Minnesota Trade School Law 1943 Law No. 1-Chapter 234

A BILL /

FOR AN ACT relating to private trade schools, providing for the licensing and regulation thereof and of solicitors therefor and imposing penalties for violations of this act.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesote:

Section 1. The following words, terms and phrases when used in this Act shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section:

(1) "Private trade school" MEANS a school maintained or classes conducted for the purpose of teaching, for profit or for a tuition charge, any trade, technical, mechanical or industrial occupation, but shall not include: private schools engaged exclusively in the teaching of business subjects; schools engaged in teaching medical technology; colleges authorized by the laws of Minnesota to grant degrees; schools of nursing; public schools; private trade schools which are exempt from taxation under Mason's Minnesota Supplement 1940, Section 2394-5(H) of the Minnesota State Income Tax Laws; private schools which are exempt from taxation under Section 1, Article IX, of the Constitution of Minnesota; schools.exclusively engaged in training physically handicapped persons for the State of Minnesota; schools engaged'in giving instruction by correspondence; schools already or hereafter licensed by duly constituted boards under provisions of Minnesota laws; or schools and educational programs conducted by firms, corporations or persons for the training of their own employes, for which no fee is charged.

(2) "Solicitor" means a person who solicits business for a private trade school, or who offers to sell or sells any instruction or course of instruction by a private trade school. Private trade school as used in this paragraph includes those located within and without the State of Minnesota.

(3) "Person" means any individual, association, partnership, or corporation, and includes any receiver, referee, trustee, executor, or administrator.

(4) "Commissioner" means commissioner of education.

(5) "Board" means state board for vocational education.

Section 2. The following minimum standards for private trade schools are hereby established, and no license shall be granted hereunder unless the board shall determine--

(a) That the school applying for a license has a sound financial structure with sufficient resources for its proper use and support.

(b) That the school has satisfactory training facilities with sufficient tools and equipment and the necessary number of work stations to adequately train the number of students proposed to be enrolled.

(c) That there are a sufficient number of qualified instructors sufficiently trained by experience and education to give the training contemplated.

(d) That the advertising and representations made on behalf of the school to prospective students shall be truthful and free from misrepresentation and fraud.

(e) That the charge made for instruction shall be reasonable based upon the service rendered.

(f) That the premises and conditions under which the students work or study shall be sanitary and healthful and safe, according to modern standards.

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Section 3. The board shall, with the advice of the commissioner and of the State Advisory Committee of such board as prescribed in the state vocational plan for trade and industrial education, make rules and regulations to carry out the intent and purposes of this Act. Such rules and regulations shall be effective when filed in the office of the Secretary of State and amendments thereof shall be effective twenty days after being so filed.

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Section 4. No private trade school shall be operated by any person, or persons, firm, corporation, or by any private organization unless a license is first secured from the commissioner, who is empowered to issue it upon compliance with the terms and provisions of this Act. Application shall be made to the commissioner upon a form prescribed and furnished by him and shall be accompanied by an application fee of \$25.00. A license shall not be issued to any school until the commissioner has approved it as meeting the minimum standards and requirements as provided herein.

Section 5. If the license is granted, it shall be issued upon the payment of an additional fee of \$25.00 and the filing with the commissioner of a surety bond to the State of Minnesota in the sum of \$1,000.00. Said bond shall be conditioned for the faithful performance of all agreements and contracts with students, as disclosed by the application for license, and the compliance with this Act. Every license shall expire on the 31st day of December following the date of issuance.

Section 6. Subdivision 1. Every solicitor, before engaging in such business, shall first procure a permit from the commissioner.

Subdivision 2. A permit shall only be issued upon written application to the commissioner. The application shall be upon a form prescribed and furnished by the commissioner and shall be accompanied by \$10.00, the fee for such permit. If the application is granted, the permit shall not be issued until the applicant has filed with the commissioner a continuous surety bond to the state of Minnesota in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, conditioned for the faithful performance of all contracts and agreements with students by the solicitor and the employing private trade school, as disclosed by the application for the permit, and for the compliance by the solicitor with this Act and all rules and regulations prescribed hereunder. Every permit shall expire on the 31st day of December following the date of issuance.

Section 7. Subdivision 1. A license or permit issued hereunder may be revoked by the board for cause upon notice and hearing.

Subdivision 2. Upon the filing with the board of charges against the holder of a license or permit issued hereunder, the commissioner may suspend such license or permit pending determination thereof.

Section 8. It is unlawful for any private trade school operating with the State of Minnesota to apply to itself, either as a part of its name or in any other manner, the designation of "college" or "university", unless certificated by the commissioner that the school meets appropriate standards and is entitled to such designation.

Section 9. Any person who violates any provision of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 10. All of the fees collected under the provisions of this Act shall be payable to the general revenue fund of the State of Minnesota.

Section 11. This Act shall be effective July 1, 1943, except that applications for a license or permit hereunder may be made at any time prior thereto.

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(FOREWORD)

This pamphlet is published to provide officials of private trade schools operated for profit, as well as all other interested citizens, with helpful information concerning the legislation regarding such schools adopted by the Minnesota State Legislature of 1943 and approved by Governor Harold E. Stassen.

<u>Two Acts were adopted: The first Act</u> approved March 30, 1943, provided for the licensing and regulation of private trade schools resident in Minnesota and operated for profit and of solicitors therefor; <u>the second Act</u> approved April 20, 1943 provided for the licensing of the solicitors of such private correspondence trade schools as are operated for profit; are resident in other States or in Minnesota; and are doing business in Minnesota. Copies of both these Acts will be found in the Appendices at the close of this pamphlet - the first Act in Appendix A and the second Act in Appendix B.

) Each of these laws charges the State Board for Vocational Education with the duty and responsibility of its administration. As these private trade schools are vitally concerned with these laws and with the policies, standards and procedures of the Board in administer-) ing them, and as the policy of the Board will be to cooperate helpfully with the efforts of such schools to comply with the provisions of the law and the requirements of the Board, this pamphlet is addressed primarily to such schools. At the same time, it gives all interested citizens and prospective applicants for training by such a school or schools the facts they need.

In separate sections following, are regulations governing private trade schools and their solicitors.

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Minnesota Trade School Law 1943 - Law No. 1, Chapter 234

- 1. What schools must secure a license? Ans.: All those which have these characteristics: They are located in Minnesota. They do business in Minnesota. They maintain a school or class conducted for the purpose of teaching for profit or for a tuition charge any trade, technical, mechanical or industrial occupation. They have not been exempted from the Act as set forth in the provisions of Section 2 hereof. See Section 1, paragraph 1 of the Act in the Appendix marked A.
- 2. What schools are specifically exempted from the provisions of the Act? Ans.: Private schools engaged exclusively in the teaching of business subjects; schools engaged in teaching medical technology; colleges authorized by the laws of Minnesota to grant degrees; schools of nursing; public schools; private trade schools which are exempt from taxation under Minnesota State Income Tax Laws; private schools which are exempt from taxation under Section 1, Article IX of the Constitution of Minnesota; schools exclusively engaged in training physically handicapped persons for the State of Minnesota; schools engaged in giving instruction by correspondence; schools already or hereafter licensed by duly constituted boards under provisions of Minnesota laws; or schools and educational programs conducted by firms, corporations or persons for the training of their own employees, for which no fee is charged. See Section 1, paragraph 1 of the Act in Appendix A.
- 3. <u>In order to secure approval for a license</u>, what steps must be taken by every private trade school subject to the Act? Ans.: Make application to the State Commissioner of Education for a license. Use a form prescribed

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and furnished by him. Accompany the application with an application fee of \$25.00. No license shall be issued to any school until the Commissioner has approved the school as meeting the minimum standards and requirements as provided in the Act. The applicant may be any person, persons, firm, corporation or any private organization.

- 4. After the application has been approved, what else must the applicant do before a license is issued? Ans.: Make a second payment of \$25.00 (total \$50.00) and file with the Commissioner a surety bond to the State of Minnesota in the sum of \$1,000.00. Every license will expire on the 31st day of December and must be renewed at once for the ensuing year.
- 5. For what purpose is the bond required from the applicant? Ans.: The bond shall be conditioned for compliance with the Act, and for the faithful performance of all agreements and contracts with students as described by the application for license.
 - Regarding what matters is an applicant to be checked before approval? Ans.: The law requires that the following six standards be used in passing upon a school applying for a license:
 - a. Must have a sound financial structure with sufficient resources for its proper use and support.
 - b. Must have satisfactory training facilities with sufficient tools and equipment and the necessary number of work stations adequately to train the number of students proposed to be enrolled.
 - c. Must have a sufficient number of qualified instructors sufficiently trained by experience and education to give the training.
 - d. The advertising and representation made on behalf of the school to prospective students must be truthful and free from misrepresentation and fraud.

