

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

### Fiscal Year 2008 Annual Report Table of Contents

### FY 2008 ... Year in Review

Minnesotans, in every county and community of the state, care about the arts. They recognize that the arts are valuable in their own lives, their children's lives, and their communities.

We value the arts because they inspire, enlighten, connect, and challenge us. The arts give us unique and meaningful experiences, and help us understand and imagine the world from other points of view.

Beyond this, their essential purpose and benefit, the arts also produce tremendous secondary benefits that help Minnesota achieve many of its most important public goals.

### Academic Achivement

Research shows that children who study the arts demonstrate stronger overall academic performance. Arts can be especially helpful to nontraditional learners or at-risk students. These "problem" students often become high-achievers in arts learning settings; this success becomes a bridge to learning in other areas.

#### Employment / Workforce Development

Creativity will be one of the most important characteristics of the jobs and the workforce of the future. Arts experiences fuel the imagination and help produce the dynamic, talented workers and companies our economy needs.

#### Economic Development

The arts attract businesses and new residents, and encourage consumer spending, all of which results in increased tax revenues. Cultural offerings enhance the market appeal of an area, encouraging business relocation and generation of new jobs.

The arts are an important component in cultural heritage tourism, an increasingly important growth industry for our state.

### Stronger Communities

Arts bring people together. Residents of a community understand their new immigrant neighbors better after seeing a traditional play. A struggling downtown begins to hum with new energy on the evenings the community arts center offers a concert. Towns celebrate their heritage through an annual arts festival. Arts participation builds social capital—the social bonds and civic engagement needed in a healthy, thriving society.

- **95%** of Minnesotans believe that the arts are an important or essential part of the overall education of Minnesota children
- **94%** of Minnesotans believe that arts and cultural activities help to make Minnesota an attractive place to live and work
- \$1 billion ... the combined annual economic impact of the nonprofit arts industry in Minnesota
- **67%** of Minnesotans participated in an arts activity within the past year

### National / International Visibility

The arts bring our state visibility and prestige. They set us apart from other states, and give Minnesota national and international acclaim.

### Arts, a creative public investment

During fiscal year 2008, the State of Minnesota appropriated \$10,215,000 to the Minnesota State Arts Board. The following are brief highlights of how these state funds were used to stimulate and encourage the creation, performance, and appreciation of the arts in every county of the state.

#### Grants

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To artists, arts organizations, and arts in education The Arts Board received 689 grant requests for FY 2008 and was able to award grants to 323 of the organizations, schools, and individual artists that had applied for funding.

Funding reaches throughout the state—from the Lanesboro to East Grand Forks, Marshall to Duluth, Morris to the Minneapolis/Saint Paul metro area—and served more than 8 million participants and audience members in fiscal year 2008.

Thanks to an increase in the State's appropriation for the arts in the 2008-09 biennium, the Arts Board was able to reintroduce the Arts Across Minnesota program. It exists to help make outstanding arts experiences available to residents in every region of the state through festivals and touring presentations that engage local artists, children, and other members of the public in community arts celebrations. Arts Across Minnesota had been a very popular program since it was introduced in the 1990s, but grant making in this program had been suspended in FY 2004 due to the significant budget cut the board received for the 2004-05 biennium. During FY 2008, the program guidelines were updated and promotion of the program began; grants will be awarded in FY 2009.

#### To regional arts councils

The Minnesota State Arts Board acts as fiscal agent for Minnesota's eleven regional arts councils. Together, the board and regional arts councils serve every county of the state. Minnesota's two-tiered structure for providing programs and services for the arts is a model that other states and other agencies in the public sector have emulated.

During FY 2008, \$2,957,000 was awarded to the eleven regional arts councils in the form of block grants. Regional arts councils design and provide services specifically tailored to meet the needs of their geographic regions.

### Partnerships.

Percent for Art in Public Places Under legislation enacted in 1984, up to one percent of the total appropriation may be added to the construction budget of new or renovated state buildings to purchase or commission works of art. The Percent for Art in Public Places program is under the auspices of the Minnesota Department of Administration, but the program is managed by the Arts Board through a delegation of authority.



