History

In 1967, the legislature began regulating the practice of law enforcement by creating the Minnesota Peace Officer Training Board (MPOTB). The Board's main responsibility was to certify agencies offering police academy training in the hopes that police training would become standardized across the state.

In 1977, several amendments to the original legislation were passed abolishing the MPOTB and replacing it with the Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST).

The mission of the POST Board was to create the first law enforcement occupational licensing system in the United States. The system established licensing and training requirements and set standards for law enforcement agencies and officers. Today, the Board continues to develop, maintain and enforce standards for selection, education and licensing.

Compared to other states, Minnesota's licensing system is unique because it requires all peace officers to obtain a post-secondary degree. Also, there is no state-sponsored police training academy as in most other states. Since its inception, POST's standards have been recognized as a model for many other states that have subsequently adopted similar systems.

Mission

The mission of the POST Board is to regulate and enhance the profession of law enforcement across the state of Minnesota through the selection, education and licensing standards of peace officers.

The Board licenses and regulates more than 10,200 peace officers and over 470 law enforcement agencies. It also certifies the colleges and universities throughout the state that provide professional peace officer education programs.

Like other state regulatory agencies, POST implements policies and procedures enacted by the legislature. The Board and committee meetings are often focused on finding ways to make the requirements meaningful and palatable to the officers, law enforcement agencies, higher education providers and students impacted by the laws. POST's philosophy is to serve as a resource and partner with stakeholders to ensure compliance with state policy and training mandates before lapses occur.

Key Service Components

- Manage occupational licensing program including initial licensure and renewal
- Create and administer licensing examinations
- Develop and maintain learning objectives for the colleges and universities offering professional peace officer education programs
- Certify professional peace officer education programs include and deliver learning objectives
- Approve law enforcement-related continuing education courses
- Monitor compliance of continuing education requirements for peace officers
- Administer a training reimbursement fund to assist law enforcement agencies defray costs of continuing education
- Establish and enforce minimum standards of conduct for peace officers
- Oversee law enforcement agency compliance with mandated policies and procedures
- Promulgate administrative rules pertaining to selection, education and training standards
- Monitor Board-specific and law enforcement-related legislative activities by meeting with key legislators and tracking legislative committees
- Provide technical assistance to colleges, universities, law enforcement agencies and other groups concerned with the practice of law enforcement and law enforcement education
- Participate in meetings, conferences, task forces, etc. representing POST's interest in law enforcement and public safety issues
- Respond to requests for information and interviews by television, radio and print media
- Answer constituent inquiries received via email, mail or the main telephone line
- Perform other services as mandated by the legislature

Board Membership

Per Minnesota Statutes 626.841, the Governor appoints fifteen members to the Board for staggered four-year terms and names the chairperson. The law dictates the membership be comprised of the following:

- two members from among county sheriffs in Minnesota,
- four members from among peace officers in Minnesota municipalities, at least two of whom shall be chiefs of police,
- two members from among peace officers, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Minnesota state patrol association,
- the superintendent of the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension or a designee,
- two members from among peace officers, or former peace officers, who are currently employed on a full-time basis in a professional peace officer education program,
- one member from among administrators of Minnesota colleges or universities that offer professional peace officer education,
- one member from among the elected city officials in statutory or home rule charter cities of under 5,000 population outside the metropolitan area, and
- two members from among the general public.

Board and Committees

The board of an organization establishes and maintains the policies and procedures necessary to fulfill their mission. The POST board responds to their members' constituencies as well as the governor's office, the legislature, other state agencies, law enforcement-related professional organizations and other special interest and community groups.

The full board meets four times per year. In addition, committees of the board meet as needed and are called by the committee's chairperson. The committees are subordinate to the board and must report their recommendations back to the board for authority to act. For the full board and all committees, a majority vote of members present and voting is needed take action.

Board

- The chair is a board member appointed by the governor. In the absence of the chair, the vice-chair serves. The vice-chair is elected for a twelve month term by the entire board with a majority vote at the first meeting after new board members are appointed each year. The board functions as a voting body and each member has one vote.
- Members are expected to have a working knowledge of state government in general, the board's scope and mission, administrative rules, the board's bylaws, and rules of the organization.

Executive Committee

- The executive committee consists of the board chair, vice-chair and four other members. The purpose of the executive committee is to advise and assist the administrative staff.
- The committee is empowered to act on matters that require immediate action, except when such action might affect or modify existing board policies and procedures.

