Impact of Legislative Impasse on School Districts, Charter Schools, Libraries, and

Non-Profits

As you know, the Minnesota State Legislature concluded its regular 2005 session on May 23, 2005, without enacting a K-12 education budget bill. Although a special session began immediately after the end of the regular session, there can be no assurance that a K-12 education budget bill will be enacted by July 1, 2005. The K-12 education budget bill appropriates funds for the payment of state aids to school districts and charter schools, authorizes the allocation of federal aids received by the state to school districts and charter schools, authorizes funding for libraries and appropriates funds for ongoing Department of Education operations. This letter is to notify you of the potential impacts on school districts, charter schools, libraries, and non-profits in the event that no K-12 education budget bill is enacted by July 1, 2005.

STATE AGENCY OPERATIONS

If funds are not appropriated for ongoing Department of Education operations by July 1, all Department operations would be shut down immediately on July 1, 2005, except for functions that will be presented to the Courts and as outlined in this memorandum. The Department of Finance, the Department of Revenue, certain other state agencies and the Legislature would remain open, because funding has been appropriated in other bills that have been enacted. OPEN AND STANDING APPROPRIATIONS

General education aid, property tax credits, and debt service equalization aid are funded with open or standing appropriations. In the absence of legislation changing the funding formulas for these programs and specifically appropriating funds for the next biennium, payments will be made using the formulas in effect for fiscal year 2005. In addition to the basic formula, general education aid includes compensatory, limited English proficiency, extended time, sparsity, transportation sparsity, operating capital, training and experience, equity, transition and referendum aid. The Department of Education will calculate the aid payment amounts for these programs before June 30 based on February 2005 current law forecast data. Some delays may occur in processing these payments due to the very limited availability of some Department of Education staff to assist in resolving any issues that may arise in aid payment processing. STATE AND FEDERAL CATEGORICAL AND FORMULA AIDS

State categorical aids are appropriated by fiscal year in the biennial budget, with each fiscal year beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following calendar year. Our current biennial budget is due to end on June 30, 2005. In the absence of legislation specifically appropriating funds for state categorical aids to school districts, charter schools, libraries, and non-profits for the next biennium, we will have no authority to make payments for these programs after June 30, 2005. The K-12 education budget bill also authorizes the Department of Education to distribute all federal grants and aids to school districts, charter schools, and other agencies. In the absence of legislation specifically authorizing the Department of Education to make these payments, we will have no authority to make payments for these programs after June 30, 2005. However, Governor Pawlenty will request that the Courts allow some appropriations to proceed forward at FY 2006 current law funding. It should be noted that while FY 2006 current law funding will proceed forward, there will be no or limited staff available to make corrections into any of the systems to update student counts and/or other information. Staff will be available to make system updates and corrections once an education budget bill passes the legislature and is signed by the governor. CREDIT ENHANCEMENT APPLICATIONS

If funds are not appropriated for ongoing Department of Education operations by July 1, applications for participation in the school district credit enhancement program under Minnesota Statutes, Section 126C.55, must be submitted to the Department of Finance, instead of the Department of Education, for the duration of the shutdown. School districts must also notify the Department of Finance, instead of the Department of Education, if the district believes it may be unable to make a principal and interest payment on any outstanding debt obligation on the date it is due. The notification must be provided as soon as possible, but not less than 15 working days before the date the payment is due. Please direct these materials to:

SPECIAL EDUCATION MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT

State and federal special education funding will proceed forward at FY 2006 current law funding. However, two issues should be noted. First, there will be limited staff to update systems and make any corrections to the data. Therefore, this function will not occur during the government shutdown. All updates and corrections will happen once an education budget bill has passed and is signed by the governor. Second, the Governor's biennial budget to the legislature recommended an additional \$12 million each year in FY 2006-07 in funding for the excess cost aid formula in order to maintain effort

with federal requirements and funding. If the legislature fails to appropriate an additional \$12 million per year in state aid, the State and schools districts will lose \$12 million in federal special education funding starting in FY 2007. STATEWIDE TESTING PROGRAM

As you may know, Minnesota is under extreme deadlines for compliance with the federal requirement *No Child Left Behind*. Failure of the State to meet the deadlines will result in significant consequences, including loss of federal funding to school districts and charter schools. In order to preserve federal funding, the Department of Education will proceed forward with its obligations for the statewide testing program and the requirements for Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). However, staffing for these activities will be extremely limited. The schedule for the Basic Skills Test (BST) and activities for the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs) will continue as follows:
