

Dear Chairman Sweeney, and Fellow Commissioners:

The Annual Report of the Inspector of Mines for the year 2004 is herewith submitted.

While this has been another difficult year in the mining industry in Northern Minnesota, there have been some encouraging developments recently with the opening of United Taconite and the potential for future growth in production due to long-term contracts with other nations. This potential does come with a further reduction in employees per ton of taconite produced in order to reduce the cost of production. While the re-opening of Eveleth Mines as United Taconite is good news for St. Louis County and the State, it brings with it the need for continued vigilance on everyone's part to ensure that the industry continues to provide a safe working environment for not only its employees but the general public as well.

The total employment for the year was 3,444 and these people worked a total of 7,169,588 manhours.

There was no natural ore shipped and 42,059,597 tons of taconite pellets shipped from these mines. There were 58,250,654 tons of stripping and waste removed from these mines.

Inspections and visits for 2004 were as follows: Approximately 520 inspections, visits and investigations were made to the operating and non-operating mines. There were no fatalities and 24 lost time or serious accidents reported.

Acknowledgement and appreciation is extended to both Labor and Management for their continued interest, efforts and cooperation in the field of safety and health throughout the mines and plants in St. Louis County.

Excerpts from the Law On

INSPECTOR OF MINES

CHAPTER 180

MINNESOTA STATUTES

SECTION 180.04

REQUIRING EMPLOYEES TO WORK AFTER ORDER TO QUIT; LIABILITY OF EMPLOYER

If any person is required to continue work in any place in which the inspector of mines has ordered employees to quit work, as aforesaid, except to do such work as may have been by the inspector required to be done in order to render such place safe, ordinary risks of mining excepted, the persons or corporations so requiring employees to work in such place shall be liable for all accidents causing injury or death to any employee arising by reason of such place not having been repaired or changed as required by the inspector.

NON-FATAL LOST-TIME AND SERIOUS ACCIDENTS

ISPAT - INLAND MINING COMPANY

Weldor, Date of Accident - March 29, 2004. The injured suffered arc flash to his eyes while welding in confined quarters with another welder. Cause of this accident was the confined location with two weldors in close proximity of one another creating a hazard. Days lost- 2.

Crusher conveyor attendant, Date of Accident - April 15, 2004. Injured suffered a Grade III sprain to the right ankle when she stepped on a hose that was strung across a stairway and rolled her ankle. Cause of this accident was the unsafe condition of a hose strung across a stairway. Days lost - 100.

Millwright, Date of Accident - May 7, 2004. Injured strained his right calf while pushing on a door to close it. There were no hazardous conditions or triggering event to cause this accident. Days lost -18.

UNITED TACONITE LLC

MINE

Mine Operations, Utility Driver. Date of Accident - Jan 18, 2004. The employee was walking back to the fuel station, climbed over the berm, foot caught on the berm resulting in a fall, resulting in a fracture to the leg. Days lost -100.

Mine Maintenance, Electrical Tech. Date of Accident- February 20, 2004. The employee was drilling through a modified valve handle clamped in a vise on a drill press table. The valve was also held by hand with a pair of adjustable pliers. The handle came out of the vise and caught the right index finger with the drill. Days lost - 7.

PLANT

Plant Operations, OMT. Date of Accident - January 8, 2004. The 31B concentrator reject conveyor became overloaded with chunks requiring employee to climb into the discharge chute of vibrating screen to toss out frost chunks. Upon re-entering the chute to clear additional frost chunks, employee misjudged the drop resulting in a fracture to his left leg. Days lost - 33.

Plant Operations, Lab Tech. Date of Accident - July 2, 2004. The employee was taking a pellet sample using the 21A mechanical sampler. Employee emptied sample bucket using a two-handed underhand toss motion while holding the bucket horizontally. After taking a second cut, he started to carry the sample; he felt a pain in the groin area resulting in a groin strain. Days lost - 5.

Plant Maintenance, MM. Date of Accident - June 3, 2004. The employee was crouched down holding a roller in both arms and when he stood up felt a muscle twitch in the back which resulted in a back strain. Days lost - 13.

Plant Maintenance, MM. Date of Accident - June 6, 2004. While investigating the malfunction of an a/c unit on the General Office roof the employee stepped over an electric conduit and when foot came down he slipped on the gravel roofing material resulting in a twisted knee. Days lost - 39.

HIBBING TACONITE COMPANY

James Dietrich, Weldor, Date of Accident - January 12, 2004. Injured was assigned with a partner to weld sections of 30" pipe, 40 feet long, together. One length of pipe was being moved into the central shops building with the use of 2 forklifts. The pipe was cradled between the forks on both ends, carried low to the ground to have an unobstructed view of the pipe while moving. The forklifts were to carry the pipe into the building, when the overhead crane would take over movement of the pipe. The pipe was inside, in the position for the crane to take the lift, when the first forklift stopped. The injured moved with his partner to measure for the mid-point of the pipe to make further lifts. The pipe had a beveled end which would not allow for a tape measure to hook the end without being held. The injured placed the tape end on the pipe with his right hand holding it in the proper place when the pipe moved lengthwise into the stopped forklift pinching the injured man's little finger between the pipe and the top of the fork on the forklift. Days Lost - 25.

