Introduction

The state's Design for Shared Responsibility and most institutional financial aid policies expect students to earn or borrow to pay part of their educational expenses. The State Work Study Program assists eligible Minnesota residents in paying for college through on- and offcampus employment.


This report summarizes information on the 11,978 students who participated in the State Work Study Program in Fiscal Year 2002, with particular attention to their personal and family characteristics.

Information on State Work Study earnings, job placements, institutions attended, and wages is drawn from reports on State Work Study students submitted by campuses. For this report, records of State Work Study participants were matched with records of applicants to the State Grant Program to add information on family income, age, State Grant and Pell Grant eligibility and family status. About 6 percent of the State Work Study records could not be matched; these participants may be graduate students or, for other reasons, were not included in State Grant transmittals to MHESO because they did not meet initial State Grant eligibility requirements.

By Age

Most State Work Study participants are of "traditional college age"- 22 years and

younger. Among all students at Minnesota institutions, 54 percent are under the age of 23.





to help pay for college.





By Family Status and Type of Institution


Students with children and other dependents make up 23 percent of the State Work Study students at MnSCU two year colleges. Over 90 percent of the participants at four-year private colleges were dependent students.

At all types of institutions, the majority of State Work Study students are State Grant



By State Grant Eligibility and Type of Institution


The proportion of State Work Study students who received a State Grant is approximately

the same across all types of institution.




By Federal Pell Grant Eligibility

Thirty-four percent of the State Work Study students at private four-year colleges also received a Federal Pell Grant. The proportion was twice as high–68 percent–at MnSCU two-year colleges.



By Family Income

Students from a wide range of family incomes find jobs under the State Work Study Program. Of those participants whose family income could be identified, 48 percent were from families with adjusted gross incomes of less than \$40,000.¹




¹For dependent students, the adjusted gross income reported is the income of the student's parents. For independent students, the adjusted gross income is the income of the student and, if married, the student's spouse.

By Family Income

The median family adjusted gross income was highest for dependent students. Independent

students of all types had much lower median incomes. Single parents had the lowest median


income-just a little over \$7,000.

The median family income of participants was highest in private four-year colleges. The

lowest median incomes were found at private career schools.





By Family Income

While State Work Study students are drawn from families with a wide range of incomes, the State Grant Program is relatively more targeted to lower income students and the numbers of State Grant recipients consistently decline as income increases.

Proportionately, fewer State Work Study students come from families earning less than \$40,000 than State Grant Recipients. Compared to State Grant recipients, independent students make up a smaller percentage of State Work Study participants, accounting for some of the difference in participation at the lowest income ranges since independent students who qualify for financial aid tend to have lower incomes than dependent students.

Among dependent students, the pattern still holds but is less pronounced. Four percent of dependent State Grant recipients come from families earning \$70,000 and more, compared to 17 percent of State Work Study students.







Types of State Work Study Jobs


Virtually all State Work Study participants were employed by their institutions. Only 2 percent of the jobs were as assistants to disabled or senior citizens, K-12 tutors or interns in private industry. Furthermore, these positions were developed by only a few institutions.



Students earned \$17.8 million to help pay for college in Fiscal Year 2002. Of this amount,

\$12.9 million was funded with state appropriations. Employers are required to pay at least 25

percent of the earnings of their State Work Study students.


By Type of Institution

On any given campus, the degree of "targeting" by income is influenced by student and

family incomes, campus packaging policies and the working behavior of students who are offered

State Work Study employment.

- MnSCU two-year colleges show a clear pattern of targeting their work study earnings to students with an adjusted gross income of less than \$10,000.
- State universities and the University of Minnesota show a "flatter" distribution across income ranges up to \$70,000.
- Private four-year colleges have a reverse pattern, with an increasing number of dollars earned as family income increases.



Only \$421,680 out of \$17,816121 was earned in jobs with disabled/senior citizens, for-



By Age


The median earnings for all State Work Study participants were \$1,258. Younger students tended to earn slightly more than older students.

Dependent students had the highest median earnings. Independent students without


children or other dependents tended to earn more than independent students with dependents.



By State Grant Eligibility


Median earnings were higher for students who also received a State Grant than for

By Family Income


Across all types of institutions, median earnings were similar across family income ranges.



By Type of Institution


Median earnings were highest at MnSCU state universities and lowest at private career

schools.




By Type of Work Study Job



Students who had received a State Grant tended to have higher total earnings than students


who did not receive a State Grant.



Hourly State Work Study Wage

By Type of Institution

The median hourly wage earned by all State Work Study participants was \$7.00. Hourly wages tended to be highest at private career schools, but these schools had few participants. Among the other sectors, the University of Minnesota paid, on average, the highest wages, and private four-year colleges, the lowest.
