



Proclamation

WHEREAS: During the 22 years he was executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored Persons, Roy Wilkins was an international leader for justice and equality and came to be known as "Mr. Civil Rights"; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins demonstrated courage and conviction early in life as a college orator, journalist, secretary of the St. Paul branch of the NAACP and editor of the Kansas City Call before joining the NAACP national office in 1931; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins worked to end segregation in the U.S. armed forces; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins was a chief planner and leader of the 1963 march on Washington and helped steer passage of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, the 1965 Voting Rights Act and the 1968 Fair Housing Act; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins used intellect, dignity and charm in persuading people to demonstrate their belief in equality and their faith in democracy; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins was always proud to be an "adopted" son of Minnesota, having moved to St. Paul at the age of four; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins graduated from Mechanic Arts High School in St. Paul and the University of Minnesota, which presented him with its "outstanding alumni award"; and

WHEREAS: Roy Wilkins called St. Paul "a special place, a beacon of light in that world of darkness"; and


WHEREAS: The Roy Wilkins Auditorium in St. Paul is being dedicated in memory of his accomplishments;

ROY WILKINS DAY


in Minnesota.