Bylaws Committee

- The bylaws committee is comprised of three members, including the chair. The bylaws define and control the conduct of the board.
- The committee meets to review the language of the current bylaws and, if necessary, recommend changes to the full board.

Standards Committee

- The committee is comprised of seven members including the committee chair and vice-chair.
- The purpose of the standards committee is to review and make recommendations relating to minimum selection standards and standards of conduct for peace officers.

Training Committee

- The committee has seven members including the committee chair and vice-chair.
- The purpose of the committee is to review and make recommendations to the board on the certification of post-secondary law enforcement programs in Minnesota, licensing exams and continuing education of peace officers.

Complaint Committee

- The complaint committee consists of three board members, two of which must be peace officers. All three members must be present for a quorum.
- The purpose of the complaint committee is to regulate the management and processing of complaints relative to allegations of administrative rule violations by chief law enforcement officers and for any alleged violation of the standards of conduct for licensed peace officers as defined in *Minnesota Rules*, Chapter 6700.1600.

Special Committees

- The board chair may create and empower special committees consisting of at least three members.

Biennial Budget

The POST Board is funded through a special revenue account from a surcharge on certain criminal and traffic offenses. Although the law (§ 357.021, subds 6. & 7.) directs the state treasurer to credit 39% of the proceeds to the Peace Officer Training Account, POST's budget cannot exceed the legislated base appropriation.

One-time Appropriation

In the 2005 public safety omnibus bill, \$140,000 was appropriated to POST to upgrade its technology by adding e-government services to its website. "Can I do it on-line?" is one of the most commonly asked questions from stakeholders. The Board hopes to offer several interactive functions such as:

- processing forms,
- completing applications,
- managing personnel information, and
- submitting payments.

Currently, the Board is working with the Office of Enterprise Technology to negotiate a contract with an approved vendor.

Dedicated Receipts

POST receives an appropriation to reimburse law enforcement agencies to help defray their peace officer training costs. Continuing education is essential for law enforcement to learn the skills necessary to ensure public safety. In recent years, training needs have become increasingly more complex and costly while the reimbursement amount has remained stagnant.

The 2005 Omnibus Public Safety bill included a dedicated fee to increase the reimbursement amount to local units of government for continuing education training of peace officers. The \$20 fee is paid for the reinstatement of a driver's license in two non-DWI related instances – suspension for failure to appear and suspension for unpaid fines.

Website

The POST Board website averages 63 visitors per day. It is a widely used resource by potential peace officers, students in the professional peace officer education programs and licensed officers. Below is a picture of POST's home page. It lists Board-related links, featured links, FAQs and specific topics. The first page also highlights current information such as a new policy or licensing updates.

Effective August 1st, 2006, POST will begin using a revised application for firearms certification as part of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act of 2004. Please distribute only copies of the updated application that reads, "Rev. 7/06" on the lower, right-hand corner of the page.

The language of the law has not changed, but in an effort to follow national standards, retired officers are now required to submit a copy of their Agency-issued, photographic identification with their application.

In-Service Policy, Training and Reporting

Basic Peace Officer and Part-time Peace Officer Continuing

Education Requirements for License Maintenance

1. *Peace officers and part-time peace officers must successfully complete 48 hours of law enforcement related continuing education every three years. The training must be registered with the POST Board for officers to renew their licenses.*
2. *Active peace officers and active part-time peace officers must complete use of force training every year. This training must be based on the employing agency's use of force policy and the learning objectives provided by the POST Board (see item 1 below). The learning objectives are available on POST Board's website.*
3. *Active peace officers and part-time peace officers must complete training in emergency vehicle operations and police pursuit every three years. This training must be at least eight hours in length and be based on the employing agency's pursuit policy and the learning objectives provided by the POST Board (see item 2 below). The learning objectives are available on POST Board's website.*

STATUTE OR RULE

REQUIREMENT

The CLEO of each agency must establish and enforce a written agency policy. **REQUIRED POLICY**

Yearly training for each active peace officer and part-time peace officer is required and training records must be maintained by the employing agency. The instruction must be based on learning objectives developed by POST and on the agency's policy. The number of hours of training is not specified. The learning objectives are available on POST Board's website.