- e. The charge made for instruction must be reasonably based on the services rendered.
- f. The premises and conditions under which the student works or studies must be sanitary and healthful and safe according to modern standards.
- 7. <u>How will these standards be used in checking schools?</u> Ans.: Every private trade school applying for a license will be checked on the basis of criteria established by the State Board for Vocational Education to determine whether the school meets the minimum standard for each of the six items in paragraph 6 above as set forth in Section 2 of the Act "relating to private trade schools, providing for the licensing and regulation thereof and of solicitors therefor and imposing penalties for violations of this Act."
- 8. <u>How are rules and regulations for the interpretation and administration of the</u> <u>Act determined?</u> Ans.: The Board, shall with the advice of the Commissioner and of the State Advisory Committee of such Board - as prescribed in the State Vocational Plan for Trade and Industrial Education - make rules and regulations to carry out the intent and purposes of this Act. These rules and regulations include the minimum "standards" prescribed for schools in Section 2 of the Act., as well as other precedures and precautions adopted by the Board.
 - Through what channel will this Act be administered under the State Board for <u>Vocational Education and the Commissioner of Education</u>? Ans.: The State Commissioner of Education, with the approval of the State Board for Vocational Education, will designate such agents or representatives as they find administratively expedient to carry out the provisions of this Act.
- 10. What are the penalties for violating the Act? Ans.:

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- a. Any person who violates any provision of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- b. The Commissioner may suspend the license of any private trade school pending the determination of charges filed by or through him, with the State

Board for Vocational Education against the holder of such license. Any complaint against a private trade school must be in writing and make specific charges.

- c. The State Board for Vocational Education may revoke the license of a private trade school upon notice and hearing.
- d. Unless approved by the Commissioner to do so, a trade school may not use the designation of "college" or "university". Otherwise such use constitutes a misdemeanor.
- 11. Who is a solicitor of a private trade school under the Minnesota Private <u>Trade School Act - approved March 30, 1943?</u> Ans.: He is anyone who solicits business as an agent or representative of any private trade school subject to the provisions of the Act or who offers to sell or sells any instruction or course of instruction published and distributed by such a private trade school.
- 12. What private trade schools must meet the requirement that their solicitors shall secure a permit? Ans.: All those not specifically exempted from the Act by Section 2 of the Act. See Minnesota Trade School Law 1943, Law No. 1, Chapter 234 (Appendix A). The solicitors of all such schools are included whether these are located within or without the State of Minnesota.
- 13. What procedures must the solicitor follow to secure a permit? Ans.: Make application to the Commissioner of Education accompanied by a \$10.00 fee using a standard form furnished by the Commissioner. If the application is granted, the permit shall not be issued until the applicant has filed with the Commissioner a continuous surety bond to the State of Minnesota in the sum of \$1,000 conditioned for the faithful performance of all contracts and agreements with students by the solicitor for the school and the employing private trade school as disclosed by the application for the permit, and for

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the compliance by the solicitor with the Act and all rules and regulations thereunder.

- 14. Are solicitors of private trade schools engaged in teaching by correspondence also required to secure a permit? Ans.: Although such schools are not required to secure a license, their solicitors must secure the same permit as solicitors of the private trade schools located in Minnesota that are required to secure a license as described in paragraphs 9 to 11 above. This would also apply to the solicitor of any private trade school located in Minnesota and giving instruction by mail in Minnesota. See Minnesota Trade School Law 1943, Law No. 2, Chapter 542.
- 15. When does any regulation adopted by the Board become effective? Ans.: Any regulation becomes effective as soon as filed in the office of the Secretary of State and any amendment of a regulation, 20 days after being so filed.
- 16. What becomes of the fees collected under the provisions of the Act? Ans.: They are payable to the general revenue funds of the State of Minnesota.
- 17. Where can applicants obtain application blanks, bond forms, and information regarding the Acts regulating private trade schools? Ans.: By. writing to the State Commissioner of Education, State Office Building, St. Paul, Minnesota.