Allen Caliguiri, Electrician, Date of Accident - January 26, 2004. Injured was shoveling snow in the vicinity of the ramp to the Dravo building. The exertion caused injured to sprain his back and knee. Days Lost - 4.

Michael Charon, Weldor, Date of Accident - February 18, 2004. Injured was lifting a section of screen grate inside an area to be welded on. While lifting the grate, injured felt a pain in the groin area. This resulted in a hernia. Days Lost - 20.

John Wilton, Tractor Operator, Date of Accident - June 6, 2004. Injured was descending the ladder on the left side of a motor grader. While descending, injured missed the bottom step and fell to the ground, striking the left rear tire. This resulted in a lower back strain. Days Lost - 20.

Thomas Anderson, Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident - August 17, 2004. Injured was changing a lip shroud on an electric shovel. While lifting the shroud, which weighs approximately 90 pounds, he felt pain in his right groin area. This resulted in a strain to the groin. Days Lost - 16.

Terrance Samsa, Maintenance Mechanic, Date of Accident - September 17, 2004. Injured was in the process of changing a feed chute elbow, deck elbow and rotating a pipe. While working on top of the feed end trunnion to access the victaulic coupling on the feed chute elbow, he felt a pain in his lower back when he tried to position the coupling. This resulted in a lower back strain. Days Lost - 3.

No Accidents Reported for 2003, not Operating

KEEWATIN TACONITE

Phil Dotzler, Operating Tech II, Date of Accident - February 8, 2004. Injured was exiting the Mine Reporting/Dry Building via the Supervisors entrance. As injured exited the office he stepped on some ice and his left foot slipped while his right foot was caught in a groove in the ice. As injured fell his right foot did not release from the groove, which resulted in a broken leg, sprained ankle and a damaged ankle ligament. Days Lost - 74.

Alan Ryan, Operating Tech I, Drills. Date of Accident - April 29, 2004. During the pre-shift inspection the injured was in the drill machinery house checking the fluid levels. The hydraulic level was low and was filled by the employee. When leaving the house after filling the tank the injured slipped at the compressor area. The drill floor had oil seepage in the walkway and had absorbent pads in place. It is unknown whether the seepage was completely covered. No oil puddles were visible to the injured on entering the drill. The slip and fall resulted in a torn right rotator cuff. Days Lost - 58.

NORTHSHORE MINING COMPANY

Everett McCormick, Senior Tech, Date of Accident - February 24, 2004. Injured was making up a new quick coupler connection on an air line using a hand-held banding tool. While tightening the band, the tool slipped and tipped causing injured's left hand to be caught in the tool. This resulted in a laceration to the left index finger. Days Lost - 2.

Hugo Scholz, Electrician, Date of Accident - May 13, 2004. Injured was tightening a ball hitch on the bumper of a pickup truck. While applying pressure to the wrench, his right little finger was caught in a pinch point between the wrench and the bumper. The sharp bumper edge caused the skin on the finger to be torn. Days Lost - None.

Charles Kidd, Maintenance, Date of Accident - March 24, 2004. Injured was changing a track pad on a Model 295 BE shovel. The track pad crushed his hand causing dislocations in the hand and wrist that had to be surgically repaired. Days Lost - 24.

USX CORPORATION, MINNTAC MINE

Charles Mattson, Maintenance Tech, Mechanic, Date of Accident - May 5, 2004. Injured and mill crew were assigned to remove pie liners from the inside of the mill. The liners were loosened and secured in place by a safety bolt. The crew members were on the outside of the mill while the liners were being knocked down from the inside of the mill. As the third liner dropped, approximately 3-1/2 feet, it struck another liner, causing a fragment of metal 1" in diameter x 1/4" to fly out of the mill. Being where the injured was sitting, it is believed that the fragment had to ricochet off of the trunnion sleeve on the opposite side of the mill before striking injured's leg. This resulted in a laceration to the left thigh. Days Lost -13.

Bob Gustafson, Utility Tech. Date of Accident - September 28, 2004. Injured was coiling a two-inch diameter hose of several lengths while working between the 110-01-1 and 110-02-1 mills in the concentrator. Although drained, the hose was heavy and also difficult to coil because of tangles. When the task was nearly complete, a portion of the hose became caught on a floor mounted rod charger stop. He attempted to free the hose from a distance of about three feet while bending at the waist, twisting his torso, and reaching behind. The employee felt pain in his back as he did so, resulting in a back strain. Days lost - 3.

James Lautiger, Maintenance Tech. Electric. Date of Accident - October 8, 2004. Employee was servicing the #2 Electric Shovel. Servicing involves checking and maintaining a list of items at various places throughout the equipment. While walking across the shovel roof toward the operator's cab, the employee stumbled. He prevented a fall by catching himself with his right leg. His left knee was injured with damaged cartilage. Days lost - None in 2004. Time lost started in 2005.

Ronald Backstrom, Lab Utilityman, Date of Accident - September 15, 2004. Injured was collecting pellet samples from a conveyor in the pelletizer. Injured placed 4 sample scoops of pellets in the sample bucket and was proceeding to his truck. As injured was descending a set of stairs, with the bucket in his right hand and holding the handrail with his left, he caught his boot heel on the 4th step from the top and fell backwards. Injured's left hand stayed on the handrail, which resulted in his left shoulder being jerked, causing injuries requiring surgical repair in 2005. Days Lost - 0 in 2004.
