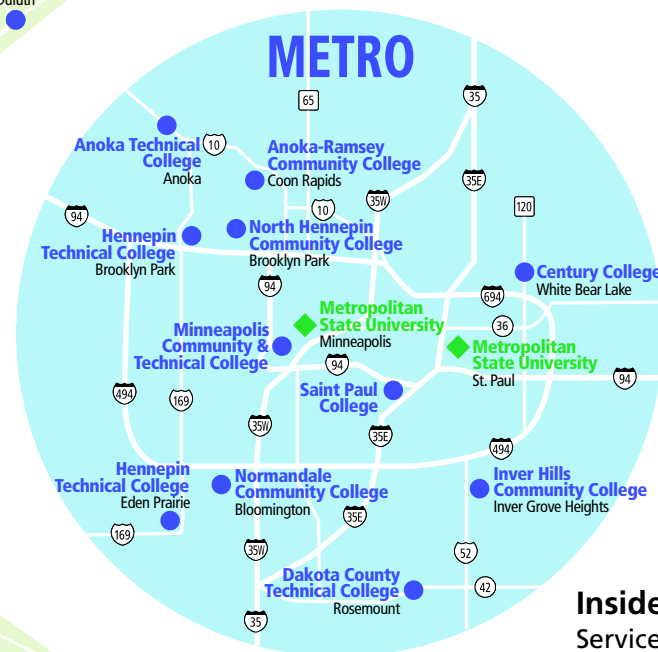

If you think you might attend a four-year university, take the ACT or SAT test. One of these standardized tests is required for admission to a four-year university. Check with your high school counselor about the test schedule.

Schedule campus visits. Call the admissions office and make an appointment, or attend a regularly scheduled tour. Bring your parents or other adults to get another perspective.

You may be able to take college courses in 11th and 12th grade. See Page 5.

No ACT or SAT tests are required for admission to a two-year college.

TECHNICAL COLLEGES
are two-year state colleges that teach knowledge and skills leading to specific careers.

AT COMBINED COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGES,
you can start on a bachelor's degree and transfer after two years, or you can enroll in a technical program to learn skills that lead directly to a career.

COMMUNITY COLLEGES

are two-year state colleges that enable you to start on a bachelor's degree. You can take your first two years at a community college, then transfer to a four-year university to finish. Or, you can take career programs leading directly to a job.

STATE UNIVERSITIES

are four-year institutions offering programs leading to bachelor's, master's and advanced degrees. Most offer on-campus housing and a full range of student activities.

Services to help students succeed

The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities offer services to help you get off to a good start, keep costs down and make the most of your time on campus. The admissions office on each campus can help you find out what's available.