#### Cultural Heritage Tourism

According to studies conducted by the Travel Industry Association of America, cultural tourism is the fastest growing segment of the tourism industry, up 13 percent between 1996 and 2002. Cultural travelers spend 38 percent more money and stay longer–one to three more nights—than other travelers.

During the 2007 session, the Minnesota Legislature directed that a task force be created to study and determine ways to promote cultural tourism along the Minnesota River Valley. The Minnesota State Arts Board was one of the agencies named by the legislature to serve on the task force, which was chaired by the Minnesota Historical Society. The task force completed an inventory of organizations that are in place and efforts that are underway to promote tourism along the Minnesota River and outlined several strategies that could be undertaken to further maximize its tourism potential.

#### Art of Recovery

For the fourth year, the Minnesota State Arts Board worked with the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Justice Programs to present *Art of Recovery*. This annual arts exhibition helps create awareness for crime victims' rights and resources available to victims.



In September, the 2007 Art of Recovery exhibition traveled to Bemidji and was on display at Northwest Technical College for one month. This was the first time the exhibition had been displayed outside of the metro area. At an opening event, sponsored by the college, two of the featured Art of Recovery artists–Mike Schlemper from Bemidji and Lisa Spencer from Tonka Bay–gave presentations and talked about their experiences as victims of crime. Local crime victims' service providers also gave presentations on resources available in the region.

Eighteen individuals were selected to participate in Art of Recovery 2008. The exhibition opened in early April and was on display in the Arts Board gallery until June 30, 2008. Michael Campion, commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, and Jeffrey Edleson, director of the Minnesota Center Against Violence and Abuse, participated in an opening event on April 11. Participating literary artists gave a public reading on April 27, during the Saint Paul Art Crawl. After the exhibition closed

in Saint Paul, it was scheduled to travel to Hutchinson and Winona.

### Poetry Out Loud

2008 was the third year that the Arts Board coordinated *Poetry Out Loud* in Minnesota. Through *Poetry Out Loud*, high school students learn about great poetry through memorization, performance, and competition. They also master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about their literary heritage.

Eleven metro and seventeen greater Minnesota schools participated in *Poetry Out Loud* in 2008. Regional contests were held in Bloomington, Duluth, Elk River, Fergus Falls, Lanesboro, and Minneapolis in February. On March 10, twelve finalists competed for the title of Minnesota poetry recitation champion at the Fitzgerald Theater in Saint Paul. The finalists included:

### Services

Mary Hu, a sophomore from Morris Area High School, Morris, was named 2008 Minnesota State Poetry Recitation Champion. She went on to compete in the national finals in Washington, DC, in April 2008.

*Poetry Out Loud* is a national program, cosponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. It was launched in high schools across America in the spring of 2006 with tens of thousands of students participating. Nationwide, over 100,000 students competed in *Poetry Out Loud* last year. The program will continue to grow during the 2008-09 school year, culminating in the 2009 National Finals in Washington, DC, in April 2009.

Promoting accessibility

During fiscal year 2008, the Arts Board continued its partnership with VSA arts of Minnesota and Minnesota's regional arts councils to support the Artists with Disabilities Alliance (AWDA) network throughout the state. During FY 2008, AWDA groups were operating in seven communities—Bemidji, Duluth, Fergus Falls, Hinckley, Mankato, Saint Cloud, and the Minneapolis/Saint Paul metropolitan area. AWDA is an informal networking group that allows people of similar interests and abilities to learn more about the "ins and outs of the system" and how they might be more successful in pursuing their interest in the arts.

In August 2007, the Arts Board worked in partnership with VSA arts of Minnesota, the Guthrie Theater, and the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts to sponsor the Leadership Exchange in Arts and Disability (LEAD) conference in Minneapolis. The conference was an opportunity for participants from across the country to explore practical methods for implementing accessibility in cultural environments; communicate information about arts and accessibility, and share resources and knowledge among professionals in the field of accessibility.

