


### FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS AND RETAILER INFORMATION

Lottery players saw the Powerball® jackpot reach or exceed \$100 million four times this fiscal year, including a new record jackpot of \$314.9 million on Dec. 25, 2002. These jackpots contributed to lottery sales of \$351.8 million in fiscal year 2003 (July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003). Online Game sales (Powerball, Gopher 5®, Daily 3®, and Hot Lotto®) totaled \$140.9 million, a new record in Minnesota, while sales of Scratch Games reached \$210.9 million. Fiscal year per capita sales averaged \$71, with a high of \$154 in Polk County and a low of \$32 in Lincoln County.

Players won \$205 million in prizes this year. Three Hot Lotto jackpots were won in Minnesota and more than 110 prizes of \$50,000 or more were claimed during the fiscal year. Thousands of players won smaller but significant prizes playing the Lottery.

The approximately 3,000 retailers selling lottery tickets earned \$22.2 million in commissions and incentives. Each store received a 5.5 percent commission on each ticket sold and 1 percent of prizes (up to \$599) paid to players who redeemed tickets in their stores.

Lottery retailers also had the opportunity to participate in special retailer-only incentives during the fiscal year. Each pack of Hit \$50! Scratch Game tickets included a special Retailer Game ticket. For each pack of Hit \$50! tickets sold in their store, the store won \$10, \$25 or \$50 on the Retailer Game ticket.

In addition to the Hit \$50! incentive, all retailers earned a double commission on every Snow Bank, Smash for Cash, Mistledough Doubler and Jingle Bucks Scratch Game ticket sold in their store.

Every time a player purchases a lottery ticket, Minnesota wins. The Minnesota State Lottery transferred over \$79.4 million to the State of Minnesota in FY03. The Legislature determines how this money is distributed. Currently, 6.5 percent of lottery sales is transferred to the State as in-lieu-of-sales tax payments — in FY03, 87 percent of this money was directed to the Game & Fish Fund for activities that improve, enhance or protect fish and wildlife resources in Minnesota; and to the Natural Resources Fund for state and Twin Cities metropolitan area parks and trails, local trails and the Minnesota Zoological Garden, Como Zoo and Duluth Zoo. The Game & Fish Fund and Natural Resources Fund each received more than \$9.9 million in Lottery revenue in fiscal year 2003. The General Fund received the remaining 13 percent of in-lieu-of-sales tax payments.

The Lottery transferred almost \$1.8 million to the State of Minnesota for problem gambling treatment and prevention in FY03. The Lottery has transferred more than \$16.5 million to the State for problem gambling treatment and prevention from April 1990 through June 2003. Of this amount, \$750,000 was dedicated to rebuild Project Turnabout in Granite Falls, one of the United States' premier facilities for the treatment of problem gambling. The in-patient treatment center officially reopened on May 2, 2003 after a tornado destroyed three of the four buildings in July 2000.

On June 21, 2003, the Minnesota State Lottery was awarded the 2003 Government Award by the National Council on Problem Gambling. This award recognizes the government agency or program that has demonstrated superior achievement in addressing issues of problem and pathological gambling.

### BENEFITS TO STATE THROUGH NET PROCEEDS AND IN-LIEU-OF-SALES TAX


Forty percent of lottery net proceeds (the money remaining after the in-lieu-of sales tax, prizes, retailer commissions and operating costs are paid) are directed to the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, a permanent fund established in the Minnesota Constitution. The Trust Fund will receive lottery proceeds through December 2024.

The Trust Fund is used to fund projects of longterm benefit to Minnesota's environment and natural resources. The Trust Fund may not be used as a substitute for traditional sources of environmental or natural resource funding.

Lottery proceeds are used to build the principal of the Trust Fund; the Minnesota Constitution provides that up to 5.5 percent of the market value of the fund can be utilized for projects each year. Through the end of FY03, the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund has provided funding to 239 projects, worth \$141 million, to improve Minnesota's environment and natural resources.

