GOVERNOR'S ORDER #6

Extending Additional Protection to Frogs in Minnesota.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Commissioner of Game and Fish that frogs are in danger of undue depletion in the State of Minnesota, and


WHEREAS the Commissioner of Game and Fish has presented me with the results of his investigation and has recommended that additional protection be given frogs in this State to prevent their undue depletion, and

WHEREAS I find that there is danger of the undue depletion of frogs in this State:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, THEODORE CHRISTIANSON, Governor of the State of Minnesota, by virtue of and pursuant to authority in me vested by Section 5640 General Statutes 1923, do hereby order that no frogs be taken in the State of Minnesota during the year 1929, except that frogs may be taken for scientific purposes or that frogs not to exceed six inches in length from tip to tip may be taken and possessed and used for bait purposes only.

This order shall remain in force until December 31, 1929, unless sooner revoked or modified.