Special programs offer extra services

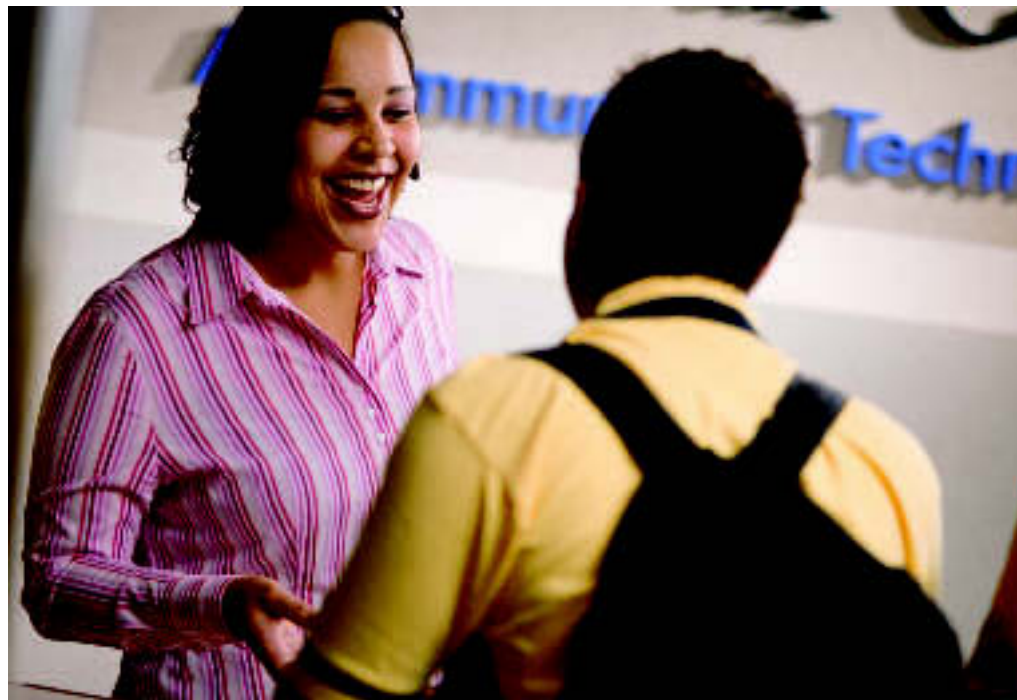
Many state colleges and universities offer extra services to help students succeed. For example, if your parents didn't attend college, programs such as TRIO can help you get started successfully. They can help you sharpen your writing skills, learn study techniques and get organized to make the best use of your time. Tutors and special study classes also may be available for some class topics. You can find out more about student services at the admissions office.

Students with disabilities

Many students with physical and learning disabilities choose the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities. Buildings are accessible, and many accommodations are available to help students with documented disabilities. To request accommodations, speak with the disability coordinator at the college or university you want to attend. For more information, see www.mnscu.edu/students/disabilities.html.

Developmental education

To save money and time, take high school courses that prepare you for college-level work. After you are admitted to a two-year college, you will be required to take a placement test. The test has no bearing on whether you will be admitted; rather, it will determine whether you will need to take developmental or remedial courses before taking college-level courses. Some students need to take developmental or remedial courses to help them succeed. Many need just one developmental or remedial course, often in math or English. These courses do not count toward a certificate, diploma or degree.

Earn college credits in high school

High school juniors and seniors can receive both high school and college credit for college-level courses completed through the Post-Secondary Enrollment Options program, also known as PSEO. In 2005, almost 19,000 students took college-level courses through PSEO programs offered by the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities.

You may take courses on a campus or, where available, at your high school at no cost to you as long as you also earn high school credit. To learn more, ask your high school counselor or the admissions office at the college or university you want to attend and go to www.mnscu.edu/students/specialprograms/pseo.html.

To be eligible, high school juniors must be in the upper one-third of their class or score at or above the 70th percentile on the ACT or SAT. Seniors must be in the upper one-half of their class or score at or above the 50th percentile on a test such as the ACT or SAT. Colleges and universities may admit students based on other documentation of ability to perform college-level work.

Money matters

To hold down costs, it may help to:

- Complete your first two years at a two-year college, which costs less than a four-year college or university. Plan ahead to make sure all of your credits will transfer.
- Live at home to avoid the expense of a dorm room or apartment.
- Attend full time, because part-time students can be at a disadvantage in receiving financial aid.

Reduced out-of-state tuition

If you live in Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota or Manitoba, Canada, you are eligible for tuition rates similar to those paid by Minnesota residents. Several Minnesota State Colleges and Universities allow students from other states to pay the lower in-state rates; check with the college or university about its policy. Generally, out-of-state tuition is double the rate that Minnesota students pay.

Reciprocity: An agreement between Minnesota and some neighboring states or provinces that allows students to pay lower tuition than their regular out-of-state rates.



College cost comparison

Tuition at Minnesota State Colleges and Universities is lower than tuition at many other colleges, universities and trade schools because the state of Minnesota pays a portion of the cost of education for Minnesota residents.

For every dollar you pay in tuition, the state of Minnesota pays \$1.02 to support your education.