Policy must be identical or substantially similar to the model policy developed by POST. REQUIRED POLICY</p> <p>The CLEO must report the summary incident data to POST annually.</p>

Response to Reports of Missing & Endangered Children</p> <p>MN STAT 626.8454, subd. 3</p> <p>MN STAT 299C.53</p>	<p>CLEO must have a written policy and procedures based on the model policy developed by POST. Minnesota Peace Officer Licensing Requirements Information for Prospective Students

The Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST Board) coordinates a system of licensing for all Peace Officers in the state. Any person employed as a Peace Officer by a Minnesota law enforcement agency must hold a POST Board license. In order to be licensed by the POST Board, prospective Peace Officers must pass certain selection criteria and meet specific education requirements. A three-step procedure for attaining a Minnesota Peace Officer license is as follows:

STEP 1: PROFESSIONAL PEACE OFFICER EDUCATION (PPOE)

• To become eligible for a Minnesota Peace Officer License, students must earn a two- or four-year degree from one of twenty POST-certified Peace Officer education programs (list available). Interested individuals should contact any of the PPOE program coordinators for enrollment information. The coordinator can explain more about the program at that school and whether or not any previous course work may be applied toward their program.

• Individuals who hold a two- or four-year degree from a non-POST certified school or out-of-state educational institution are not required to complete another degree program. These individuals are eligible to complete a certificate program of study which generally requires the completion of only the law enforcement education courses. Contact program coordinators for more information.

Participation Requirements for Admission to a Professional Peace Officer education Program (*Minnesota Rules* 6700.0300, subp.5)

No student may be admitted to a PPOE program who:

1. Poses a serious threat to the health or safety of themselves or others;
2. Has been convicted of any crime listed as a disqualification from appointment to the position of peace officer under part 6700.0700.

Minimum Selection Standards for Hiring a Person Eligible for Licensing by Law Enforcement Agencies (*Minnesota Rules* 6700.0700)

Applicants should also be aware of the Minimum Selection Standards for hiring a person eligible for licensing by law enforcement agencies. The following is a summary of those standards as set forth in *Minnesota Rules* 6700.0700.

The applicant must:

1. Be a citizen of the United States;
2. Possess a valid driver's license or be eligible to obtain such in Minnesota or in case of residency therein, a valid driver's license from a contiguous state; or eligibility to obtain either license;
3. Complete a comprehensive written application;
4. Submit to a thorough background investigation;
5. Not have been convicted of a felony or under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 609.224, 609.2242, 609.231, 609.2325, 609.233, 609.2335, 609.234, 609.324, 609.465, 609.466, 609.52, or 609.72, subdivision 3; or convicted under any state or federal narcotics or controlled substance law irrespective of any proceeding under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 152.18, or any similar law of another state or federal law; or any of the crimes listed in this item in another state or federal jurisdiction, or under a local ordinance that would be a conviction if committed in Minnesota;
6. Be fingerprinted for background check;
7. Undergo a thorough medical examination;
8. Undergo an evaluation by a licensed psychologist;
9. Pass a job-related examination of physical strength and agility;
10. Successfully complete an oral examination demonstrating communication skills.

STEP 2: PEACE OFFICER LICENSING EXAMINATION

After successfully completing the degree program, or the certificate program, students must pass the Minnesota Peace Officer Licensing Examination.

"Violations of the following standards," according to *Minnesota Rules* 6700.0601, "shall be grounds to deny an applicant to take an examination or to deny eligibility for a license."

The standards are summarized as follows:

1. Making any false material statement to the Board;
2. Communicating with any other person during the examination;
3. Unauthorized reference to books or study materials during the examination;
4. Obstructing a Board investigation;
5. Unauthorized possession of any Board examination;

6. Aiding another person in the violation of the above standards;
7. Has been convicted of any crime listed as a disqualification from appointment to the position of peace officer under part 6700.0700, subpart 1, item E.

STEP 3: ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSURE

Students who have successfully completed the required PPOE and passed the peace officer licensing examination are termed "eligible to be licensed." However, completing the education requirements and passing the licensing examination does not result in licensure. Individuals who are "eligible to be licensed" are not licensed until they are hired by a law enforcement agency and can satisfy the Minimum Selection Standards listed earlier. In their hiring process a law enforcement agency may apply its own additional standards. The hiring agency also determines the physical standards its own personnel must meet.

