PROCLAMATION

The Constitution of the United States was formally adopted on September 17, 1787. Notwithstanding the fact that one hundred and forty-four years have elapsed since it was adopted, and our country has grown in area and population far beyond the dreams of its founders, the Constitution still stands as a stable foundation for efficient government. The wisdom of its founders is expressed and contained in that provision of the Constitution which allows for amendment to permit its adaptation to changing conditions. It was adopted "in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Floyd B. Olson, Governor of the State of Minnesota, do hereby designate

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1933

as

CONSTITUTION DAY.