Room and board costs

The cost for a double room and board at a state university ranges from \$5,099 to \$5,793 per year. Some two-year colleges also provide housing on campus or nearby, and many others can help you find housing in the area. The costs of these options will vary.

The costs for Minnesota State Colleges and Universities are for average full-time tuition and fees per year for Minnesota residents. The costs do not include room and board for any institution listed. Some colleges and universities charge additional fees. Fees vary depending on program. For exact tuition and fees, contact the admissions office at the college or university that interests you.

Financial aid can help you pay for college

You might be surprised

About one-half of students in Minnesota State Colleges and Universities receive financial aid to help pay the cost of college. Tax credits for students also can help lower your net costs.

Types of aid

Much financial aid for students at state colleges and universities comes from federal and state grants, which you do not need to pay back. Eligibility is based on your need. Grants, loans, work-study and scholarships may be available.

You also may be able to take out student loans at reasonable interest rates, but they need to be repaid later.

Scholarships

Scholarships, which you do not need to pay back, are available through organizations and colleges and universities. Scholarships can be awarded for academic achievement, financial need, membership in a group or your talents. Check with a high school counselor or the financial aid office at a college or university for free information.

How to apply for financial aid

Complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, form after Jan. 1 of your senior year. You can complete the form online at www.fafsa.ed.gov or pick up the form at your school counselor's office. For help in completing the form, go to your high school counselor or the financial aid office at the college or university you plan to attend.

This form must be completed by all students and parents who apply for federal student aid and Minnesota State Grant funds. It also is used to apply for funds from most colleges and universities.

Financial aid deadlines

Apply as soon as possible. Students must submit applications within 30 days after the beginning of a college or university term to receive a state grant for that term. But, it is a good idea to complete that process before the term begins. Contact the admissions office of the college or university to find out about the deadline.

See how financial aid could work for you

Here are examples of how financial aid is helping three full-time students pay for college.

For all three students, federal and state grants (which do not need to be paid back) cover a significant part of the cost. The total costs are estimates that could be much lower, depending on your circumstances. In addition, some families take a bank loan to help pay the net costs of college.

Tax credits

Some college students also benefit from two federal income tax credit programs, the Hope Scholarship and the Lifetime Learning tax credit. These may apply to you or your family, depending on your financial circumstances.

Veterans

If you have served in the armed forces, you might be eligible for veterans-related assistance with college costs. Some colleges and universities also have on-campus veterans centers to provide support and assistance.

Study abroad opportunities

Do you want to study art in Italy? How about learning wilderness management in Africa or studying mass communications at Lincoln University in England? Students at many of the state colleges and universities may earn credits while gaining global experiences and making lifelong friends in other countries.

You can teach simple games to Chinese school children and learn about the culture and economy of China. You can spend the night in a bush camp among wildlife in Tanzania, meet Masai tribal villagers and observe thousands of flamingos on an African lake. As a university student wrote at the end of her Tanzanian travels, "This truly was a life-changing experience."

Study abroad programs include short-term travel, exchange programs and full semesters abroad. Dozens of opportunities are available throughout the world. Ask state college or university admissions offices for information about study abroad programs.

Plan ahead to make transfer easy

College students often decide to transfer from one institution to another. Some plan to enroll first at a two-year college and transfer to a four-year institution to complete a bachelor's degree. Others want to take some courses at one college or university and transfer those credits to another institution later.

The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities work together to make transferring among institutions easier. All 32 institutions are accredited and offer the

Minnesota Transfer Curriculum, a package of general education courses accepted for transfer to the other state colleges and universities.

Let your college advisor know if you might want to transfer someday. While some programs and courses are designed to transfer, others are not, so be sure to ask before you register for classes. Transfer specialists are available on every campus to help with your questions and planning.

Frequently asked questions about transferring

Question

Where can I get my transfer questions answered?

Answer

Each state college and university has transfer specialists who can answer questions, help with course selection and plan your future with you. Their names, along with other helpful information on transferring, can be found on www.mntransfer.org. Look under "transfer resources – campus contacts."

