A Report to the Legislature Fulfilling Minnesota Statute 473.254 Section 5, Subsection 9

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T he mission of the Metropolitan Council is to improve regional competitiveness in the global economy so that this is one of the best places to live, work, raise a family and grow a business.

The Metropolitan Council coordinates regional planning and guides development in the seven-county area through joint action with the public and private sectors. The Council also operates regional services, including wastewater collection and treatment, transit and the Metro HRA - an affordable-housing service that provides assistance to low-income seniors, disabled individuals and families in the region. Created by the legislature in 1967, the Council establishes policies for airports, regional parks, highways and transit, sewers, air and water quality, land use and affordable housing, and provides planning and technical assistance to communities in the Twin Cities region.

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INTRODUCTION

The Metropolitan Livable Communities Act (LCA) requires the Metropolitan Council to report by February 1 of every year which municipalities elected to participate and which did not elect to participate in the local housing incentive account program for that calendar year (Minnesota Statutes 473.254, section 5, subsection 9).

PARTICIPATION IN 2003

The LCA supports regional policy which calls for the expansion of the opportunities for affordable and life-cycle housing throughout the region, creative planning that links jobs, transportation and housing, and revitalization of the region's older cities. Communities within the seven-county area that participate in the local housing incentives account program may receive grants or loans from the four funds in the LCA. These funds are the tax base revitalization account, livable communities demonstration account, the local housing incentives account and the inclusionary housing account. Only LCA participating communities may apply for and receive grants from the polluted sites clean-up program administered by the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development. In addition, the Council "shall give consideration to a municipality's participation" when making discretionary funding decisions such as federal TEA 21 transportation funding.

During 2003, 106 communities were participants in the LCA's local housing incentives program. During the year two cities – Eagan and Maple Plain – elected to begin or renew participation in the LCA during 2004. This means current participation involves 108 communities.