Applications for funding are made to the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCMR), which makes project recommendations to the full Legislature. The Legislature must pass a bill allocating the funds. Once passed, the bill may be signed or vetoed by the Governor. The Minnesota State Lottery has no input into how or where the money is spent.

The Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund received \$21.9 million in lottery net proceeds (and a portion of unclaimed prizes) in FY03. From April 1990 through June 2003, the Lottery has transferred over \$311.8 million to the Trust Fund.



### BENEFITS TO STATE THROUGH NET PROCEEDS AND IN-LIEU-OF-SALES TAX

Each of Minnesota's 87 counties has received money from the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund. These projects include the construction of hiking and biking trails, like the Gitchi Gami Trail from Two Harbors to Grand Marais and the Mesabi Trail from Grand Rapids to Ely; land acquisition and improvements at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum in Chanhassen; programs to help landowners better manage their property; helping people with disabilities enjoy the outdoors; restoring prairies; controlling exotic species like Eurasian water milfoil; educating school children about the environment; and improving hunting and fishing opportunities throughout Minnesota.

### FY 2003 Revenue: \$353.29 million

The remaining 60 percent of lottery net proceeds is transferred to the State General Fund. K-12 and higher education, health and human services and criminal justice are just a few of the programs that receive funding from the General Fund. The Lottery transferred \$37.6 million to the General Fund in FY03. This amount included a portion of the 6.5 percent in-lieu-of-sales tax and unclaimed prizes, along with funds used for problem gambling treatment and prevention. The Lottery has transferred \$685.8 million to the General Fund since 1990.

Minnesota companies received more than \$14.5 million for products and services they provided to the Lottery in fiscal year 2003. The Lottery is proud to support local businesses throughout the state.

### **NEW TECHNOLOGY AT THE LOTTERY**

The Lottery initiated several cost-saving initiatives during fiscal year. On Feb. 9, 2003, the Lottery introduced a new Online Game system that features touch-screen terminals and satellite technology with IP communications. In addition to providing new technology and exciting new possibilities for players and retailers, the new system, operated by GTECH Corporation, will cost about \$4 million per year less than the previous system.



One of the features of the new Online system is the ability to participate in the statewide Amber Alert system. When an Amber Alert is issued, each of Minnesota's 3,000 retailers will receive information about the missing child, information about the suspect (if known) and information about the suspect's vehicle (if known). When photos of the missing child or suspect become available, they will also appear on the terminal screen. Each retailer is asked to print and prominently post the information in their store. On May 7, 2003, just days after the new technology was tested, the Lottery broadcast the first Amber Alert message on all sales terminals throughout Minnesota.

On March 1, 2003, the Minnesota State Lottery's televised drawing show got a new look when a digital drawing system replaced the in-studio draws. The winning numbers are generated by an independently certified random number generator, then integrated into an animated presentation. An independent auditor continues to oversee each drawing. This new technology also allows players to view the daily drawings on the Lottery's Web site. The new drawing

system will save an estimated \$600,000

each year.

### **SCRATCH GAMES AND WINNERS**

Scratch Games continued to be the favorite games of Minnesota State Lottery players in fiscal year 2003. Sales of these games reached 60 percent of sales, or \$210.9 million. The Lottery introduced 40 new Scratch Games during the fiscal year. These games featured a variety of themes, play styles, top prizes and price points. Players claimed 28 cash prizes between \$50,000 and \$250,000 during the fiscal year, while six players claimed a non-cash top prize of a Ford Ranger XLT or a Harley-Davidson® Motorcycle.

The \$3 Harley-Davidson® Scratch Game offered a top prize of a Harley-Davidson® Heritage Softail® Classic Motorcycle. Players could mail non-winning Harley-Davidson® Scratch Game tickets to the Lottery for a second-chance drawing to win Harley-Davidson® merchandise and a 100th Anniversary Motorcycle.

