Honorable Sir:

You will please take notice, that the undersigned, will, within thirty days, file an application in the General Land office, at Washington, D. C., for the survey of those certain unsurveyed islands located in Antler Lake, Itasca County, Minnesota, more particularly described as follows:

"An unsurveyed island located in the southwestern portion of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 31, Tp. 60 North, Range 24 West, 4th principal M., lying south 28 degrees east 485 feet from the M.C. on the N.W. section line of Lot 3 of said section, containing approximately 0.15 acre."

"An unsurveyed island located in the southeastern portion of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 36, Tp. 60 North, Range 25 West, 4th P.M., lying south 52 degrees west, 445 feet from the M.C. on the N.E. section line of Lot 2 of said section, containing approximately 1.65 acres."

You are allowed thirty (30) days from the receipt of this notice, within which to file in said general land office any papers you may wish to submit tending to show cause, if any, why the said islands should not be surveyed and disposed of as public land of the United States.

P r o c l a m a t i o n

On September 17, 1787, the Constitution of the United States was formally adopted by the vote of the States represented in the Constitutional Convention. Although formal ratification was not completed until some time later, it seems fitting and proper to recognize September 17 as the date which best signalizes the adoption of our great national charter.

One hundred thirty-nine years have elapsed, and under the government established under that constitution, the United States has grown until its far-flung boundaries extend from Maine to Manila and its territory embraces more than half of the North American continent. We have become the wealthiest, happiest, freest, and perhaps the most powerful people in the world. While other governments have rocked or cracked under the strain of a recent world cataclysm, the foundations of the Great Republic are secure.

Now, therefore, in commemoration of the beneficent and far-reaching work of the Founding Fathers, with the purpose of helping to preserve and stimulate among Americans of today the spirit which animated those who guided our nation during its formative years, I, Theodore Christianson, Governor of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim and designate, FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1926, as

C O N S T I T U T I O N D A Y .

I would especially urge that in the public schools some part of the day be devoted to such exercises as will impress upon the future citizens of our State and Nation, not only their great debt to the Fathers, but their obligations to posterity.

Let all patriotic and civic organizations take advantage of the opportunity which the day affords to assemble the people to dedicate themselves anew to the responsibility of protecting and supporting the constitution and laws of the United States.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Minnesota to be affixed this 18th day of September, 1926.
