

HOME GAMES & WINNERS BENEFICIARIES FINANCIALS



The Lottery reached a milestone in its 12-year history on March 11, 2002 when the money generated for the State of Minnesota reached \$1 billion. Among the recipients of the Lottery funds were the General Fund, Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, Game & Fish Fund, Natural Resources Fund, Greater Minnesota Corporation, Infrastructure Development Funds for Capital Improvements and problem gambling treatment and prevention.

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
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GAMES & WINNERS BENEFICIARIES

FINANCIALS

Due in part to a near-record Powerball® jackpot of \$295 million in August 2001, lottery sales reached \$377.1 million in fiscal year 2002 (July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002). This is an increase of 3 percent over the previous year. Online Game sales (Powerball®, Power Play®, Gopher 5®, Daily 3®, Rolldown™ and Hot Lotto™) totaled \$136.1 million, a new sales record in Minnesota, while sales of Scratch Games reached \$241 million. Fiscal year per capita sales were \$76.66, with a high of \$155.54 in Polk County and a low of \$29.88 in Red Lake County.

The Lottery paid \$223 million in prizes this year. Prize payments were made to two Minnesotans who won Powerball jackpots; to the holders of more than 100 tickets over \$50,000; and to players who won millions in small prizes on tickets purchased in Minnesota.

The 3,200 retailers selling lottery tickets earned \$23.9 million in commissions and incentives. Each store receives a commission of 5.5 percent on each ticket sold and 1 percent of prizes (up to \$599) paid to players who redeem tickets in their stores. All retailers are eligible to receive cash incentives throughout the year.

SCRATCH GAMES AND WINNERS



Scratch Games were the favorite games for Minnesota lottery players in fiscal year 2002. Sales of these games totaled 63.9 percent of sales, or \$241 million. The Lottery introduced 35 new Scratch Games during the fiscal year. These games featured a variety of themes, play styles, top prizes and price points.

The Beetle Bailey® Scratch Game, based on the Beetle Bailey comic strip, debuted on Nov. 6, 2001. Special donation materials featuring Beetle Bailey were distributed to all lottery retailers and to 1,000 veterans organizations throughout Minnesota to raise funds for the Minnesota WWII Veterans Memorial.

The Lottery's Scratch Games produced many large winners, including (left to right) Kevin Voss of Delano, Tim Donatell of North Branch and Julie Tonn of Hancock. Forty-six Scratch Game prizes of \$30,000 or more were claimed in FY02.

Slingo, a \$3 Scratch Game that combines slots and but was launched in September 2001. Because of player enthusiasm for this game, a second version of Slingo introduced less than a year later.

Players had the opportunity to play the MONOPOLY Scratch Game for real cash prizes during the fiscal year. Players could purchase a single \$3 MONOPOLY Scratch Game ticket or the \$10 MONOPOLY Scratch Game bonus pack. Each ticket contained a property stub found on a MONOPOLY game board. Players who collected the correct number of property stubs (e.g., Baltic and Mediterranean Avenues) won the prize associated with those properties. All players who purchased the \$10 MONOPOLY Scratch Game bonus pack received a second chance drawing entry. Twenty lucky winners had their choice of a vacation


package to Atlantic City, N.J.; a big-screen TV package; pre-paid fuel cards; season tickets to all 2002-2003 Minnesota Timberwolves home games; or a cash prize.

Players could purchase a single \$3 MONOPOLY Scratch Game ticket or a \$10 MONOPOLY Scratch Game bonus pack.

In March 2002, the Lottery introduced Explore Minnesota. The Lottery teamed up with the Minnesota Office of Tourism to offer Minnesota vacation packages to 218 lucky winners of a second chance drawing. The getaways featured golf, fishing or skiing trips; Boundary Waters canoeing; Mississippi River houseboating; and hotel/dining packages across Minnesota. Each package was valued at \$1,000.