Licensed Peace Officers and Part-time Peace Officers

In Minnesota there are two types of licenses: peace officer and part-time peace officer, and two status categories: active and inactive. A licensed peace officer must graduate from a two- or four-year professional peace officer education program. A part-time licensed peace officer must complete an 80-hour educational curriculum, be supervised by a licensed peace officer and work no more than 1,080 hours annually. An officer's license is active if they are employed by a law enforcement agency. An inactive license indicates the officer is not currently employed by an agency, but they have not exceeded the three year license cycle.

A total of 11,518 officers were licensed in Minnesota as of June 30, 2006. Of the licensed peace officers, there were 9,833 active and 1,283 inactive. The number of active part-time licensed peace officers was 318 and 84 were inactive.

Licensing Examinations

The Board's rules require candidates for peace officer licensing meet minimum selection standards including educational, non-conviction of certain crimes and job-related physical and psychological fitness. The rules also require candidates to pass a written examination to be eligible for licensure. Individuals who become eligible to be licensed do not receive their license until hired by a law enforcement agency.

The three licensing exams administered by the POST Board are peace officer, reciprocity and part-time peace officer. Candidates who pass a licensing exam are eligible to be licensed for a period of three years.

Peace Officer Licensing Examination

- For candidates who have successfully completed a professional peace officer education program.

The peace officer licensing examination is administered a minimum of six times annually. The exam is always offered in the metropolitan area. When a second site is justified by the demand, the exam is also offered in greater Minnesota.

Reciprocity Examination

- For individuals who are certified peace officers in another state, a federal jurisdiction or who have served in the military as military police officers for a period of five or more years of active duty and have received an honorable discharge.
- Eligibility is based on a combination of basic police training and experience.

Part-time Peace Officer Examination

- For individuals who have completed selection and training standards for part-time peace officers.
- Must be under the sponsorship of a law enforcement agency that intends to hire the candidate when he/she has passed the exam.

Both the reciprocity and part-time peace officer examinations are scheduled by individual appointment and conducted at the Board's office.

Professional Peace Officer Education Programs

In Minnesota twenty-one colleges and universities offer professional peace officer education (PPOE) programs. The programs provide the necessary academic and clinical skills components to prepare students for a career in law enforcement. A student must earn a two- or four-year degree from any one of the PPOE programs for eligibility to take the peace officer licensing examination.

The Board developed and regularly reviews the learning objectives for all PPOE programs. The five broad categories of the learning objectives are practical applications and techniques; criminal justice system: civil and criminal law; community policing; victims and victims' rights; and leading, managing and communicating. Each category is divided into numbered sections with goal statements, and required and recommended content.

Recertification

The POST Board certifies that each professional peace officer education program includes and delivers the all of learning objectives' categories within their course curriculum as well as meet other mandated requirements. As per *Minnesota Rules*, Chapter 6700.0400, subp 3., sect C., every five years, the PPOE programs must be recertified by the Board. In 2005, the coordinator of each program was required to complete a recertification application along with supporting documentation.

The application consisted of completing 56-questions electronically and the signature of Chancellor of the Minnesota State College and University Board indicating support for the program. If the school is a private institution, the signature of the institution's president is required. The collaborating documentation included an itemized list of how each learning objective is provided within the program, an organizational chart, any PPOE-related articulation agreements or contracts, and course syllabi.

Upon submission of the application and required documentation, a site visit to the institution was conducted to ensure compliance with the standards for certification. After reviewing all of the information, the Board's Training Committee recommended the PPOE program for recertification if all criteria was met. At the end the eighteen month process, the POST Board recertified all of the state's professional peace officer education programs.





Continuing Education

Every licensed peace officer and part-time peace officer must complete a minimum of forty-eight hours of continuing education within the three-year licensing period in order to maintain and renew their license. For active officers, training in use of force is required annually and emergency vehicle operations/pursuit driving is mandatory once within the licensing period. It is the officer's discretion which courses they complete to satisfy the remainder of the required forty-eight hours. Inactive officers are not mandated to complete training in any particular subject, just forty-eight hours.

To gain POST-approval for continuing education courses, providers submit an application outlining the course content and instructor qualifications. To be accepted for continuing education training credit, the course must be law enforcement-related, promote professional peace officer competence, and be related to the knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to perform peace officer duties.

If the course is scheduled for a specific date, it will automatically be added to the POST Board's website (see example below). The approved course list is updated weekly and divided into nine regions across the state for ease of locating training in a specific area.