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The following forms will be furnished by the State Board for Vocational Education through the State Commissioner of Education:

- (a) Application for license
- (b) Teachers qualifying blank
- (c) Form for surety bond
- (d) Physical requirements
- (e) Criteria for checking schools for effective instruction
- (f) Certificate for license upon approval of school

Minnesota Trade School Law 1943

Law No. 2-Chapter 542

A BILL

FOR AN ACT relating to private trade schools, as defined by Laws 1943, Chapter 234, teaching by correspondence, providing for the licensing of solicitors therefor and imposing penalties for violations of this act.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Every solicitor, agent or representative who solicits business for a private trade school as defined by Laws 1943, Chapter 234, engaged in teaching by correspondence any trade, technical, mechanical, or industrial occupation, or who offers to sell or sells any instruction or course of instruction by such a school shall be subject to the provisions for the licensing and regulation of solicitors . employed by private trade schools prescribed in Laws 1943, Chapter 234, relating to private trade schools, providing for the licensing and regulation thereof and of solicitors therefor and imposing penalties for violations of that act.

AMENDMENTS TO THE REGULATIONS GOVERNING LICENSING OF PRIVATE TRADE SCHOOLS AND THEIR SOLICITORS

Under Provisions of Minnesota Trade School Laws Chapter 234 and 542 - Laws of 1943.

1. All instructors must meet the following requirements:

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- a. Three years of experience in the trade or speciality in which they are to teach,
- b. Natural ability to impart knowledge and skill.
- c. Recognized individually as tradesman or specialist.
- d. General education shall be such that it insures success in the type of work demanded in each case.
- 2. In order to carry out the provisions of the Minnesota Trade School Law, Chapter 234, Laws of 1943, each private trade school licensed under this Act may be inspected as often as necessary by an agent or representative of the State Board for Vocational Education for the purpose of determining whether the school continues to meet the minimum standard for each of the six items set forth in Section 2 of the Act,
- 3. The school shall not solicit students in the "Help Wanted" or other employment columns in newspapers or other publications. Neither shall the school solicit students through blind advertisements.
- 4. No school may advertise that it is endorsed by manufacturers, business establishments, organizations or individuals engaged in the line of work for which it gives training until written evidence of this fact is presented by the school and accepted by the Commissioner of Education.
- 5. No school shall understate the length of time required to train students. The length of the course shall be outlined in the school catalogue. No school shall, in its advertising or through its representatives, guarantee or imply the guarantee of employment.
- 6. All catalogues, folders, circulars, student receipt blanks, enrollment or application blanks, letterheads, form letters or other advertising, including newspaper advertising, now or hereafter used shall be filed with the Commissioner of Education previous to distribution of same.
- 7. The standard tuition rate shall be published in the school literature. No deviation in the rate shall be made other than cash payment in advance. Such discount should be clearly indicated in all school literature. Notice of any change in a published tuition rate shall be given to the Department of Education fifteen days in advance of such change.

8. No school shall guarantee or imply the guarantee of any certain wage.

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9. All private trade school literature, letterheads and advertising, including advertising by radio, shall not mention that the school is licensed by the State Department of Education except by use of the following: Minnesota License Number

- 10. Public liability and workmen's compensation insurance must be carried by a school applying for approval, and such insurance must be continued during the entire period of approval.
- 11. All contracts with students or prospective students must contain a liquidating clause patterned on the following:

If the student fails to complete the course of training, all money paid herounder shall be forfeited as liquidated damages and no refunds shall be made other than specified herein. If the student is unable to complete the course for reasons satisfactory to the Commissioner of Education, the school will refund the unused portion of the tuition, which in no case shall be more than the unused balance of the tuition paid. The school is to be reimbursed for any reasonable expenses connected with the securing of the enrollment and the training given to the date of cancellation.

- Individuals having grievances involving violation of the Minnesota Trade 12, School Law shall have the right to report them in writing to the Commissioner of Education.
- 13. If diplomas or certificates of accomplishment are granted, adequate records of the student's experience and scholarship shall be kept by the school and be open to the inspection of the Commissioner of Education.
- In case a teacher is changed or a new teacher employed, the school shall 14. give the Commissioner of Education notice of that fact and obtain his approval in advance.
- 15. Each school shall file with the Commissioner of Education a description of all equipment available for instruction in each course offered.
- No change in name of the licensee is to be made until notice of the change 16. is given to the Commissioner of Education and approval of such change has been secured.
- 17. Application for renewal of license must be made annually not later than December 15 of the proceeding year.
