinafter described was duly presented to the council on the 19th day of March, 1981; and

WHEREAS, the quantity of land embraced within the area described in the petition and bounded as described is 3.81 acres of platted land, no part of which is included within the limits of an incorporated city, or borough; and

WHEREAS, the petition was signed by all owners; and

WHEREAS, no objections to the annexation have been received from the town board, or the governing body of any municipality whose boundaries abut upon the boundaries of the land to be annexed; and

WHEREAS, the land described in the petition abuts upon the city limits at the western boundary thereof;

The council of the City of Good Thunder, Minnesota, ordains:

Section 1. The city council hereby determines (1) that the annexation will be to the best interests of the city and of the territory affected; (2) that the territory described herein abuts upon the city limits and is (is about to become) urban or suburban in character; and (3) that none of said territory is now included within the limits of any city, or borough.

Section 2. Territory Annexed. The corporate limits of the city are hereby extended to include the platted (unplatted) land described as follows and the same is hereby annexed to and included within the city as effectually as if it had originally been a part thereof:

That part of the Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 10, Township 106 North, Range 27 West, Blue Earth County, Minnesota, described as follows:

Commencing at the west quarter corner of said Section 10; thence on an assumed bearing of East along the north line of said Southwest Quarter, a distance of 75.00 feet to the point of beginning of the tract to be described; thence continuing on a bearing of East along said north line of the Southwest Quarter, a distance of 17 degrees 21 minutes 52 seconds East, a distance of 511.67 feet; thence on a bearing of South, a distance of 181.70 feet; thence on a bearing of West on a line parallel to said north line of the Southwest Quarter, a distance of 244.97 feet; thence on a bearing of North 171.00 feet; thence North 17 degrees 21 minutes 52 seconds West, a distance of 38.00 feet; thence South 72 degrees 00 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 145.00 feet; thence on a bearing of West on a line parallel to said north line of the Southwest Quarter, a distance of 140.00 feet; thence North 38 degrees 05 minutes 54 seconds West, a distance of 118.81 feet; thence on a bearing of North, a distance of 135.00 feet to the point of beginning. This tract contains 3.81 acres.

Section 3. Filing. The city clerk is hereby directed to file certified copies of this ordinance with the Minnesota Municipal Commission, the Secretary of State, the Town Clerk, and the County Auditor.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance takes effect upon its passage and publication and filing of the certified copies as provided in Section 3.

MINNESOTANS LEAD THE WAY

In the last few weeks the U.S. Senate has taken some historic steps that are going to shape our country during the rest of this century. I know that most of the readers of this column are familiar with what we've been doing in Washington because most of these stories have been headline news.

But the news you read is coming from the national wire services and they often miss the Minnesota angles that I see every day on the floor of the Senate and in the committee hearings. You'd be surprised - and, if you're like me, proud - to know how Minnesota people and experiences contribute to forming national policy.

An issue of importance to every state in the country - the severance taxes some states impose on their energy resources - came up for congressional review for the first time since the U.S. Supreme Court ruled on Montana's 30 percent tax on coal. The Senate Subcommittee on Intergovernmental Relations, which I chair, held two days of hearings on state energy taxes.

The problem we as a country face in this area is one I call fiscal disparities - the flow of energy dollars from consuming states, like Minnesota, to producing states. The U.S. Department of Treasury estimates that by 1983, \$9.4 billion will flow annually from the states that don't have energy resources to those that have. In 1980 alone Minnesota electricity consumers paid \$16 million in coal severance taxes just to Montana.

Among those who testified at my hearings were Minnesotans Jim Oberstar, 8th District congressman; Mayor Morris L. Lanning of Moorhead; and Mayor Ralph H. Possehl of Breckenridge. They and other Minnesotans have joined me in the forefront of this issue.

Mayor Possehl pointed out the problem for border cities like Breckenridge and Moorhead that are in direct competition with sister cities in neighboring energy-rich states. North Dakota

Mayor Lanning summed up the feelings of everyone with his conclusion: "In general, I do not like having to come to the federal government for assistance, but our situation is such that there is only so much we can do for ourselves as a city and as a state. This issue certainly falls into the purview of federal responsibility."

He's right and you can bet that more will be heard from those of us in Minnesota who care about this issue.

The U.S. Senate finally followed the lead of Minnesota and gave Americans families control of their earnings and their government when it made the historic decision to index inflation out of the tax system. The 57-to-40 Senate vote to eliminate "bracket creep" came on the Armstrong-Durenberger amendment.

Indexing means that cost-of-living pay increases stay in your pocket instead of going to Washington in higher taxes. Minnesota was one of the first states to index its tax system and it has paid off for working families. Minnesota workers will keep \$4 billion of earnings which otherwise would be taken in taxes in the next four years thanks to Minnesota's indexing.


Unfortunately, while they've been saving in Minnesota, the federal government has been taking more and more of the dollars you earn. That won't happen if the House of Representatives follows the lead of Minnesota and the U.S. Senate and agrees to indexing.

A Minnesota newspaper reporter, Steve Dornfeld of Knight-Ridder Newspapers (St. Paul and Duluth), testified before a Senate subcommittee recently on the need to maintain a strong Freedom of Information Act. That's the legislation that opens our government to the people.

It's an important safeguard in our democratic system. While all of us have to be concerned with national security - for example, we can't open our country's necessary secrets to those who would use them against us - we can and must free the hands of the American public without the hands of our country's intelligence community.

These are just a few of the many areas in which Minnesota leaders and leaders have been shaping national policy. The list could go on and on, but I think you get the idea - we in Minnesota have a lot to be proud of.