ONLINE GAMES AND WINNERS

The new Online Game sales record of \$136.1 million, set in fiscal year 2002, was fueled by a \$295 million Powerball® jackpot on Aug. 25, 2001. This jackpot was the second-highest jackpot ever recorded. Sheryel Hanuman of Minneapolis was one of four lucky players from the 23 Powerball lotteries to split the near-record jackpot. She selected the cash option of \$41.4 million. Hanuman, who became Minnesota's 14th Powerball jackpot winner, purchased the ticket at Cub Foods, 2850 S. 26th Ave. in Minneapolis while she was shopping for a wedding card.

Sheryel Hanuman of Minneapolis became Minnesota's 14th Powerball jackpot winner when one set of numbers on her five-line ticket matched those drawn on Aug. 25, 2001.



In addition to the jackpot ticket, 10 tickets purchased in Minnesota for the Aug. 25 drawing each won \$100,000 — another Minnesota State Lottery record.



About three months after Hanuman claimed her jackpot prize, Jeff Holmberg of Richfield celebrated a win of his own. The third line on his five-line ticket matched all five white balls plus the Powerball on Dec. 1, 2001, netting Holmberg the \$29.4 million jackpot (he selected the \$16.7 million cash option). Holmberg purchased his winning ticket at Holiday Stationstore, 8920 Penn Ave. S. in Bloomington.

When he won the Powerball jackpot on Dec. 1, 2001, Jeff Holmberg of Richfield became Minnesota's 15th Powerball jackpot winner. He selected the \$16.7 million cash option.

Besides Hanuman and Holmberg, many other players won Powerball® prizes during the fiscal year. Fifty tickets worth \$100,000 each were sold in Minnesota. Powerball produced 2,630,128 winning tickets, paying more than \$77.5 million.

Many Minnesota Powerball players like to pool their money with friends, co-workers and even with their

neighbors. Twenty-two co-workers at Seagate Technology in Shakopee won a \$100,000 prize on Jan. 23, 2002. On Aug. 22, 2001, eight employees of United Properties in Eagan and 14 neighbors in a south Fargo neighborhood each won the \$100,000 Powerball prize.

Many players purchased Powerball's Power Play® option that, for an extra \$1 per play, allows them to increase their Powerball prize (except the jackpot) by up to five times the set amount. During the fiscal year, more than 79,000 ticket holders won \$872,899 in Power Play prizes.

Gopher 5®, Minnesota's own cash lotto game, generated 16 jackpot wins in FY02. The jackpots ranged from \$100,000 to \$1,099,097. An Anoka resident won the \$1,099,097 jackpot on Jan. 1, 2002. Gopher 5 paid more than \$12.7 million to 346,106 lucky ticket holders.

Daily 3® has been a very steady performer for the Lottery. The three-digit game paid the holders of 62,695 winning tickets more than \$6.8 million during the fiscal year.



Mark and Jane Theros of Racine won the \$751,915 Gopher 5 jackpot on Oct. 16, 2001.

Players were introduced to Hot Lotto[™], the Lottery's newest multi-state lottery game, on April 7, 2002. The Hot Lotto jackpot starts at \$1 million and grows until somebody wins. Players were paid \$755,793 on 190,381 winning tickets. Hot Lotto replaced Rolldown[™], the multi-state game that paid more than \$1.3 million to the holders of 152,856 winning tickets from July 1, 2001 through April 6, 2002.

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POWERBALL - THE GAME SHOW®



Minnesota players continued to represent the state as contestants on Powerball - The Game Show. Each week, one TV contestant is selected to represent Minnesota on the game show for the chance to win \$1 million, while other players are selected to win cash prizes by playing along at home. Lisa Gressen of St. Paul was Minnesota's biggest game show winner during the fiscal year — she won \$200,000 on the show that aired on Jan. 5, 2002. Bruce Lane of Bloomington was the first player to represent Minnesota twice on the game show. He appeared on the show on July 21, 2001 and again on Nov. 3, 2001.