Question

When I transfer, will there be others like me?

Answer

Yes, 44 percent of all new students at the state universities each year are transfer students, and about half of them are transferring from community and technical colleges. Some universities offer events and clubs for transfer students.

Question

Will my credits transfer to a private college or the University of Minnesota?

Answer

The University of Minnesota and private colleges generally will accept your credits from a liberal arts program at the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities if you meet the institution's admissions requirements for transfer students. Some technical college programs also have transfer agreements with private colleges and the University of Minnesota. It's important to check in advance.

Question

What is the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum?

Answer

The Minnesota Transfer Curriculum is a 40-credit package of general education courses that will be accepted for transfer by all of the

Minnesota State Colleges and Universities. The University of Minnesota accepts the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum when it is completed in full. Students often complete the transfer curriculum in conjunction with another program.

Question

What is the Associate in Arts degree?

Answer

Students typically pursue the Associate in Arts degree if they know they want to transfer to complete a four-year liberal arts degree or certain professional degrees. The Associate in Arts degree is a recognized 60- to 64-credit degree offered at community colleges and includes the entire Minnesota Transfer Curriculum. It is designed to satisfy the first two years of a four-year degree program. Students who plan to transfer should contact a transfer specialist, since some majors have specific course requirements.

2-year state college admission requirements

The two-year state community and technical colleges have an open admissions policy. This means:

- You can enroll if you have a high school diploma or a GED. Even without those, you may be admitted if you demonstrate potential for success in college.
- No standardized tests are required for admission to the two-year state colleges, and your high school grades and class rank are not considered.
- After you have been admitted, you will be required to take a test for placement in the appropriate courses based on your reading, writing and mathematics skills.
- You are more likely to do well on the placement test if you complete a "college prep" curriculum in high school, including four years of English and three years of mathematics, science and social studies. (See Page 35.) If you did not, or if you had minimum passing scores on the Minnesota Basic Standards test, you may not be admitted to certain programs. Most likely, you will have to take developmental or remedial courses that will not count toward a degree before you can take college-level courses.

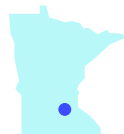

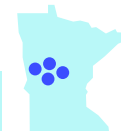

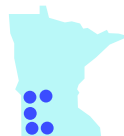

4-year state university admission requirements

The seven state universities generally will accept you if you can answer yes to at least one of these questions:

- Did you graduate in the top half of your high school class?
- Did you score 21 or higher on the ACT standardized test?
- Did you receive a combined score of 1,000 or higher on the SAT standardized test?

Admission to some of the seven state universities may require meeting slightly different requirements. Check with the university admissions office for details. Even if you don't meet minimum requirements, you may be considered for admission under special provisions.

Apply early in 12th grade for the best chance at being admitted. Some universities and programs do not have room for all qualified applicants.

For admission to a state university, you also should have completed these courses in high school:

- Four years of English, including composition and literature
- Three years of math, including two years of algebra, one of which is intermediate or advanced algebra, and one year of geometry
- Three years of science, including one year each of a biological and a physical science with laboratory experience
- Three years of social studies, including one year each of U.S. history and geography
- Two years of a single world language, including non-English native languages and American Sign Language
- One year of visual and performing arts

Choosing a major

Some students know what they want to study in college, but many students explore their interests for a year or two before selecting a major. You can begin with liberal arts courses while you are thinking about a major.

