



Proclamation

- WHEREAS: Information-utilization skills are a requirement of lifelong learning and success in our information age; and
- WHEREAS: Minnesota's school library media professionals have taken leadership in developing programs for students to achieve mastery of information skills across all formats; and
- WHEREAS: The Minnesota State Board of Education has adopted a new program description of what constitutes an effective school library media program; and
- WHEREAS: Minnesota's school library media professionals, working through their national associations - the American Association of School Librarians and the Association for Educational Communications Technology - and in conjunction with other educators, have developed joint guidelines for School Library Media Programs; and
- WHEREAS: These guidelines are visionary in addressing the challenges facing learners, educators, and citizens to the year 2000; and
- WHEREAS: These guidelines will be celebrated and introduced to the public under the title Information Power, in a national telecast, received at sites throughout the state, on April 12, 1988; and
- WHEREAS: Minnesotans are challenged to implement these guidelines; and
- WHEREAS: Minnesota, as the Brainpower State, benefits from these efforts to increase the effective use of information for personal growth, for civic participation, and for increased productivity;