BENEFITS TO STATE THROUGH NET PROCEEDS AND IN-LIEU-OF-SALES TAX

Each time a player purchases a lottery ticket, Minnesota wins. The Minnesota State Lottery transferred over \$81.6 million to the State of Minnesota in FY02. The Legislature determines how this money is distributed. Currently, 6.5 percent of lottery sales is transferred to the State as in-lieu-of-sales tax payments — 87 percent of this money is directed to the Game & Fish Fund for activities that improve, enhance or protect fish and wildlife resources in Minnesota; and to the Natural Resources Fund for state and Twin Cities metropolitan area parks and trails, local trails and the Minnesota Zoological Gardens, Como Zoo and Duluth Zoo. The Game & Fish Fund and Natural Resources Fund each received \$10.7 million in lottery revenue in fiscal year 2002. The General Fund receives the remaining 13 percent of in-lieu-of-sales tax payments.

The Lottery transferred more than \$2.5 million to the State of Minnesota for problem gambling treatment and prevention. Included in this record amount was \$750,000 to Project Turnabout, an

addiction recovery center in Granite Falls that provides in-patient treatment for problem gambling, alcohol and drug dependency, domestic abuse and community violence. In 2000 a tornado destroyed most of the buildings on the campus; lottery funds contributed to the rebuilding effort. From April 1990 through June 2002, the Lottery has transferred more than \$14.7 million to the State for problem gambling treatment and prevention; since 1998, the Lottery has been the only source of State funding for this treatment.

Forty percent of lottery net proceeds (the money remaining after the in-lieu-of-sales tax, prizes, retailer commissions and operating costs are paid) is directed to the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, a permanent fund established in the Minnesota Constitution. The Trust Fund will receive lottery proceeds through December 2024.

The Trust Fund is used to fund projects of long-term benefit to Minnesota's environment and natural resources. The Trust Fund may not be used as a substitute for traditional sources of environmental or natural resource funding.



The Lottery's Environmental Experience, a traveling environmental education exhibit featuring video clips of Minnesota's natural resources, made its debut in June 2002. The outside of the exhibit displays an original, larger-than-life wildlife print commissioned by Minnesota artist Mario Fernandez. Inside the exhibit, visitors are transferred to a brilliantly restored log cabin complete with interactive touch-screen video exhibits, the sounds of nature and information and fun facts about Minnesota's natural resources.

Lottery proceeds are used to build the principal of the Trust Fund; the Minnesota Constitution provides that up to 5.5 percent of the market value of the fund can be utilized for projects each year. Applications for funding are made to the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCMR), which makes project recommendations to the full Legislature. The Legislature must pass a bill allocating the funds. Once passed, the bill may be signed or vetoed by the Governor. The Minnesota State Lottery has no

input into how or where the money is spent.

Each of Minnesota's 87 counties benefits from the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund. Some projects are highly visible and heavily used by the public, such as improvements to Fort Snelling State Park in the Twin Cities and Gooseberry Falls State Park and Split Rock Lighthouse near Two Harbors; many miles of walking and biking paths throughout the state; and numerous new fishing piers and boat ramps on popular lakes and rivers. Other projects are less visible but enable governmental agencies to collect and use important environmental information, including a survey of rare plants and animals native to Minnesota; computerized aerial maps of the state; and a geological study of groundwater to protect it from pollution. Other projects protect land from development and improve wildlife habitat.

The Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund received \$19.8 million in lottery net proceeds and \$2 million from unclaimed prizes in FY02. From April 1990 through June 2002, the Lottery has transferred over \$289.9 million to the Trust Fund, which has provided funding to 239 projects to improve Minnesota's environment and natural resources.

The remaining 60 percent of lottery net proceeds is transferred to the State General Fund. K-12 and higher education, health and human services and criminal justice are just a few of the programs that receive funding from the General Fund. The Lottery transferred \$38.5 million to the General Fund in FY02. This amount included a portion of the 6.5 percent in-lieu-of-sales tax and unclaimed prizes, along with funds used for problem gambling treatment and prevention. The Lottery has transferred \$648.2 million to the General Fund since 1990.



Minnesota companies received more than \$15.9 million for products and services they provided to the Lottery in fiscal year 2002. These companies range from the St. Cloud company that delivers lottery tickets to the sheltered workshops in the Twin Cities that package point of purchase items placed in each store. The Lottery is proud to support local businesses throughout the state.