Continuing Education Expenditures

To qualify for reimbursement, law enforcement agencies must submit their continuing education expenses to the POST Board. Agencies are asked to list their actual costs although reimbursement is no more than the per-officer share or what was expended on training.

The categories of continuing education expenditures are cost of course, officer's salary while in training, lodging and meals per diem, transportation to and from course, fees paid to training organization, and other costs including facility rental and training vehicle maintenance. The costs do not include expenses paid for by officers themselves, membership dues to training association, training officer or support staff salaries, or expenditures from state agencies.

The total training costs in fiscal year 2005 were \$20,814,156 and \$23,758,181 in fiscal year 2006. The table below reflects the continuing education expenditures submitted to POST over the past twelve years.

Reimbursement

Over seventy-five percent of the POST Board's budget is distributed each year to local units of government. The payment is a partial reimbursement to the law enforcement agency for costs of continuing education for their officers. POST's reimbursement account is funded by a surcharge on criminal and traffic violations. Although the law (§ 357.021, subds 6. and 7.) dictates the percentage of the surcharge the Board is to receive, the legislature has the prerogative to set the Board's budget.

The reimbursement rate is calculated based on the total amount allocated by the legislature divided by the number of eligible officers. A law enforcement agency is able to request reimbursement for training costs if an officer has been employed for eight months. To receive a reimbursement, a law enforcement agency must submit an application detailing the costs of continuing education and a list of all eligible officers.

The per-officer share varies from year to year depending on the number of eligible officers submitted by agencies for reimbursement and the account amount. The per-officer share in the 2005/2006 biennium was \$352 and \$362 respectively. For the past five biennia, the per-officer share has increased and decreased while the number of eligible officers has steadily grown. The table below shows these trends.

License Sanctions

The POST Board has licensing jurisdiction when a peace officer has been criminally convicted and when the chief law enforcement officer fails to implement a mandated policy or follow a directive of the Board.

Based on legislation passed in 1995, a peace officer's license is automatically revoked if they are convicted of a felony. Convictions include a finding of guilt, whether or not the adjudication of guilt is stayed or executed, an admission of guilt, or a no contest plea. The Board's complaint committee procedure provides due process for licensees.

According to *Minnesota Rules*, Chapter 6700.1610, licensees themselves or persons with knowledge of the licensee's conduct which could be grounds for disciplinary action, must report the violation to the Board.

It is mandatory for all law enforcement agencies to adopt policies and procedures for the investigation of allegations of misconduct against their licensed peace officers. In 2001, the legislature mandated all agencies adopt a policy to prevent racial profiling governing the conduct of peace officers engaged in stops of citizens. Since then, complaints against peace officers received by the POST Board are separated by general allegations and impartial policing allegations.

Agency Compliance Reviews

Per MN Statutes 626.8459, the Board is directed to conduct annual compliance reviews of all state, county and local law enforcement agencies. The reviews ensure law enforcement agencies meet the minimum state standards set for policy and procedure, training and recordkeeping as well as ensuring all officers meet minimum standards for hiring.

Every July, the Board mails a policy and training compliance review form to each agency's Chief Law Enforcement Officer (CLEO) requesting affirmation their agency's policy and training requirements have been met. The CLEO's are asked to submit forms to POST within thirty days.

In addition to the annual forms, POST's Standards Coordinators make random on-site reviews of agencies. The Board's practice is to review 50 randomly selected law enforcement agencies. The agencies chosen are generated by a computer program which calculates geographic regions to ensure representation across the state each year. In addition to the ones randomly selected, the Standards Coordinators have the discretion to review other law enforcement agencies. **In 2005, 65 on-site visits to agencies were completed and 73 were reviewed in 2006.**

Administrative Rules

The POST Board is authorized to adopt rules and standards relating to the selection, training, and licensing of peace officers and part-time peace officers in pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, sections [626.84](#) to [626.863](#).

In February 2006, the Board adopted rules pertaining to reciprocity, minimum selection standards and violation of standards of conduct. The notice of adoption was published in the *State Register* on February 21, 2006. The rules were effective five working days after the date of publication.

The amendment concerning reciprocity altered the eligibility requirements for an out-of-state individual to become a licensed peace officer in Minnesota. To be eligible to take the reciprocity exam, an individual must either have three years of experience as a law enforcement officer plus a post-secondary degree or have five years of experience as a law enforcement officer.