In December 2007, the Minnesota State Arts Board's received national recognition for its long-time commitment to promoting accessibility. The board received the National Accessibility Leadership Award sponsored jointly by the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies. In addition to recognition for its efforts, the board received a special \$30,000 grant from the NEA to help underwrite new, expanded accessibility efforts.



### Technical assistance / outreach

The Arts Board offered workshops, information sessions, and one-on-one technical assistance to help individuals and organizations take advantage of the grant programs and services the board has to offer.

### Statewide arts information

During FY 2008, the Arts Board continued its efforts to harness the timeliness and costeffectiveness of electronic communication and has made it the centerpiece of its communications efforts. The Arts Board's Web site [http://www.arts.state.mn.us] is its principal communication tool. It is designed to be a user-friendly, comprehensive source of information about the Arts Board and about the arts, in general. The following is a summary of the information a visitor can find on the site:

- An interactive state map that links visitors to each of the eleven regional arts councils
- Detailed information about each Arts Board grant program, and application forms and instructions that can be downloaded
- A calendar of grant deadlines and grant review meetings

- Online application forms and instructions; artists apply online to be included in the Percent artist registry
- An interactive map of public art that the State of Minnesota has acquired through the Percent for Art program with information about the artists and artworks

- A listing of opportunities for artists such as fellowships, sales/marketing opportunities, etc.
- Database-driven resource guides listing performance spaces, galleries and exhibition spaces, and grants available in Minnesota

- Links to national and state arts research and policy information

### Leadership Transition

In February 2008, Thomas C. Proehl, who had served as the agency's executive director since March of 2007 and before that as its interim director since December 2006, left the Arts Board to accept a new arts leadership position in California.

The board appointed Sue Gens to serve as interim executive director. Gens has been serving as the agency's communications and government relations director since October 2001. She has more than two decades experience working in the Twin Cities



nonprofit arts community and in the public sector. Prior to joining the Arts Board staff, she served at the University of Minnesota's Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs as director of external relations (1998-2001) and associate director of development (1993-1998). Previously, she has held management, public relations, development or marketing positions with the Children's Theatre Company, COMPAS, the Metropolitan Regional Arts Council, the Minnesota Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, United Arts, and the Women's Theatre Project.

Gens holds a BA in music and a BA in arts administration from Minnesota State University Moorhead.



### **Rules Changes**

The Minnesota State Arts Board did not propose any new rules, or make amendments to its existing administrative rules (Minnesota Rules, chapter 1900), in fiscal year 2008.

### Complaints / Concerns

In September 2007, four organizations appealed the decisions the Arts Board had made on their FY 2008 Institutional Support grant applications.

The Arts Board's appeal process, outlined in Minnesota Rules chapter 1900.1110, states that "There is no right of appeal for disputes of decision with respect to interpretation of review criteria. An appeal may be made only if it is asserted that the board did not follow its policies and procedures as provided by this chapter."

The board considered the appeals at its September meeting and directed staff, in consultation with a subcommittee of the board, to investigate the appeals brought by each organization. The staff completed the investigations in consultation with the subcommittee of the board and with counsel from the Minnesota Attorney General's Office, and prepared a staff analysis and recommendation on each. The board considered the analyses and recommendations at its December 2007 meeting and determined that the board had not violated its policies and procedures and therefore, the appeals were denied.

In December 2007 the board received notice that a former staff member had filed a personnel complaint against the board. The Minnesota Attorney General's Office, acting on the board's behalf, responded to the former staff member's complaint. The former staff member filed a petition with the Minnesota Court of Appeals to hear the case; the Court denied the petition and referred the matter the State of Minnesota's Bureau of Mediation Services. As of June 30, 2008, the case was ongoing.



### Minnesota State Arts Board Members

Eleven private citizens, appointed by the governor for four-year terms, govern the Minnesota State Arts Board. Board members represent the state's eight congressional districts or the state at large. The board meets bimonthly to establish policies, monitor agency programs, and act upon grant recommendations. During fiscal year 2008, the board or its committees met 14 times for approximately 32 hours.