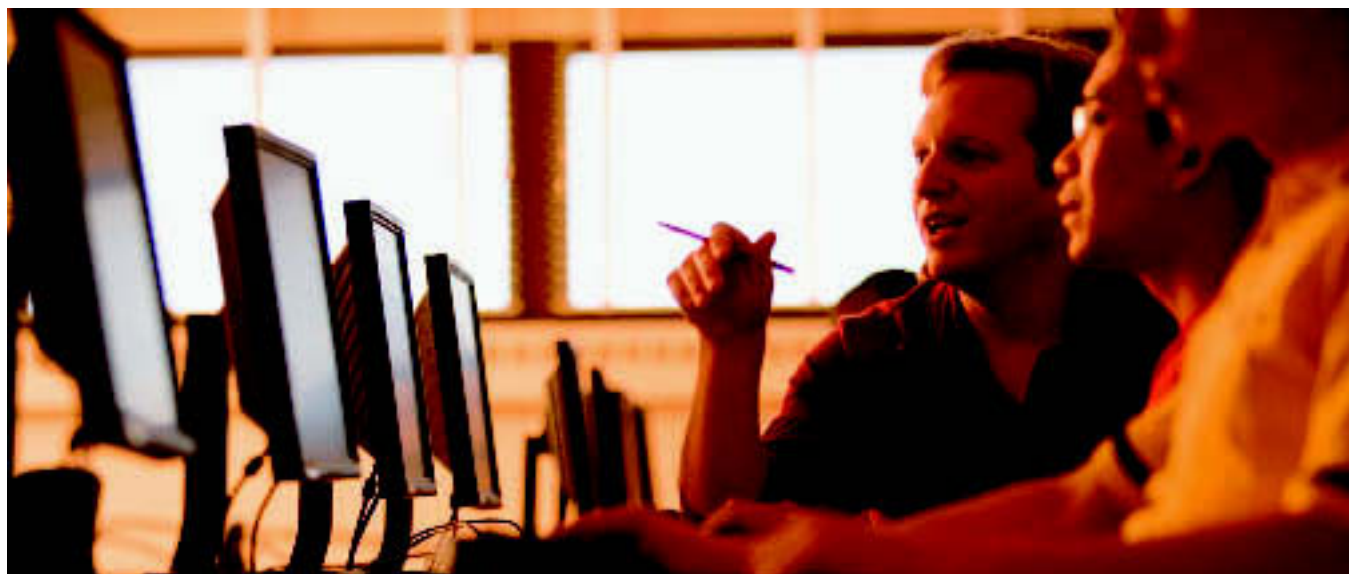

Find out where you fit

Tips for campus visits

Call to schedule an appointment to tour the campus. Some campuses have regularly scheduled tours, too. If a particular academic program, student activity or sport interests you, ask to meet with someone in that area.

Before you go for your visit, write your questions in a notebook and take it along.

Ask about programs, activities, special services, tuition and other costs.

Check out the library, computer labs, cafeterias and bookstore.

Ask to see a dorm room if you want to live on campus. If there is no campus housing, ask about off-campus options.

Look around the campus and neighborhood. Can you picture yourself there?

Congratulations on your visit! You've taken an important step toward choosing a campus that's right for you.

Tips for parents and mentors

Talk about college with your student and ask what factors would be most important in picking a college or university.

Encourage your student to request more information. Help your student make a list of questions.

Attend college fairs together, pick up brochures and ask questions of the college representatives. They want to meet you and help you know more.

Help schedule campus visits. Go when classes are in session if possible. Meet students and professors, and check out residence halls, libraries and student services as well as academic programs.

Find out about financial aid to help pay for college and fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA form, as soon as possible after Jan. 1 in 12th grade.

Have fun! You will be an excellent coach as your student makes these important plans for the future.

Technical notes

"Tuition and fees" is annual tuition based on a full-time credit load of 15 credits per semester and fees. Enrollment data is from 2004-2005, the most recent data available. "Total number students served" is unduplicated annual headcount. "Full-year-equivalent enrollment" is calculated by adding up the credits taken by all students and dividing by the number of credits considered to be a full-time course load of 30 credits per year for undergraduate students. Percentages for female and male students and students of color are percentages of unduplicated headcount based on known factors. Colleges and universities vary widely in the percentage of students for whom race and ethnicity is known, ranging from 99.9 percent to 61.4 percent. City population figures are from the state demographer's office.