The amendments regarding minimum selection standards and violation of standards of conduct added registered predatory offenders to the list of convictions of bars to licensure and to the list of violation of standards of conduct. The adopted rules prohibit an individual from becoming a licensed peace officer if he/she is a registered predatory offender and allow the Board to take disciplinary action if a current licensed peace officer is required to register as a predatory offender.

On-going Projects

Along with the key service components, the Board manages several on-going projects. These tasks are generally a bi-product of one of the core functions of the Board or are legislatively mandated. The following examples are on-going projects from the biennium.

Additional Part-time Peace Officer License Requests

Through legislation in 1999, POST was directed to determine the number of part-time peace officers employed per law enforcement agency during the previous three years and assign a quota allowed to be employed at each agency. The legislation also permitted agencies to request additional part-time licenses if they demonstrated an extraordinary and temporary need.

To request an additional part-time peace officer license(s), an application must be submitted to the POST Board detailing the following:

- specific extraordinary circumstances,
- agency's action plan to solve the extraordinary and temporary circumstances,
- other options available and why they are not sufficient, and
- list of supporters for agency's request.

During the biennium, the Board received 20 applications and granted 18 additional temporary part-time peace officer licenses.

Federal Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act of 2004

In June 2005, the Board began processing applications from retired peace officers as a result of HR 218, a federal law which allows qualified former officers to carry concealed firearms. **To date, 366 applications have been processed.**

The form requires the following:

- signature of retired officer certifying they met the state's standards for firearms training,
- copy of retired officer's agency-issued photo ID,
- signature of firearms instructor certifying the applicant successfully completed the training, and
- copy of instructor's certification(s) as a qualified firearms instructor.

After reviewing the form and accompanying documentation, the Executive Director signs it certifying the applicant has met the state's standards for firearms training and assigns an expiration date. The signed original is mailed to the retired officer as their proof of authority to carry a weapon under the provisions.

Executive Order

In February 2006, the Governor issued an Executive Order requiring the state's college and university system and the state's licensing and certification boards to review and correct any impediments to veteran's employment and education. The order stated in part:

- The majority of servicemen and women receive extensive skills from their military training in a broad range of technical areas with direct civilian occupational counterparts and for which state licensure and academic degrees or certificates are required for these civilian occupations; and
- Minnesota's licensure and certification processes often do not appropriately recognize the experience and training provided through military service and act as an impediment to the integration of highly skilled veterans wanting to enter or re-enter Minnesota's workforce and similarly, institutions of higher education sometimes do not appropriately provide academic credit for military courses and experience.

The Board reviewed the requirements included in state statutes and administrative rules for becoming a licensed peace officer. They concluded completion a professional peace officer education program could not be waived because the required learning objectives are essential to the profession. However, the executive order instructed higher education to "make every effort" to recognize and provide credit to veterans for their prior military training and experience if the course or training meets the standards of the American Council on Education or the equivalent. In essence, if areas of the learning objectives were met through their military training and experience, the veteran would be allowed to use those credits toward completion of the program.

POST is working with the Minnesota National Guard Bureau to bring this message to returning veterans and their families. The Board's presentation is being used during Family Readiness Group Training sessions coordinated by the Minnesota Army National Guard. In addition, Board representatives will participate in the Minnesota Veteran's Summit sponsored by the Governor to be held on September 21, 2006.

Law Enforcement-Related Deployments

A peace officer's license is valid for a three year period from the initial issue date and a candidate's eligibility to be licensed is valid for three years upon successful completion of a licensing exam. Pursuant to U.S. Code, Part III, Title 38, Chapter 43, the Board provides protection for both licensed and eligible to be licensed candidates. An officer whose license has expired while deployed is allowed to return to active peace officer duty and renew their license as soon as practical upon return. In addition, they are allowed credit for continuing education received while deployed and no penalties are assessed to renew their license. If a candidate's eligibility expires while deployed, the Board automatically reinstates the eligibility for an amount of time equal to the candidate's eligibility upon deployment.

General Statistics

A law enforcement agency is defined as a unit of state or local government with full powers of arrest and with the duties of preventing, detecting crime and enforcing the criminal laws of the state. **As of June 30, 2006, Minnesota had 477 law enforcement agencies.** Since 1980, 106 agencies have disbanded, consolidated or contracted with the sheriff's office.