### **ONLINE GAMES AND WINNERS**

For the second year in a row, the Lottery set a new sales record for its Online Games. The redesigned multi-state Powerball® game, launched in October 2002, led the sales increase. A record \$314.9 million Powerball jackpot on December 25, 2002, along with three other jackpots that reached or exceeded \$100 million, led to Minnesota's sales record of \$140.9 million.

While Minnesota did not have a Powerball jackpot winner in FY03, fifty-four tickets worth \$100,000 each were sold in Minnesota.

Powerball produced over 2.7 million winning tickets in Minnesota during the fiscal year, paying players more than \$19.6 million in prizes. Many players purchased Powerball's Power Play® option which, for an extra \$1 per play, allows them to increase their Powerball prize (except the jackpot) by two to five times the set amount. During the fiscal year, 62,674 ticket holders won almost \$1.3 million in Power Play prizes in Minnesota.

The multi-state Hot Lotto® game produced three jackpot winners in Minnesota in fiscal year 2003. The jackpots ranged from \$1.3 million to \$2.35 million. In addition to the jackpot winners, Hot Lotto paid more than \$5.6 million to the holders of 569,560 winning tickets.

Gopher 5°, Minnesota's own cash lotto game, generated 29 jackpot-winning tickets in FY03. The jackpots ranged from \$100,000 to \$347,073. Gopher 5 paid more than \$9.3 million to 245,602 lucky ticket holders.


Daily  $3^{\circ}$  continues to be a very steady performer for the Lottery. The three-digit game paid the holders of 58,393 winning tickets more than \$6.9 million during the fiscal year.

### **ONLINE GAMES AND WINNERS**

Shirley Winston of Bloomington became Minnesota's first Hot Lotto® jackpot winner when one set of numbers on her five-line ticket matched those drawn on September 4, 2002 to win the \$2.35 million jackpot. Winston purchased the ticket at Normandale Citgo, 8331 Normandale Blvd. in Bloomington when she stopped for gas, ice cream and pop. Winston selected the \$1.37 million cash option jackpot.

About four months after Winston claimed her jackpot prize, Jerry Hess of Apple Valley celebrated his Hot Lotto jackpot win. The second line on his two-line ticket matched all five balls plus the Hot Ball on January 18, 2003, netting Hess the \$1.3 million jackpot (he selected the \$794,621 cash option). Hess purchased his winning ticket at PDQ, 14265 Essex Ave. in Apple Valley.

On April 6, 2003, a Minneapolis couple won the \$2.2 million Hot Lotto jackpot with a ticket purchased at Holiday, 7525 Brooklyn Blvd. in Brooklyn Park. The couple chose the cash option of \$1.36 million.

### **ONLINE GAMES AND WINNERS**

Many Minnesota players, especially those who play Powerball®, pool their money with friends and coworkers. Among the holders of 54 Powerball tickets sold in Minnesota that won \$100,000 during the fiscal year were 16 coworkers at Hornbacher Foods in Moorhead. The group, who called themselves "The Sweet 16," won the prize on Aug. 21, 2002. On April 8, 2003, twenty coworkers at a company in Little Falls, who called themselves the "20 Lucky Bucks," claimed a \$100,000 prize from the April 2, 2003 drawing.

Gopher 5 paid off for 29 lucky ticket holders, who matched the first five numbers drawn to win the jackpot, which starts at \$100,000 and grows until it is won.



### POWERBALL INSTANT MILLIONAIRE™

Players continued to represent Minnesota as contestants on Powerball-The Game Show®. Game show viewers saw a revamped show beginning with the episode that aired on Oct. 5, 2002. The show, renamed Powerball Instant Millionaire<sup>™</sup>, is now filmed at The Venetian® Hotel in Las Vegas. The show features new games and a new host, Todd Newton. Each week, one TV contestant is selected to represent Minnesota on the game show for the chance to win \$1 million, while other players are selected to win cash prizes by playing along at home. Michael Rizzo of Shorewood was Minnesota's biggest game show winner during the fiscal year — he won \$101,000 on the show that aired on Feb. 1, 2003.




